SHARE SOUPER BOWL SHABBAT DINNER



Please join us for our next lifelong learning program exploring "The Reform Movement in America Today," beginning Wednesday, February 12 at 7 p.m. on Zoom.

The Reform Movement, with its origins in Germany, is America's largest Jewish movement. Congregation Achduth Vesholom is one of the nearly 850 congregations in North America affiliated with the Union for Reform Judaism.

According to the Pew Research Center, 2.8 million Jews live in the U.S. and 38% identify as Reform.

In this series led by Rabbi Meir, we will focus discussions based on episodes of Re-Form, a recent podcast series from Tablet Studios, supplemented with Jewish texts presented during the class.

Re-Form focuses on five questions or issues that have defined the movement in the modern era. Participants are highly encouraged to listen to the podcast episode in advance, but this is not required. Come prepared to learn, to question and to share your views on what it means to be a Reform Jew in America today.

For more than six decades, the <u>Religious Action Center of Reform Judaism</u> (the RAC) has worked to educate, inspire, and mobilize the Reform Jewish community to advocate for social justice. The RAC mobilizes around federal, state, provincial, and local legislation on more than 70 pressing socioeconomic issues, including gun violence prevention, immigration, reproductive rights, and criminal justice reform.

As a joint instrumentality of the <u>Union for Reform Judaism</u> and the <u>Central Conference of American Rabbis</u>, the RAC represents the values of the largest and most diverse Jewish Movement in North America to governments at all levels. Rabbi Meir Bargeron: SHAPING FUTURE GENERATIONS

This month, I would like to use my column to provide an update on the Temple Religious School. This school year marks a period of revitalization of the program, largely in response to feedback gathered from parental interviews conducted by Jewish educational consultant Dr. Wendy Grinberg.

Building on Dr. Grinberg's recommendations, the Religious School began the school year with an in-person program that focuses on Torah stories and holiday traditions for the younger grades and Jewish values for the middle grades. Nineteen students are enrolled in the Religious School program.

This year, the school meets on Sundays for two hours, with an additional one hour of online Hebrew for eligible students. This is a significant increase compared to last year's program of 90 minutes twice per month. Attendance ranges between 75%-85% each week, also a significant increase. We are very fortunate to have three volunteer teachers - Kate Crell, David Crell, and David Flapan -- join me to form the religious education faculty.

Additionally, in response to the scarcity of available local Hebrew teachers, as well as the desire of many parents for maximum scheduling flexibility, Hebrew education continues to be offered online. Barbara Silverman is teaching weekly Hebrew classes and is also serving as the Hebrew content tutor for our B'nai Mitzvah students. Seven students are enrolled in Hebrew instruction. B'nai Mitzvah students complete their preparation with additional individual instruction provided by me in the last months before their service date. Barbara is an amazing addition to the team!

Lily Noga is serving as the Religious School coordinator, bringing together all the details and supporting teachers, students and families on Sundays.

Upon reaching the mid-year point, Religious School parents were sent a short survey in an email and included in the weekly communication (email and Band app). Seven out of 10 (70%) families responded. The survey was designed to gauge improvements in areas identified during the summer interviews. A substantial majority of responses, exceeding 80%, reported agreement or strong agreement with these statements:

My child(ren) feels a sense of belonging at CAV Religious School.

I am happy with the content being taught at CAV Religious School.

I feel CAV is willing to accommodate the specific needs of my family at Religious School.

The communication from the CAV Religious School is clear. (This indicates a marked improvement from the summer interviews.)

The online Hebrew class is meeting my goals for Hebrew learning.

I feel that CAV has appropriately prioritized the Religious School within the life of the synagogue.

Overall, CAV Religious School is a positive experience this year.

When asked about how the CAV Religious School is working for their child, parent comments were positive, reflecting on both the learning and the community building.

The following comment expresses exactly how the program is aligned with the mission we set out to accomplish at the beginning of the year: "They are learning the stories and trying to understand them in a broader context. They are also learning the prayers and integrating them into our family life. They consider many of their religious school classmates to be close friends."

Areas noted by parents for improvement include increased awareness of weekly lesson content, and feedback on the classroom climate and management in specific instances.

We will use this feedback to fine-tune our Religious School program. Additionally, we will conduct an end-of-year parental feedback assessment to assist in planning for next year. I am very grateful to our teachers, to Lily, and to our parents for their commitment and support. Thank you to Dr. Wendy Grinberg for her advice and collaboration! We are grateful to the Rifkin Family Foundation and to the Dr. Harry W. Salon Foundation for their support.



REFORM JUDAISM RESOURCES IN THE TEMPLE LIBRARY

Inspired by Rabbi Meir's <u>lifelong learning series</u> about the Reform Movement beginning this month, here are some resources in our <u>Rabbi Richard B. Safran Library</u> that might supplement the discussion.




The first session will discuss the origins of the Reform Movement. Perhaps the most relevant title is Dana Evan Kaplan's *American Reform Judaism: An Introduction*. Although it was published in 2003, it made the URJ list of Significant Jewish Books and addresses the history of the movement and its challenges.

For those particularly interested in our history, Michael A. Meyer's *Response to Modernity: A History of the Reform Movement in Judaism* (1995) and W. Gunther Plaut's *Growth of Reform Judaism: American and European Sources Until 1948* are two more works that address the Reform movement's origins.

The New American Judaism: How Jews Practice Their Religion Today, by Jack Wertheimer, covers more than just the Reform Movement, and was the winner of a National Jewish Book Award. Rabbi John Rosove's Why

Judaism Matters: Letters of a Liberal Rabbi to his Children and the Millennial Generation, and Paul Citrin's Lights in the Forest: Rabbis Respond to Twelve Essential Jewish Questions, may contribute to the understanding of liberal Judaism. Jewish Living: A Guide to Contemporary Reform Practice by Mark Washofsky is another excellent title to consider.

Social Justice will be the topic of discussion in April. Moral Resistance and Spiritual Authority: Our Jewish Obligation



to Social Justice, by Seth M. Limmer, and Recharging Judaism: How Civic Engagement is Good for Synagogues, Jews, and America, by Judith Schindler, are two excellent books on the topic. The first is a collection of essays covering a variety of social justice topics.

Please take advantage of the library as a Temple resource. Self-checkout is available at the library desk whenever the building is open, and

our <u>full catalog</u> can be found online.

YOUR VOTE FOR ISRAEL'S FUTURE BEGINS IN MARCH

Between March 10 and May 4, 2025, American Jews will vote for their delegates to the 39th World Zionist Congress, the "parliament of the Jewish people." The WZC elections will convene in Jerusalem in October 2025.

Voting in the election is the most powerful opportunity to have your voice heard in Israel, make an impact in Jewish communities worldwide, and stand up for Zionism. The representatives who are elected — with one-third of them coming from the United States — will make key decisions on allocating over \$1 billion annually to support the most pressing needs across Israeli society and the Diaspora.

What is at stake? The highly motivated religious fundamentalist opponents' vision for the future of Israel is diametrically opposed to that of the Reform Movement. They are organizing to destroy what we value, including:

- · Chipping away at Israel's democracy
- Rolling back gains for gender equity, LGBTQ+ rights, and religious pluralism
- Stripping our Israeli Reform clergy especially our women rabbis and our Reform communities of their rights, funding, and infrastructure
- Making sure that our converts and children are not recognized as Jews in the Jewish State
- · Blocking any hope of Palestinian self-determination and safety

SAVE THE DATES FOR VIOLINS AND HOPE: "INSIDE AMNON'S WORKSHOP"

The <u>Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne</u> will be partnering with the new <u>Pearl Street Arts Center</u> in March for a two-week, multi-venue commemoration based on Fort Wayne's groundbreaking and highly successful <u>2019 Violins of Hope</u>.

The 2025 version from March 9-23 will center around a photographic exhibition of the violins and instrument workshop of Violins of Hope founder Amnon Weinstein taken by Cleveland photographer Daniel Levin and his subsequent book called *Violins and Hope*.

Levin's exhibition includes 43 masterfully printed and framed photographs of selections from the book. Each photograph has a rich backstory. This beautiful

series of photographs documents

Weinstein's collection of violins, his workshop in Tel Aviv, and his processes for restoration.

"Violins and Hope: Inside Amnon's Workshop," will feature a series of concerts, lectures, film screenings, seminars, and interfaith events at Pearl Arts and across the community in support of an exhibition of Levin's photography, on display in the gallery at the University of St. Francis.

An Interfaith service under the leadership of Bishop Kevin Rhodes and Rabbi Meir Bargeron will be held on Thursday evening, March 20 at 7 p.m. at St. Vincent de Paul Catholic Church.

The Temple also will host a Shabbat service on Friday, March 21 at 7:30 p.m., led by Rabbi Meir.

Presidents Corner Ronnie Greenberg

A belated Happy New Year to everyone! Norm and I wish you all a happy, healthy, and prosperous 2025.

Looking back at 2024, our family closed out the year with a celebration in December of the B'nai Mitzvah of two of our grandchildren, Adam and Lielle, at



Mariah Congregation in Deerfield, Illinois. This congregation is very traditional Conservative and the service, while not what I am used to, was very beautiful and warm, and a wonderful experience for our family. It was certainly a meaningful way to end the year - especially for Adam and Lielle.

Looking back through the lens of our congregation, we also had a very significant year. In addition to performing its functions of oversight, budgeting, and planning, the Board made some noteworthy changes to its operation. Three initiatives come to mind immediately.

The biggest impact probably was the passage of revised congregational bylaws last June. No, I'm not going to outline the changes for you (again!), but suffice it to say that the Board now has much more flexibility in executing its leadership and governance of the congregation, with the membership still exercising the final approval of major decisions.

We also tackled, and conquered, the organization and functioning of the Religious School. We contracted with a consultant to help us restructure both the school curriculum and Hebrew education, resulting in many positive changes to each. Beginning- and mid-year surveys of parents and teachers showed a significant increase in approval of both the curriculum and functioning of the school. We will continue to make further adjustments as needed, but I think we now have a firm basis on which to build.

The third major initiative was transitioning the Board to its new focus on setting our strategic direction. We outlined and prioritized topics to be discussed. A task force has been appointed to look at membership engagement – how can we do a better job of involving new – and current – families in congregational life. This task force is still meeting and discussing, so if you have ideas and would like to participate, please let me know.

The Board Development Committee has continued to address another of our priorities - developing new leaders for the board. It is no secret that many of our current leaders are not Millennials or even Gen X. I understand that time commitments can be more difficult for these groups than for us Baby Boomers. However, serving as a Board trustee or officer is a different commitment than it was before the restructuring. It requires less time and more thought, and would involve you in the important task of setting the direction of our Temple for the next (perhaps your) generation.

There's an old saying that "more hands make light work". I think "more brains make better decisions," too. The more congregants involved in our discussions, the better the outcome will be. Please let me know how you would like to participate. After all, it's your congregation.
