WOMEN AND THE HOLOCAUST FOCUS OF KEYNOTE ADDRESS AT THE TEMPLE

Dr. Atina Grossmann, the keynote speaker at a six-day Symposium to educate tomorrow's teachers about the Holocaust, will discuss "Women and The Holocaust: Between Perpetrators and Victims" on Thursday, May 19 at 7 p.m. at the Temple in a program open to the public.

A Professor of History at Cooper Union for the Advancement of Science and Art, Dr. Grossmann is the author of *Jews, Germans, and Allies: Close Encounters in Occupied Germany* 1945–1949 and *Reforming Sex: The German Movement For Birth Control and Abortion Reform* 1920–1950.

The Symposium on May 15-20 at Indiana University-Purdue University Fort Wayne is co-sponsored by the Temple's Holocaust Education Committee and IPFW's Institute for Holocaust and Genocide Studies. The program brings together pre-service teachers from Indiana and surrounding areas to learn about the Holocaust and related events so they are prepared to educate future students. Prior to Dr. Grossmann's talk, the Symposium attendees will have a brief tour of the Temple and a chance to meet with Rabbi Cattapan and Doris Fogel, past president of our congregation and a Holocaust survivor.

HOLOCAUST SURVIVOR TO SPEAK ON YOM HASHOAH



Robert Melson, author of False Papers: Deception and Survival in the Holocaust, will speak during the community's annual Yom Hashoah service and program on Monday, May 2 at 7 p.m. at the Rifkin Campus at 5200.

During the program sponsored by the <u>Jewish Federation</u> <u>of Fort Wayne</u>, Melson will share his family's experience surviving the Holocaust by taking on false identities that enabled them to disguise themselves as a Polish family

of noble lineage for the duration of the war. Melson is Professor Emeritus at Purdue University, where he taught political science and was a charter member of the Jewish Studies program. In 2003-2005, he was President of the International Association of Genocide Scholars. A reception will follow the service.

THE OMER: PREPARATION FOR TRANSITION



Late last month, we celebrated the festival of Passover. During 49 days, beginning on the second day of Passover, many Jews observe the ritual of s'firat ha'omer, or the counting the Omer. The term omer means "barley sheaf," and refers to the barley offering that was brought to the Temple in Jerusalem on the second day of Passover. Five weeks later, on Shavu'ot, two loaf

offerings were brought to the Temple. The period of the counting of the omer was a time of celebrating agricultural abundance.

Many of us, now removed from the work in the fields, find the meaning of the counting of the omer foreign. But one might "reconstruct" its significance by thinking about the *omer* as a period of spiritual growth. We can take this time to look inward, as we prepare symbolically to journey from the Exodus to the moment of Revelation at Mount Sinai. Traditionally, we received the Torah during Shavu'ot (lit. "weeks,"), that is seven weeks after Passover. It is a well-established tradition to read a tractate from the Mishnah called Pirkei Avot. (lit. "the ethical principles") during the period of the counting of the *omer* as a preparation for Shavuot, which we'll observe at our service on Friday, June 10.

Symbolically, certainly, but this year the counting of omer takes a different tone for me. I will be moving and the journey ahead is filled with uncertainly and hope. This omer also marks the counting of my last days serving as your rabbi. The omer is a period of transition for all of us; a source of anxiety for you and me. It is important that we stay focused and grounded in our traditional wisdom; that we find time to study and reconsider our life paths.

As I think about this year's omer, a text keeps coming back to my mind. In Pirke Avot 4:1, Ben Zoma teaches: "Who is the wise one? He who learns from all people, as it says, "I have acquired understanding from all my teachers" (Psalms 119:99). I know that I have learned as much, or, perhaps, more than I have taught. Only time will tell, but I am certain that your words of wisdom, your good deeds and your commitment to Jewish living will be a source of inspiration as I pursue the next chapter in my rabbinic journey.

By encouraging us to read Pirkei Avot, the ancient rabbis have signaled that the counting of the *omer* is a time to ponder the moral teachings of our sages, and to find in them meaning for ourselves; meaning that will help us move forward in diverging paths.


