PRAYER FROM THE HEART



We are fast approaching the High Holy Days, my second in this community. This is a time of year of retrospection, prayer, and a look to the future for all Jews. Different communities use different prayer books. Different communities use different prayers, different melodies, and have many different customs.

This reminded me of a midrash: Sefer Hasidim, a medieval pietistic work, tells a story of a Jewish shepherd who, when he went out to the field each day would offer up a heartfelt prayer: "Master of the Universe! It is revealed and known to You that if You had animals and gave them to me to protect, although I take wages from all others, from You I would take nothing because I love You."

One day, a knowledgeable student of Torah walked passed the shepherd and saw the shepherd engaged in his spontaneous prayer. The student rebuked the shepherd, "Fool, do not pray like that!" The shepherd queried, "How then should I pray?" The student taught the shepherd the words of the Amidah and the Shema.

After the student left, the shepherd forgot all that had been taught and so was even afraid to say his prayer of the heart. One evening, a messenger of God appeared before the stu-

dent and rebuked him for quelling the passionate, spontaneous prayer of one of God's devoted servants:

"If you do not tell him to say what he was accustomed to before you arrived, know that sorrow will overtake you. For you have robbed me of one who belongs to the world to come." The student returned to the shepherd and urged him to recite his heartfelt prayer of old. The author of Sefer Hasidim concludes, "for God desires the heart" (Sefer Hasidim, 5-6).

While fixed prayer is important and central to who we are as Jews, it is only meaningful when it is ignited by the passionate prayer of the heart and soul, the kavanah, which serves as the unique signature to each of our prayers.

Each of us does avodah in our own special way. While Judaism provides a framework, it is up to each of us to provide the soul. Maimonides challenges us to serve God through obligatory prayer; Nahmanides encourages us to give heed to the heart and soul in that same avodah. The challenge is to combine both of these approaches as we develop and practice our modern form of Judaism in a heartfelt and genuine way.

As we prepare next month for the start of 5778, I wanted to wish all a very Happy New Year and encourage you to not only participate through our prayer books, but to send prayers of your heart to God this upcoming High Holy Days season.

CONGREGANTS INVITED FOR GREEN OAK FARM TOUR ON SEPTEMBER 10

In 2010, Temple members Andy & Janet Katz purchased a five-acre lot on Eggeman Road in southwest Fort Wayne. The site was flat and sunny, perfect for a large garden and orchards, and also for solar panels.

With architect Tim Gray of Ball State University and Crane Builders from Indianapolis, they designed and built their home, Green Oak Farm – named for the food they wanted to grow, the oak trees on the property, and the home's environmentally friendly features.

The Katzes moved into their home in May 2016. Though some work is still ongoing, they look forward to welcoming Achduth Vesholom members to visit [Green Oak Farm](#), 3819 Eggeman Road, on Sunday, September 10 from 2 to 5 p.m. for an open house arranged by the Temple's Adult Education Committee.

The home was built as part of Andy & Janet's longstanding commitment to the environment and tikkun olam (repairing the

world). They hope to be ready to apply for LEED (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design) Certification this fall, aiming for Gold Certification.



Visitors will be able to take a self-guided tour of the home, and Andy & Janet will be happy to answer questions and provide more detailed explanations of the home's green features. This program is geared for adults and youth age 10 and older. Space is limited, so please RSVP to the Temple office by Wednesday, September 6.

*There is parking for about 15 cars along the driveway, and parking is not allowed on Eggeman Road. Those who live nearby are encouraged to walk or ride their bikes, as the home is directly on the Aboite Trail. Visitors can also park in the parking lot at the Aboite Township Trustee Community Center at 11321 Aboite Center Road and walk along the Aboite Trail about 0.25 miles to the house.

PICK UP A DVD FOR MOVIE NIGHT!

Thanks to the generous donation of materials from the [Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne](#), we now have more than 100 DVDs available for borrowing in the Rabbi Richard B. Safran Library.

The Federation collected a large number of classic films through the Jewish Heritage Video Collection, and has now shared them with our library to make them available to the community. We hope you'll take advantage of this wonderful resource. All members of our congregation, Congregation B'nai Jacob, and the Jewish Federation are welcome to borrow materials.

The films in our collection range from comedies such as "Annie Hall" and "Chariots of Fire," to dramas like "Au Revoir Les Enfants" and "Avalon." There are numerous Holocaust titles, including "Schindler's List," "Europa, Europa," and "Warsaw Ghetto Uprising."

In addition to Holocaust documentaries, other non-fiction films

include "Arguing the World" about Irving Howe and three other Jewish New York intellectuals, and "A Tickle in the Heart," about Klezmer music legends, the Epstein brothers. We have biographies of Anne Frank, Marc Chagall, Yitzhak Rabin and Adin Steinsaltz.



If you're looking for family movies, along with some of the classics, we have a large collection of Shalom Sesame videos, as well "An American Tail," "Fliegel's Flight" and "Joseph: King of Dreams."

Although most of our movies have come through the donations of the Jewish Federation, we have begun to acquire a few on our own. We welcome contributions of any gently-used Jewish films on DVD, as well as music CDs and audio books on CD.



NEWS FROM THE TEMPLE'S 169TH ANNUAL MEETING

President Joe Cohen shared highlights of the past year on June 14 with the congregation during a time of new beginnings and transitions, including a new spiritual leader, staffing changes, the opening of the new Madge Rothschild Resource Center, and other innovations.

Since the last congregational meeting, we bid farewell to Rabbi Cattapan and Kris Gray. We welcomed Rabbi Lenny and Karen Sarko to our congregation. We introduced [TempleConnect](#), our video-conferencing option for worship services, classes, and programming. We added a Talmud class and weekly Torah reading.

Adult education programming included a mah jongg workshop and Temple Book Club. Our social action efforts included a Hot Topics Shabbat and statements in favor of welcoming refugees. The new Rabbi Richard B. Safran Library is thriving in its new home in the resource center and has many new titles received through Betty's 100 Books in honor of Betty Stein's 100th birthday last December. Our new museum focusing on 200 years of Jewish history in Northeast Indiana is under development.

Joe noted many changes on the staffing side: Mindy Esparza became our new administrative assistant in February, succeeding Bonnie Pomerantz; Sally Trotter retired on June 30 as Temple Administrator, with Samara Sheray beginning the position in July. He said we are fortunate that Bonnie Crubaugh remains as our bookkeeper and Clint Rossiter continues as Maintenance Chief.

Our Religious School provided a great Jewish education under the direction of Religious School Committee Chair Ellen Tom with Rabbi Lenny. We continue to look for a new principal, but will rely on our Religious School Committee to ensure a smooth and enriching year ahead.

We welcomed IPFW's Institute for Holocaust and Genocide Studies as our newest Campus Partner. A generous donation from the Cohen and Sposeep families led to a renovation of our outdoor Sposeep Chapel. We continue to raise funds through the relatively new Temple Gardens Fund.

Thoughtful Thursdays continued to serve the Brightpoint Head Start group of 72 students and their families, bringing together volunteers from the Temple, B'nai Jacob and the Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne.

During our 15th annual Corned Beef Fundraiser, we sold 1,100 sandwiches, raised \$15,000 and had 62 sponsors for the sale led by Larry Adelman, Jaki Schreier, and Steve Zacher. He asked all members to plan now to help with our 16th annual event and largest fundraiser on Thursday, November 9.

As Joe completed his second and final year as president, he thanked everyone who helped make these and other activities possible.

Finances

Treasurer Irv Adler reported that we had three goals for the past year: to manage the budget, to monitor the effectiveness of our restructured portfolio, and to initiate a Temple operations study project. He said we began the year projecting a small deficit, but ended the year with

a surplus. We had unanticipated gains in contributions, a new renter, savings on Temple and Religious School salaries, and other factors. He also discussed the projected decrease in dues collection for the coming fiscal year.

The congregation approved the fiscal year 2017-2018 budget of \$421,296, which includes a projected deficit of \$6,867 that Irv said is manageable due to special reserve funds. He said the two largest risks in the coming year are not reaching our fundraising goal of \$20,000 and a continued drop in dues income. A restructuring of our investment portfolio in the past year and our Endowment Fund are helping to support the budget.

Operations Study

The Temple has received a \$7,300 grant from the Center for Congregations to study the operational and financial procedures of the congregation, with an additional \$7,300 from the Zweig Fund and \$161 from the Temple operating budget to cover the \$14,761 cost of the project

Irv said the project, which started in May, looks at our organization to assess what we've been doing and determine whether we have a better way to operate as we deal with changes to our congregation and the need to increase revenue. We are working with two consulting firms - Andorfer LLC for the accounting work and the team of Impact Strategies/Whittle Consulting for the operational work. The study should be complete by the third quarter of 2017.

The new Board of Directors was elected in June. See page 13 for details.

Cindi Wismer is sometimes called "the matzah ball maven" or the "Oneg Queen." If we have any sort of food-related occasion, whether Rosh Hashanah reception or Hanukkah dinners, she's usually involved.

For more than a decade, Cindi served as Oneg Shabbat coordinator. She also chaired the congregational

Passover Seder many times and, even when she hasn't, she's usually whipped up a couple hundred perfectly formed matzah balls for the occasion.

Yet it's not just her culinary and organizational skills that led Cindi to be honored with the William Brosler Award for Outstanding Volunteerism. It's the many years of being involved in numerous ways.

"Growing up in Fort Wayne allowed me to be mentored and learn from some of the very best, many of whom still spend long hours giving of their time for the benefit of the congregation," she said. "I learned from an early age there is no aspect of giving of oneself that isn't needed or appreciated, regardless of how one volunteers their energy...including their opinions, leadership skills, and friendly face visiting and comforting those in need."

For many years, Cindi taught in our Religious School, inspiring Jewish learning and preparing kindergarten kids for Consecration. She has served on the Temple Board and multiple Rabbinic Transition Committees. Cindi is an active member of the Communications Committee and keeps the Temple's Facebook fans up to date.

Several summers ago, she created Muzzle Tov Shabbat to recognize our canine friends and celebrate with a dog-inspired Oneg Shabbat. For many summers, she and her husband, Richard, have donated the challahs we serve during all summer Onegs.

Cindi is very involved with Thoughtful Thursdays and most recently chaired the reception for the grand opening of the beautiful Madge Rothschild Resource Center.

Her daughter, Codi Goodis, said Cindi has passed along many lessons, especially advising that "you do things because it's the right thing to do, not because you want a 'thank you.' This doesn't ring more true than her volunteerism at the Temple."

Codi said her grandmother Berenice Smith shared that lesson with her mother and she hopes to pass it along to her children, too.

Cindi's son, Lev Wismer, said his mother taught him that it was important to help without seeking recognition. "If more people dedicated themselves to a cause with the same level of commitment and passion as my mother, the world would be a much better place," he said.

Sally Trotter probably knows more about congregational finances and personalities than anyone around. During 40 years as a member, she's served Achduth Vesholom in numerous ways as a volunteer, a role she continued with enthusiasm even during 11 years as our Temple Administrator.

name was called," Sally said. "My service to the Temple has been a labor of love and being a Brosler Award recipient is an honor I will treasure always."



MEMBER SPOTLIGHT: IRV ADLER

FAMILY JOURNEY FOR ANSWERS CONTINUES IN VIENNA AND MINSK/MALY TROSTENETS

During a well-attended program in June at the Temple, long-time congregant Irv Adler shared his journey through Holocaust records seeking information about his grandmother and family members. He talked about the relatives he lost – and those he's found – through his work.



[His research](#) was inspired by about 100 letters written from 1938 to 1941 by his grandmother Clara Bader Nichtern to his mother, Elsa Nichtern. His grandmother lived in Vienna before she was murdered in June 1942 by the Nazis at the [Maly Trostinets](#) death camp outside of Minsk. Irv provided this update on his recent trip to Vienna and Minsk/Maly Trostenets:

On May 14, I left Fort Wayne with my wife, Fran, and our very close family friend Carol Jackson, who has been deeply involved in our ["Letters"](#) project, to start what became an emotional two-week journey to Vienna and Minsk/Maly Trostenets.

We visited the site where my grandmother Clara Bader Nichtern was deported and later murdered by the Nazis. I dedicated a "Stone of Remembrance" at the last known address of my uncle and cousin, Leon and Markus Bader, before they were deported and murdered.

After spending a few days in Vienna taking in some of the sites and doing additional research on my "Letters" project (e.g., I verified that I had relatives that lived in Sigmund Freud's house after he left Vienna), we traveled to Minsk/Maly Trostenets.

Fran, Carol, and I were part of an organized group (IM-MER Association) of 21 persons. During the afternoon of May 23, the group went to the "History Workshop" in Minsk to hear riveting testimonies from four survivors of the Minsk ghetto. They talked about the atrocities they lived through, the many family members they lost, and how they managed to survive against impossible odds.

The next day on May 24, we went to Maly Trostenets, which is located on the Southeastern edge of Minsk, about 15 km from Minsk-Center. Ten thousand Jews from Vienna were among the 400,000 men, women, and children murdered at Maly Trostenets, including my grandmother, who was killed on June 15, 1942.

Our group, which included a Rabbi and a Cantor, carried out a deeply moving funeral service for 61 Viennese Jews murdered there. A eulogy was read aloud for each of them. Then we went into the killing field and attached yellow plaques to trees to symbolically

represent gravestone markers. A permanent memorial with the names of all the Jews murdered at Maly Trostenets is planned at the site in the near future.



That afternoon we went to the commemorative monuments at [Katyn](#). Katyn was a village of 26 houses and 156 inhabitants, 50 km due west of Minsk-Center. On March 22, 1943, the entire population of the village was massacred by the Nazis and their collaborators. The Katyn monuments memorialize the impact of the Holocaust on Belarus; the 500 villages that were burned to the ground, of which 186 are gone forever; the villages where pogroms occurred, which was every village in Belarus; and finally, the 2.4 million Belarusians that died during the Holocaust, about 1/3 of the population.

Later that week, we returned to Vienna for the "Stone of Remembrance" dedication for my uncle and cousin, who were deported from the apartment where they lived with my grandmother for 3 ½ years. On March 12, 1941, Leon (#229) and Markus (#300) were put on Transport 5 and deported with 997 Jewish men, women

and children to Lagow/Opatow, Poland. The ghettos of Lagow/Opatow were liquidated by the Nazis during October 20-22, 1942. Leon and Markus either died before or during the liquidation, or were sent to and killed at an extermination camp, probably Treblinka. There are no records of what happened to them: not even the date of their death.

Traveling to Vienna and Maly Trostenets provided a way for me to get some closure. It gave me the chance to give my grandmother the funeral service she never had.

As was the case with my grandmother ([see "Temple Bulletin" August 2014](#)), I dedicated a Stone of Remembrance for Leon and Markus Bader. By doing so, they have a grave marker with their names on it so that they don't disappear from our collective memories.

I plan to continue doing research on the "Letters" to put them into historical context and to provide a diary of my grandmother's life under Nazi oppression. I want to describe what a wonderful person she was - and how, even under incredibly difficult conditions, she always maintained a cheerful and positive attitude. She tried not to burden my mother, who was living in England and then in the U.S.A., with the miseries that she dealt with daily.

If my efforts lead to what becomes a diary of the life of the wonderful grandmother I never knew and that I can share with my family and others, then I will have accomplished a most worthwhile and meaningful life goal.



PRESIDENT'S CORNER

ELLEN TOM



"Doing Jewish" has always been an important part of my life, having grown up at Congregation B'nai Jacob, where my parents were members and where my brother, Kevin, and I celebrated our B'nei Mitzvot. After moving away from "The Fort" for a brief time to Texas, I returned, married to Mick and with our first child, Lauren, as my husband established his dental career. Our son, Ryan, was born shortly thereafter.

In 2001, our family joined the Temple and the Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne, and enrolled Lauren in Religious School. I also began my "career" as a volunteer, helping in the Religious School (where I eventually taught), as well as getting involved with social and religious programs. At the same time, our children were growing up "doing Jewish." They both participated in the Temple Youth Group and one attended Goldman Union Camp Institute and also worked as camp counselor at Camp Joe Levine.

Upon retiring from teaching, I served the past few years as the Religious School Committee Chair and Principal. As an elected board member, I participated on the Grant Oversight Committee, Financial Planning Committee, Rabbinical Search Committee, as well as others, and now as Temple president.

I've found that one of the most rewarding aspects of being involved at the Temple is the opportunity to build relationships.
