TALK & DOCUMENTARY ON JEWISH INVOLVEMENT AT HISTORICALLY BLACK COLLEGES ON FEBRUƏRY 23



In recognition
of Black History
Month, Temple
Member Wendy
Soltz will offer a
special program on
Jewish involvement
at historically
black colleges
and universities
(HBCUs) on Friday,
February 23 at 7
p.m. following an

abbreviated Shabbat service at the Temple.

The evening will feature the documentary film <u>"From Swastika to Jim Crow,"</u> which focuses on Jewish refugee scholars of World War II who taught at HBCUs. This has been for decades the only known story of Jews at HBCUs. The second half of the program will address Wendy's doctoral research (PhD, OSU 2016), which paints a new picture of this fascinating phenomenon, dating the start of the Jewish involvement decades before World War II with American-born Jews.

Wendy is the Charles K. & Esther C. Krieger Visiting Scholar in Jewish Studies at Defiance College and the Executive Director of the Indiana Jewish Historical Society. She also chairs the Temple's Adult Education Committee.




TEMPLE BOOK CLUB WILL E-VISIT WITH AUTHOR ABIGAIL POGREBIN

RABBI LENNY SARKO

JEWISH WARMTH AND CONNECTION ON THE ROAD



Karen and I have a minhag (custom) when we travel. If we are away for Shabbat, we try to go to a local synagogue for services. The facilities we choose are quite random, and I do not let them know in front that I am a rabbi, although when I arrive I often introduce myself in that way. We have done this for many years and it has always been a pleasant experience.

Our last vacation included two such Shabbats at Reform Temples – one in Orlando and one in Fort Walton Beach, Florida. The Temple in Orlando was small and located in a strip center. They had taken over one of the storefronts. It was interesting to see how they transposed this space into a sanctuary. The service leader was a cantor instead of a rabbi. This was an adjustment due to lack of funds. The service reflected that approach as it was about 90% music. The cantor played an acoustic guitar, the cantor's wife played a bass guitar, and a congregant helped with music on a violin. A little over 50 people attended for Shabbat.

The second facility was also a Reform facility located in the panhandle of Florida. They had their own building, which was a small, one-story converted house. They reconfigured the inside with the sanctuary in the center and had a meeting room on each side going the length of the facility, with a kitchen and small service area in the rear. Given the small membership, they had a part-time student rabbi from Hebrew Union College come one weekend a month. This was not one of those weekends, so they had a lay leader conduct services. There were no instruments but they did sing many of the traditional prayers. They also had a bit more than 50 people attend.

In both cases, Karen and I were warmly welcomed. In Orlando, I was asked to help lead the kiddish at the end of the service. During the onegs at both, we had a chance to meet many attendees. We learned about their synagogue, and I was able to describe Achduth Vesholom. Most people in Florida tend to be transplants from one area of the country or another and this often extends the conversation to their former locales. Some friends of ours joined us for services in Fort Walton Beach and it turned out that our friend Frank, who was a math teacher in New York City many years ago, taught one of the congregants as a High School student some 40 plus years ago. It is a small world.


From a religious point of view, it is always a great feeling to hear the shema, the tefilah, and other familiar prayers. It makes you feel at home, that you belong in that place, even though you are thousands of miles from home. The feeling of mishpachah (family), of hospitality, and the connection we have with Jews all over the world is something special.

This extended to our Disney cruise. I led four nights of Chanukkah on board. We had over 70 people attend each of those nights, Jews from all over the world coming together as a temporary extended Jewish family. You tend to bind very quickly in that setting. As I travelled throughout the ship on subsequent days, I'd always hear from across one of the rooms, by both children and adults – "Hi, Rabbi Lenny" – accompanied by a vigorous hand wave. It always put a smile on my face.

When you travel in the future, please take the time to visit a local synagogue. You will find it well worth your while and it will give you a chance to feel the real meaning of what it is to be part of the Jewish family. Amen.



BLACK HISTORY MONTH IN THE TEMPLE LIBRARY

In conjunction with Wendy Soltz's presentation for Black History Month on Friday, February 23, we are featuring related resources in the Rabbi Richard B. Safran Library. Covering a range of topics from the Freedom Summer of 1964 to baseball legend Jackie Robinson, we have several books for readers of all ages.

The Freedom Summer Murders by Don Mitchell was published in 2014, fifty years after the events of 1964. Unfortunately still relevant today, this Cybils Award finalist is written for high school and adult readers.

Other titles address Jewish involvement in the civil rights struggle. Heeding the Call: Jewish Voices in America's Civil Rights Struggle by Norman H. Finkelstein is a National Jewish Book Award winner written for older teens and adults. Shared Dreams: Martin Luther King, Jr. and the Jewish

Community by Marc Schneier was donated to our collection by the <u>Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne</u>.

Freedom Summer: The 1964 Struggle for Civil Rights in Mississippi by Susan Goldman Rubin covers similar material for a slightly younger audience. Another non-fiction title for teens and young adults is Schools of Hope: How Julius Rosenwald Helped Change African American Education by Norman H. Finkelstein. Imagining

Katherine by Carol Solomon is a 2016 Sydney Taylor Notable Book for young adults, set in Baltimore in the early 1960s. In the novel, Katherine, a young Jewish student, comes to grips with the arrival of her school's first black student.

For middle grade readers and younger, we have four baseball titles

inspired by Jackie Robinson. Sharon Robinson, daughter of the baseball star, has written The Hero Two Doors Down, a novel for young readers based on a true story. *Stealing Home* by Ellen Schwartz and *Thank You, Jackie Robinson* by Barbara Cohen are chapter books inspired by Robinson, as is Richard Michelson's picture book, *Across the Alley*.

The same author has written As Good as Anybody: Martin Luther King and Abraham Joshua Heschel's Amazing March Toward Freedom, a picture book for middle-grade

readers. *Hot Pursuit: Murder in Mississippi* by Stacia Deutsch covers the events of 1964 in a short chapter book.

Finally, for the youngest readers, one of our best-loved titles is relevant here – Patricia Polacco's *Mrs. Katz and Tush.* It shows all readers the human, more hopeful side of the subject. Stop by the library whenever the building is open to check out our collection.
