AUTHOR TO SPEAK ABOUT NAZI GRANDFATHER



Jennifer Teege, author of *My Grandfather Would Have Shot Me: A Black Woman Discovers Her Family's Nazi Past*, will speak on Monday, August 17 at 7 p.m. at the Allen County Public Library Downtown.

The program is sponsored by the Temple's Holocaust Education Committee in partnership with the IPFW Center for Holocaust and Genocide Studies, and the ACPL Genealogy Department.

Teege, a German-born black woman who was given up for adoption as a child, chronicles in the book the shocking discovery that her maternal grandfather was Amon Goeth, the brutal Nazi commander portrayed in Steven Spielberg's film, "Schindler's List."

WELCOME TO OUR NEW MACHZOR



Introducing a new prayer book is a unique challenge for every congregation, but it is also a momentous occasion that happens only once in the tenure of a rabbi – if at all! *Gates of Repentance* (published in 1978) was a wonderful innovation in its time, but after four decades, it began to show its limitations. The fact that it does not include transliteration is a stumbling block for many in our communities. So too, many of today's Jews feel disconnected from prayer and from theological and ideological concepts as found in *Gates of Repentance* that do not seem consistent with a contemporary sensibility. The new *machzor* (High Holy Days prayer book) is called [Mishkan Hanefesh](#), literally, "Sanctuary of the Soul," in reference to the centrality of the individual as a theme of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur.

In recent decades, the Reform movement has moved towards embracing traditional forms of worship while at the same time responding to new ways of speaking about God and ourselves. Getting used to the new *machzor* will take time and flexibility.

There are two main features that we need to point out. First, the new *machzor* continues *Mishkan T'filah's* approach of what is sometimes known as "integrated theology." This means that the majority of the book features the "two-page" spread design wherein the right side reflects a more faithful rendering of the standard prayers, and the left side a more creative theological approach. Some sections of the service (or in the case of *Yizkor* or *Avodah*, the entire service) are linear and have no two-page spreads.

Secondly, the right side translations are "faithful" but not literal, recognizing there is no way to literally render a word from Hebrew into English. The best one can do is a translation that reflects both a sense of the Hebrew and the nuance of English. Since liturgical language is poetic language based heavily on metaphor, this kind of approach is far more effective than a straight, literal translation would be.

There is much more to learn about the new *machzor*, and I hope that you will choose to join me during some of the Adult Learning opportunities we offer in the weeks leading to the Rosh Hashanah. They will help all of us to be more familiar with the new *machzor* as well as to refresh our memory about the High Holy Days (see page 2).

The new *machzor* will incorporate more Hebrew and traditional liturgy as well as gender-neutral language. Our needs, however, go beyond transliterations and gender-neutral language. So it does more: It attempts to address our contemporary need to reinterpret the basic meaning of the holidays. It is not enough to simply remove the traditional passages which we may find objectionable (as previous prayer books have done). Instead, we must find new meaning in old prayers.

Mishkan HaNefesh gives both the prayer leader and the community a wealth of resources for finding new meaning in these High Holy Days. The new *machzor* has updated translations, new readings, and poetry, as well as easily accessible transliteration. The new *machzor* is the product of countless volunteer hours on the part of many clergy and lay-leaders of our movement, who have worked hard to make it possible. It is, however, not perfect. We do not have to agree with every editorial decision nor with my interpretation of how to use the new *machzor*. I sincerely hope that it will become an opportunity to think anew and examine how we relate to the major challenges which Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur represent: Our complacency and lack of compassion towards others, towards the Jewish people and to ourselves.

JAN SARRATORE RECEIVES BROSLEK AWARD

Since arriving in Fort Wayne nearly 30 years ago, Jan Sarratore has lived an active Jewish life with her family. In fact, her husband, Steve, said they bought a house near the Temple so distance would never be a reason to say “no.” Jan has been involved in just

about every activity at Achduth Vesholom for as long as she’s been a Hoosier – and she shows no signs of slowing down.

Jan was honored for her service to the congregation in June at the Temple’s Annual Meeting with the William Brosler Award for Outstanding Volunteerism. A few days later, she also was recognized by the Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne with the Goldie DuBow Award for her many volunteer contributions.

“I don’t do any of the things I do for recognition,” she said. “I enjoy every organization I work with and hope that I’m contributing positively to their mission in some small way. I’ve learned so much from each one and have met so many interesting people.”

A member of the Temple board and chair of the Adult Education Committee, Jan also creates the educational items for Thoughtful Thursdays and works regularly with the Temple Head Start parents and staff. She is involved with the Rifkin Campus at 5200 project as director of the new Madge Rothschild Resource Center.

She organized our popular Yiddish class, represents the Temple on the Northeast Indiana LGBTQ Coalition and Habitat for Humanity, and has worked on joint projects with the Unitarian Universalist Congregation of Fort Wayne, including the Faith & Politics series. And those are just her recent contributions to the Temple.

Those who work closely with Jan know that she’s even busier now that she’s retired from teaching. She’s usually dashing from a Temple meeting to another volunteer commitment wearing a nametag or t-shirt for the next event.

In addition to serving as secretary of the Jewish Federation board, Jan volunteers with the Fort Wayne Children’s Zoo, the Embassy Theater, Women United, Fort Wayne Association for the Education of Young Children, and Little River Wetlands Project. She recently was nominated for the 2015 YWCA Peggy Hobbs Service Award.

Steve, her husband of 40 years, explains that the biggest impact from Jan’s involvement at the Temple and in the community is that she’s a “connecting force,” someone who gets involved, assists with communications, and links people to people, organizations to organizations.

Her daughter Alana, who lives in New Jersey with her husband Greg Mulford and 3-year-old son, Austin, calls her a “real role model.” Jan’s son, Andrew, who lives in California with his wife, Lindsey, calls his mother “an inspiration. Both say they were taught the value of volunteering from a young age and “shown what it meant to be part of something bigger than ourselves.”

NEWS FROM THE 167TH ANNUAL MEETING

President Hod Hefer on June 10 shared highlights of the past year with the congregation, including the very successful Capital Campaign that raised \$2.07 million for the new Rifkin Campus at 5200 and Madge Rothschild Resource Center.

In addition, he said, we also restructured the Religious School, rebranded Temple communications and upgraded the website, offered a variety of adult education opportunities from Learning Havdalas to Yiddish class, and completed a fifth year of Thoughtful Thursdays. We bid farewell to the Professional Choir and welcomed Suellen Kipp as our musical accompanist.

Hod noted that we finished our first year with the Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne and the Jewish Cemetery Association of Fort Wayne as our Campus partners with Temple Head Start. We also offered Safe Space Training to members to learn about welcoming the LGBTQ community and co-sponsored an exhibit called “Nazi Persecution of Homosexuals.” And our 13th annual Corned Beef fundraiser included bulk food items.

On a bittersweet note, Hod shared with the congregation that he had accepted a job promotion with Sam’s Club as Manager of Membership and Sales for 13 clubs. He and his family are relocating to Indianapolis. The Executive Committee presented Hod with a mezuzah purchased in Tsfat, Israel, for the Hefers’ new home on behalf of the congregation

Board Member Steve Trotter received a gift in appreciation for his six years of service. We also recognized the 41 members of the L’dor Vador Legacy Society for making arrangements for a planned gift to the congregation.

Rabbi Cattapan shared information about the new High Holy Days *machzorim* and results of two focus groups held to help envision our upcoming Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur services. In general, he said, we will move away from having a professional choir and adopt a more participatory approach with a focus on congregational melodies.

Rifkin Campus at 5200 Co-Chairs John Stein and Sally Trotter provided a timeline for the project. Architect Richard Wismer is working on the specifications for the bidding process. Ground-breaking is expected in October, with a 6- to 8-month building window. A soft opening is planned in spring 2016.
