HIDDUR MITZVAH ON SHABBAT



Last April when artist Tobi Kahn visited Fort Wayne, we learned about the concept of *hiddur mitzvah* – embellishing a mitzvah through aesthetics. As an artist making Jewish art, Kahn puts this into practice through his work. *Hiddur mitzvah* is not the province of artists and Jewish leaders alone. Every

Jew is called upon to embellish our Jewish practice, so that it appeals to the senses and the heart.

Our candlesticks, our *Hanukkiyot*, our *kippot* and *tallit*, they are all expressions of *hiddur mitzvah*. Furnishing our sanctuaries with the finest fabrics and materials is another prime example. (Another example, not quite as lofty, is our new bathrooms ... if you been inside one, you know what I mean!)

As much as I would like to believe that the size, design or high-end finishes of a sanctuary determined what kind of worship experience we have, in truth, the Jewish vibrancy of a service is determined by those attending (and perhaps leading it), and how welcome and comfortable they feel.

Many synagogues have strict policies about appropriate attire. Here is an example, “Please avoid very short skirts, sleeveless clothing or evening wear, flip-flop shoes, jeans, and exposed midribs.” By definition every “dress code” is meant to exclude some people –it means that some would not be welcome (that they do not “serve everyone”).

I cannot condone *any* dress code for our worship services. On the other hand, I am not advocating that anyone come in “disrespectful” attire. However, imposing on others our own standards of what constitute “aesthetically pleasing” attire is neither *shabbesdik* nor an exercise of *hiddur mitzvah*.

During the summer months we all tend to “dress down.” Weather permitting, some of our services will be outdoors, and may include our canine friends, yet Shabbat still needs to be a “special” time of the week. I invite everyone to consider wearing something “nicer” than what you would normally wear the rest of the week. At Goldman Union Camp Institute, Jewish campers are taught that, for Shabbat, they are to wear clean nice clothes –how they manage (and they do) to look so nice on Erev Shabbat remains a mystery. It is the miracle of Shabbat!

You are welcome, always, no matter what you wear. I want you to consider wearing something that feels special (different in a nice way) to you. I recognize that what we wear for Shabbat can be influenced by the place where we hold services as well as by the tone of the service, but ultimately, the most meaningful worship experience happens when, looking over (and above) our differences, everyone feels welcome and willing to partake in our “special” weekly opportunity to continue building community.

EXCITING YEAR AHEAD FOR MADGE ROTHSCHILD RESOURCE CENTER

At a special congregational meeting on May 12, Temple members unanimously approved moving forward on construction of the Madge Rothschild Resource Center, the centerpiece of our new Rifkin Campus at 5200. Groundbreaking for the \$1.07 million project is expected in October.

“It’s gratifying to have reached this stage in the project after having worked on it from concept through strategic planning and then fundraising through design,” said John Stein, who co-chairs the Rifkin Campus at 5200 project with Sally Trotter. “Now that the plan is funded, we have an exciting year ahead as we move from bidding to building and then outfitting the new addition. This year will be the ideal run-up to the grand opening of our Madge Rothschild Resource Center next summer.”

Architect Richard Wismer shared his design for the project that will include flexible space and walls to accommodate meetings and classes of different sizes up to 40 or 50 people, as well as house the new Rabbi Richard B. Safran Library and the Jacob L. Goldman Memorial Museum. A children’s story pit, computer work stations, large screens for presentations, and a coffee bar are part of the plans. (See the plans at www.templecav.org.)

An 1,100-square foot outdoor courtyard will be visible from the new Resource Center, the Religious School wing, and the Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne offices, with the potential for developing a sculpture garden in the next phase.

Following further design work, bids for construction will be reviewed over the summer by the Temple’s Building Oversight Committee for anticipated board approval in September. Construction is expected to take six to eight months, with a soft opening in mid-summer and the grand opening in Fall 2016.

A new sign in front of the Temple near Old Mill Road will be designed by [Sculptor Cary Shafer](#), with installation this summer and a dedication in August. Created from stone and bronze, the sign will include the Madge Rothschild Resource Center and the Rifkin Campus partners: Congregation Achduth Vesholom, the Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne, the Fort Wayne Jewish Cemetery Association, and Temple Head Start. We are in discussions with another potential tenant and hope to finalize plans soon.

Generous donations for the Temple’s project for the future include \$1 million from the Rifkin Family Foundation, \$500,000 from the Madge Rothschild Foundation, \$150,000 from the Dr. Louis and Anne B. Schneider Foundation, and \$16,000 from the AWS Foundation. Temple members and friends contributed \$215,300, while the congregation has earmarked \$190,000 for the project. The total amount raised from foundations and individuals is more than \$2.07 million.

This summer we will complete renovations to create a new Religious School office and a space for Thoughtful Thursdays in what currently is the kindergarten classroom. Both were part of the last phase and funding in 2014, but were not able to be completed before Head Start students returned last fall.

At 3,150 square feet, the Resource Center proper will be about 3.5 times larger than our previous library/museum. The main entrance will be through a long hallway to be created to the left of and encompassing the former Temple Gift Shop space. Plans to enhance the hallway include displays, photographs, and a donor wall to recognize those who have contributed to the Campus at 5200 Capital Campaign.

The Rifkin Campus at 5200 was developed as part of Achduth Vesholom’s vision for the future to bring together Jewish organizations in one location for greater visibility and opportunities to combine resources, assets, and energies in a symbiotic relationship.

The Resource Center will highlight the Jewish Experience in Northeast Indiana over the past two centuries and will promote Holocaust Education as we strive for greater understanding among all faiths and people.

Head Start’s playground will be moved closer to the south parking lot. The Sposeep Outdoor Chapel will remain in its current location.
