**GROUNDBREAKING AND SIGN
DEDICATION FOR RIFKIN CAMPUS**

Please join us on Thursday, October 1 at 8:30 a.m. when we break ground on the new \$1.07 million Madge Rothschild Resource Center and dedicate the Rifkin

Campus at 5200 sign.

The centerpiece of our project is the Madge Rothschild Resource Center, which is set to open in Fall 2016. Designed by Architect Richard Wismer, the 3,150-square-foot space will focus on the Jewish Experience in Northeast Indiana over the past two centuries, as well as Holocaust education, and will include museum and library space. Plans include an 1,100-square-foot inner courtyard with proposed sculpture garden visible from the Resource Center.

The new sign along Old Mill Road features the names of the Temple and our Campus Partners: the Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne, the Fort Wayne Jewish Cemetery Association, the Madge Rothschild Resource Center, and long-time resident Brightpoint Head Start.

Created from stone and bronze, the new sign was designed by Sculptor Cary Shafer, who describes it this way: "Limestone panels and columns mimic the Temple's limestone facade. Negative spaces are integral to the design, separating each tenant plaque, allowing the eye to move from cube to cube, space to space, with ever-changing background scenes." The structure consists of 8,000 pounds of Indiana Limestone, cold rolled steel, and bronze panels, each element fabricated using local resources.

ISRAEL: THREE THINGS ON WHICH WE ALL AGREE



As a synagogue, we are called to learn and to pray together, with those who agree with us, as well as with those who don't. We must find areas in which we agree about Israel, and join our voices in prayer. The issue of Iran is not over, nor is the continuous de-legitimization of Israel occurring on college campuses across North America as well as at many international forums.

In this New Year, more than ever, we must find common ground among our people and show our unyielding support for a Jewish and democratic State of Israel. There is hope, because we should be able to agree on at least three points about Israel, if not more.

Firstly, American Jews care deeply about Israel. The 2013 Pew Research Center poll concludes that we are "emotionally very attached" (30%) or "somewhat attached" (39%) to Israel. These findings closely resemble results from the last National Jewish Population Survey in 2000-2001. Yet it is hard to ascertain from a survey what "emotionally very attached" means. It is hard to explain because it's emotional. We need to be able to articulate it, so we can be an advocate of Israel in our family, and among our friends, both Jewish and non-Jewish. Expressing our emotional connection to Israel helps Israel and her people.

Secondly, we all believe that American Jews and Israeli Jews should share common values about the centrality of democracy and civil rights. We must agree that the same value placed on civil rights by American Jews, in our own country, must be expected from Israelis as well. Our early Reformers saw the mission of the Jewish people as being "a light unto the Nations." That message is still valid. We pray that our brothers and sisters in Israel never lose track of that mission and that Israelis will join us in demanding civil rights for all.

Finally, we need to be seekers of peace. We read in *Pirke Avot*, the famous *Ethics of the Fathers*, "Hillel says: Be of the disciples of Aaron, *ohav shalom*, loving peace and *rodef shalom*, pursuing peace, loving the creatures and bringing them closer to Torah." *Ohev shalom*, loving peace, is what our Sages teach, but that does not stand on its own. We must also be seekers of peace; we must actively do something to bring peace about.

I know we all like to disagree on Jewish matters, and it is healthy to do so at some level. Yet, our Sages knew very well that there is such a thing as "too much dissent," especially among our own people. The Talmud teaches that the Second Temple was destroyed because of *sinat chinam*, "gratuitous hatred," among Jews. The historical reality might have been different—the Temple was destroyed because the Romans decided to make the Jews an example of what happens when you defy the Empire. But our Sages found a deeper meaning in the tragedy: We must never let internal struggles and hatred divide us, not then, not now.

Each of us, in our position in life and within the Jewish community, must be a *rodef shalom*, a bringer of peace and harmony among people. If each one of us tries our best to be that true disciple of Aaron by sowing harmony and not discord among our people, I know good things will happen in this New Year. At the beginning of a New Year, we are called to be open to compassion and forgiveness, so we pray for peace and understanding. We pray that 5776 and the years to follow will be a time of peace for ALL people, but especially for our beloved State of Israel.

ROMEOS: BUILDING COMMUNITY ONE MEAL AT A TIME

The Retired Old Men Eating Out guys, contrary to their name, do more than dine together.

Beyond the socializing at a different restaurant every other week, the ROMEOs regularly collect tzedakah and for three years running have chaired the Temple's annual Break-the-Fast.

Richard Manalis, who co-chaired this year's Yom Kippur event with Norm Greenberg, said the ROMEOs feel they are helping the Temple function by providing an opportunity for our congregants to experience community while eating delicious food.

"At one of our lunches, I recounted my fond memories of past Break-the-Fasts -- when (Past President) Linda Kaplan was involved -- and recalled the golden brown blintzes," he said. "Then Chuck (Replane) suggested the ROMEOs take on the challenge of sponsoring and creating the event. The rest is history."

Chuck notes that Rabbi Cattapan, who often joins the group for lunch, originally asked the ROMEOs to consider preparing the traditional meal. Once they agreed, camaraderie came along with the culinary duties.

About 21 men, mostly retired and all Temple members, are part of the ROMEOs, with about 8-10 usually attending lunch on a given week. The group formed four years ago.

Since the Temple does not have a Men's Club, Chuck organized the group as an opportunity for Jewish men age 65 and older to share experiences, stories, and jokes, as well as to help each other out when there was a need and to support worthy causes with their tzedakah.

Rich said that each ROMEO contributes about \$2 or \$3 per lunch, with the monies used to cover the expenses for the Break-the-Fast. The ROMEOs were formally recognized by the Temple board in September as an "affiliated" organization. While the ROMEOs remain autonomous, the dollars they raise are kept in a fund at the Temple for specific purposes, such as the Break-the-Fast. What other events might the ROMEOs host in the future?

"No one really knows," said Rich, who also serves as the Temple's Membership Committee chair. "There has been some talk of a spaghetti dinner for the Temple. The feeling that most of us have is that, since we are retired, we want to sponsor events that we truly believe in and that we would enjoy doing."
