Get ready to savor delicious delicatessen when our Corned Beef on Rye - Sure to Satisfy Fundraiser returns on Thursday, November 7 for a 22nd year.

What's new this year? The biggest change is that we will not have drive-thru pick up of orders. Simply park in our spacious lot and walk up to the building, where multiple pickup stations will be set up for your convenience. In addition, customers who pre-order meals will be able to take advantage of special early bird pick up beginning at 10 a.m., an hour before our regular 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. hours. New sponsorship opportunities also are available.

Boxed meals are \$18 each when ordered by Friday, October 25. After that date and at the door, meals are \$21 each. Meals include a heaping 1/3-pound corned beef sandwich on rye, giant pickle, creamy coleslaw, fudgy brownie, and a drink.

Rabbi Meir Bargeron: A TIME OF CELEBRATION AND LAMENT

On the morning that I am writing these words, the Temple is at the height of preparations for the High Holy Days. Charlie and Timmy are painting the portico ceiling, so that when our members and friends arrive, they are welcomed with an entry way that is clean, bright and warm. Lily is taking calls, answering questions, preparing materials, and looking after a long list of items that are important *and* invisible to most, but are essential for us to be ready. Jamie is ensuring that Temple dollars flow where they need to go, and Samara is conducting all of the Rifkin Campus operations like a finely tuned symphony.

I, myself, am collaborating with Ron Friedman and Maestro Robert Nance, as well as our guest hazzan, Cantor Penny Myers, to make sure that every page and every moment of services have been considered and are ready for our congregation to experience together. Really, this is the most exciting time of the year at the Temple!

When we gather to pray during the Days of Awe, we sing these familiar words: "<u>Hashivenu, Adonai elecha venashuva</u> <u>chadesh yamenu k'kedem</u>. Turn us unto You, O Lord, and we shall be turned; renew our days as of old." This verse and its memorable tune are the entry point to the High Holy days for many of us. It is as if Hashiveinu originates from the <u>machzor</u>, but in fact this plea for God's closeness comes from the book of Lamentations (5:21). It is from lament that we begin our journey through Rosh Hashanah and into Yom Kippur.

Lament may feel ill-fitting, especially on Rosh Hashanah when we celebrate the beginning of creation. But this year, in between Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, we will also be marking the first anniversary of the horrifying attack by Hamas on Israel on October 7, 2023.

For Jews in Israel and everywhere, the intervening months

have brought with them a range of emotions including shock, fear, anger, and grief. Many have described the attack and kidnappings as one of the most traumatic events for Jews since the Holocaust. The attack has left a lasting impact, reopening wounds and reinforcing fears about anti-Semitism and the fragility of safety in many parts of the world. The sense of unity and



resilience within Jewish communities has been evident, but so too has the deep mourning for those who were lost or affected by the violence.

For many, the feelings have been overwhelming, leaving some speechless. There is simply very little to say that can describe the horror of the attack, or the depth of the pain that has followed for the survivors and the Jewish people as a whole. This pain, this muffled scream, is lament. While the experience of pain is very personal, we can provide communal support to one another – simply by knowing that we are in this together.

On Monday, October 7th at 7 p.m., the Fort Wayne Jewish Community is invited to join together for a <u>program of</u> <u>remembrance</u>, lament and hope, as we commemorate the passing of a full year since the attack by Hamas. Through readings, prayers, and music, we will remember and continue to integrate this previously unimaginable catastrophe into our consciousness. We will turn to one another to support Israel and each of us. Please mark your calendar and come to this special communal moment.

Until then, I wish everyone *Shanah Tova u'metukah,* a good and sweet new year. — *Rabbi Meir*

A CREATIVE LIFE: THE ARCHITECTURE & ART OF ALAN GRINSFELDER OPENS IN NOVEMBER



A new exhibit called "A Creative Life: The Architecture and Art of Alan Grinsfelder" opens on Sunday, November 24 at 2 p.m. at the Temple. The afternoon also includes a talk and panel discussion at 3 p.m. and reception at 4 p.m..

This inspiring exhibit highlights Alan's designs and architectural contributions to the Fort Wayne skyline during his long career with Grinsfelder Associates Architecture, along with the creativity displayed in his ongoing fine arts endeavors.

Alan's building projects featured in this exhibition include Headwaters Park, the Foellinger Theatre, the Pyramid Building, the Hanna Creighton block (Urban League, Head Start, and Pontiac Public Library) and the downtown Community Center. His artwork has been on display in local

coffeehouses and galleries. Alan, who will turn 89 days before the exhibit's opening, has been touted as Purdue Fort Wayne's oldest student and continues to take art classes.

Alan and his wife, Maureen, are long-time members of the Temple and past presidents.

The panel will be moderated by Irene Walters. Joining Alan on the panel will be **Geoff Paddock**, Fort Wayne City Councilman and former executive director of Headwaters Park, and **John O'Connell**, dean of the College of Visual & Performing Arts at Purdue Fort Wayne.

CHECK OUT SOMETHING SCARY AT THE TEMPLE LIBRARY

October can be a time for a good scary story, and we have plenty of them to offer in the <u>Rabbi Richard B. Safran Library</u>. We have a large collection of Golem titles, but those have been covered before and would take up another full article. Here are a few suggestions for those interested in goblins, ghosts, witches and vampires:



For our youngest readers, there are some newer goblin books that aren't particularly creepy. Susan Tarcov's *There's a Goblin on the Ark* includes goblins in the "Noah's ark" story. Two Shabbat titles include *The Porridge Pot Goblin* by Jacqueline Jules and *The Goblins of Knottingham: A History of Challah* by Zoe Klein. *Zombie Vacation* by Lisa Rose is a unique introduction to Israel that might fit the creepy vibe for picture book readers. A perennial picture-

book favorite for Halloween is Marilyn Hirsh's *The Rabbi and the Twenty-Nine Witches*. This classic folktale is perfect for a younger audience.

For middle grade and teen readers, there are several scary options to choose from. Samara Shanker's *Rebecca Reznik Reboots the* Universe is our newest title in this category. Thirteen-year-old Becca's home is haunted by demons. *Don't Want to Be Your* Monster is a recent Sydney Taylor Honor Book by Deke Moulton. Adam and Victor, the brothers and main characters, are vampires. A not-so-scary witch book is



Laurel Snyder's *The Witch of Woodland*, a recent Sydney Taylor Award winner. Zipporah, or Zippy, has just discovered magic powers.

Finally, for adults we offer both of Helene Wecker's titles, *The Golem and the Jinni and The Hidden Palace*. And Lavie Tidhar's *Jews vs Zombies* is a collection of short stories with a horror theme.

In 1996, following a successful tour in Central Europe as the primary lyric soprano soloist, she received a BA in Music-Voice from Buffalo State University. Her studies continued at University of North Carolina-Chapel Hill, earning a Master of Arts in Teaching-Music Education in 1999.

While a music teacher at an inner-city school in Durham, North Carolina, Hazzan Myers was a nominee for Teacher of the Year and discovered the Cantorate in Durham, N.C., where she moonlighted as cantorial soloist.

She received her Hazzan credential through the Cantors Assembly, a branch of the United Synagogue of Conservative Judaism, the world's largest professional association of Jewish Cantors.

In 2022, Hazzan Myers received her Rabbinic s'michah from Mesifta Adas Wolkowisk/ Rabbinical Academy of America, making her the first dually ordained Jewish clergy in Western New York.

She also teaches and lectures about female clergy, emphasizing the challenges and blessings of how *#metoo* has affected awareness in Jewish organizations.

Hazzan Myers is married to neurologist Dr. Bennett Myers. They have three children: Hunter, Saul, and Corrinne.





President's Corner Ronnie Greenberg

It seems like I say this every year, but this past year really WAS a momentous year for our congregation, our fantastic 175th anniversary celebrations aside. Changes in our Bylaws have allowed board members to begin to focus our collective attention on the future of our congregation rather than current operations.



We have begun studying and discussing issues such as the Religious School, programming, long-term financial issues, membership engagement and leadership development. These are not easy issues, and they require the broad diversity of backgrounds and opinions that our board members bring to the table to ensure meaningful discussions and good conclusions.

At the September board meeting, under the leadership of board member Leise Rosman, the board participated in a survey to identify barriers to accepting leadership positions, which includes everything from chairing an oneg to serving as an officer. The first major barrier we identified was "not enough time." I understand that, having only 24 hours in my day, too. However, with our new organizational structure, in the case of board leadership and service, the time requirement is not unreasonable as it may have been in the past.

The second reason was "I don't feel gualified." I don't accept that reason and here is why, based on my personal experience.

No one is alone at the Temple. If an issue comes up that I need to address and I'm really unsure how to handle it, there are so many people I can consult. Rabbi Meir and Executive Director Samara Sheray are always available and willing to help. I can also consult with the other officers and perhaps the entire board. I may not have all the answers myself, but I know where to go for help. The same applies to chairing a committee or an oneg. There is always someone there who can advise and help. We're a community that's what we do.

Another consideration is that each person brings their own strengths, weaknesses, and preferences to a position and, within certain limits, sets their own parameters for their job. As an example, I have a fairly strong background in not-for-profit finance so guarterly financial statements are not intimidating. If that's not a strength for you, we have a VP Finance and a finance committee who do understand them and can guide and inform you.

On the other hand, knowledge of childhood education is not a strength for me, and I rely on the guidance of Rabbi Meir, the Religious School Committee and their chair, Leise Rosman. Remember, whether you are chairing a committee or event or serving on the board, you may do it your way, and you are never alone.

We are stronger when we do things together, and strongest when we are willing to step up when called upon to lead. I hope you will, each in your way, endeavor to do more this coming year to ensure the continued wellbeing of our congregation. Think about what you would like to see happening at your congregation, both in the short-

term and the longterm. And then ask yourself how you can be involved. I always appreciate hearing from another congregant who

wants to volunteer. From me to you, from my family to yours, Shana Tova! May it be a sweet year, a year filled with good health and happiness, a year of peace and blessings for us all.
