Please join us when we welcome the <u>New Year 5785</u> as a community, with both Reform and Conservative minyanim worshiping together as one congregation on Erev Rosh Hashanah on Wednesday, October 2 and on Kol Nidre on Friday, October 11.



Rabbi Meir Bargeron will lead the services, weaving together aspects of both liturgical traditions to inspire new insights during this time of reflection, forgiveness, and renewal. HOT TOPICS SHABBAT FOCUSES ON FOOD INSECURITY

Picture this: you go to Kroger for your weekly shopping trip and pile the cart high with all the items on your list and a couple of other things that just looked good. Price? Somewhere north of \$100.

Or you stop by The Fresh Market and pick up just what you need for dinner that night, including fresh meat, a vegetable, rosemary crusted bread, and dessert from the bakery. Price? In the neighborhood of \$50.

But there are many people in Fort Wayne who can't afford either plan. In fact, they may not be able to buy fresh meat at all. Or crusty bread. Or especially dessert. These members of our hometown may be dining on a can of Chef Boyardee spaghetti and the cheapest white bread to sop up the extra tomato sauce.

Please join us for Hot Topics Shabbat on Friday, September 20 at 7:30 p.m. to learn more about this important issue impacting so many. Following the service led by Rabbi Meir, we'll learn about food insecurity and the widely used food pantry at Wellspring Interfaith Social Services that allows our fellow citizens to have a daily meal.

Ermina Musteganagic, Wellspring's chief executive officer, will be here to discuss the growing problem of food insecurity, how widespread it is, how it affects your neighbors, and what Wellspring is doing about it.

Stick around after services and get educated on this increasingly horrifying issue. Thank you to the Social Action Committee for hosting the program.

Rabbi Meir Bargeron: OUR STUDIES NEVER END

Now that we are well past "Back to School" in Indiana, the quiet of weekdays between about 8 a.m. and 3 p.m. has returned. Jon and I stopped for lunch recently at a quick service restaurant on a Monday afternoon and had our pick of tables, something that would have been unlikely a few weeks earlier. With our kids back in the classroom, perhaps now is a good moment for us adults to consider our own learning. Last month I described the Jewish obligation to educate our children, and I'd like to continue the conversation by looking at how Jewish tradition guides our own learning as adults.


I think the Jewish position on learning is most clearly stated in Mishnah: "These are the activities for which one enjoys the fruits of in this world but the principle remains for the world to come, honoring one's mother and father, acts of kindness, bringing peace between two people, **yet Torah study is equivalent to them all**." (Peah 1:1). The study of Torah, which can be expanded to include all Jewish learning, is equated to these commandments which have enduring value to humanity. This is not a casual comparison.

Learning Torah is a lifelong obligation, and a lifelong benefit! Rabbi Akiva was a teacher who was called the "Chief of the Sages." His life is held up as an example that it is never too late to begin learning. Rabbi Akiva began to study Torah when he was 40, becoming a teacher of Torah scholars at 80 years old.

Jewish tradition regarding Torah learning can apply to adult learning in general. I am inspired by the commitment to learning of a member of the Temple family. Last year, Terri Richardson of the Fort Wayne Journal Gazette wrote a

powerful profile on our own Alan Grinsfelder, who was at that time "the oldest student (age 87)... enrolled at Purdue Fort Wayne!"

Following a long career as an architect, Alan returned to school to earn a degree in fine arts at PFW in 2020 – and he is still taking classes! Alan's paintings have been exhibited in café and gallery spaces around Fort



Regarding Jewish learning, our sage Ben Bag taught, ""Turn it and turn it again, for everything is within it. Look at it, become gray and old within it, and do not depart from it. For you have nothing greater than it." Judaism is rich in knowledge with which we are commanded to engage our entire lives. As we mature from childhood to old age, our experience of Jewish knowledge evolves with us.

in Minneapolis.


If you would like to decode (read) Hebrew, the class and textbook *Alef Isn't Tough* offers extensive opportunities to learn

Jewish folktale, and features a boy

Our Temple Book Club will meet twice this year to discuss two very different titles. Thanks to the <u>Jewish Book Council</u>, we are able to "LiveChat" with the authors of our books as part of our virtual evening discussion. Our sessions begin at 7 p.m. and the Zoom link is included in the weekly e-mail beforehand. On Tuesday, November 19, we'll meet

with Jennifer Rosner to discuss her novel, <u>Once We Were Home</u>. A finalist for the National Jewish Book Award, the plot

follows two children who were "rescued" from a Polish ghetto by Christian friends. Twenty years later, they are still processing the loss of their losses. From *Hadassah Magazine*, "Rosner's tender prose unearths the depth and

complexity of family, love, religion, identity, memory and home."

On Tuesday, February 25, Lynda Cohen Loigman will join us to discuss *The Matchmaker's Gift*. The plot centers around a Lower East Side matchmaker, Sara, and her granddaughter, Abby. Abby inherits her grandmother's journals after her death. From the Jewish Book Council, "The historical chapters are compelling; the more contemporary ones are equally so. A fascinating narrative."



In 1996, following a successful tour in Central Europe as the primary lyric soprano soloist, she received a BA in Music-Voice from Buffalo State University. Her studies continued at University of North Carolina-Chapel Hill, earning a Master of Arts in Teaching-Music Education in 1999.

While a music teacher at an inner-city school in Durham, North Carolina, Hazzan Myers was a nominee for Teacher of the Year and discovered the Cantorate in Durham, N.C., where she moonlighted as cantorial soloist.

She received her *Hazzan* credential through the Cantors Assembly, a branch of the United Synagogue of Conservative Judaism, the world's largest professional association of Jewish Cantors.

In 2022, Hazzan Myers received her Rabbinic s'michah from Mesifta Adas Wolkowisk/ Rabbinical Academy of America, making her the first dually ordained Jewish clergy in Western New York.

She has performed on the bimah and on grand stages throughout North America, Europe and Israel. She is also a sought-after lecturer with a focus on pedagogical practices within worship and religious school education.

She also teaches and lectures about female clergy, emphasizing the challenges and blessings of how #metoo has affected awareness in Jewish organizations.

Chairperson of the Great Lakes & Rivers Region of the Cantors Assembly, Hazzan Myers is very active in the Cantorate, serving on many committees. She was recently a recipient of the Volunteer of the Year award from the Cantors Assembly.

Hazzan Myers is married to neurologist Dr. Bennett Myers. They have three children: Hunter, Saul, and Corrinne.

She was recommended to Rabbi Meir Bargeron by members of the Conservative High Holy Days Service Leader Search Committee. The committee included Chair Ben Eisbart, Ron Friedman. Josh Tourkow and Bob Walters.

The Mystery of Mrs. Christie, Carnegie's Maid, The Other Einstein, Lady Clementine, Agent 355, Her Hidden Genius, The Mitford Affair, and, with Ms. Murray, the Instant New York Times Bestseller and Good Morning America Book Club pick, The Personal Librarian.

Her most recent novel with co-author Ms. Murray was another Instant New York Times Bestseller, *The First Ladies*. Her newest novella, *Agent 355*, was released in January about a young female spy who may have changed the course of American history.

She has a forthcoming novel, *The Queens of Crime* (February 2025) that is a thrilling story of five of the greatest women crime writers and their race to solve a murder, and the power of friendship among women.

President's Corner Ronnie Greenberg

I've always loved the theater, especially backstage. During my 35 years singing with the Fort Wayne Philharmonic Chorus, I've had the opportunity to be backstage in every theater in Fort Wayne. I loved it. There is something about the semi-darkness, props, wires, ropes and actors and stagehands scurrying around



that is very exciting. However, the most important thing about backstage is that without it, nothing would happen on-stage in front of the curtain.

Preparation for the High Holidays at the Temple is much like a backstage, resulting in the ultimate on-stage "performance" of our beautiful and meaningful services. Most congregants are completely unaware of how much time, planning, and staff and congregant power goes into this preparation.

Not surprisingly, Rabbi Meir is both the executive producer and the director of this event. It begins shortly after Simchat Torah, when he convenes the Ritual Committee, now under the leadership of Dawn Hammond, to discuss the recently completed cycle, what was wonderful and what didn't quite work. This input provides the basis for planning for the following year.

One of the earliest decisions to be made is the engagement of a guest cantor for the Conservative and joint High Holiday services. This year, a small task force of congregants who are knowledgeable in the Conservative liturgy were tasked with the initial solicitation and screening of candidates, and recommendation of one or several candidates to Rabbi Meir for a final interview and decision. Thank you to Ron Friedman, Josh Tourkow and Ben Eisbart for accepting this responsibility. We are looking forward to welcoming Cantor Penny Myers to our congregation this year.

As with most projects, planning is not linear. Sometime in the spring, many things began to happen at once. Rabbi Meir begins planning the service and the music. In addition to working with Cantor Myers and engaging Maestro Bob Nance, he also has been consulting with Cantor Rosalie Will, the lead consultant on music for the Union for Reform Judaism, to adjust our music to account for the retirement of the Hazemir choir.

Another piece of what we see "in front of the curtain" are the congregants who usher for services, as well as those who have the honor of sitting on the bimah during services. Mike Rush, a member of the Ritual Committee, is working to fill these positions. If Mike calls you to serve, I hope you will accept the honor. Thank you,

Many other and equally important tasks are handled not "backstage", but "back office." All the information sent in many formats and multiple times to congregants with dates and times of everything High Holidays, as well as giving opportunities, are the work of our Communication Committee chair, Beth Zweig, along with Executive Director Samara Sheray and Administrative Assistant Lily Noga. Thank our wonderful staff, Charlie Smiley and Timmy Oberley, under the capable leadership of Samara, for quick turnarounds in set-up and clean-up.

All of these "backstage" efforts result in a seamless, beautiful and meaningful High Holiday experience for our congregants and guests.
