Finding Strength in Our Values



We are living through difficult times. The news is often overwhelming — filled with uncertainty, conflict, and stress that affects each of us in different ways. In moments like these, it's only natural to look for comfort and direction. And for us, that direction can come from the values at the heart of Jewish tradition. They don't merely ground us —they help us move forward with purpose and hope.

Judaism gives us a meaningful way to navigate life's complexities — with compassion, with wisdom, and with a deep sense of connection to something greater than ourselves. Our foundational values —*Tzedek* (justice), *Chesed* (loving-kindness), *Tikkun Olam* (repairing the world), *Torah* (learning), and *Kehillah* (community) — aren't just lofty ideals. They're active principles that call us to live with intention, especially when the world around us feels uncertain.

Let's start with *Tzedek*. The Torah commands, "*Tzedek, tzedek tirdof*" — "Justice, justice shall you pursue" (Deuteronomy 16:20). This isn't just a suggestion. It's a call to act. In times of struggle, our commitment to justice calls on us to speak up for those who are vulnerable, to work for fairness, and to stand up against hate. That might mean supporting causes we care about or simply having honest conversations that open minds and build understanding.

Then there's *Chesed*, loving-kindness. The Talmud teaches that "acts of loving-kindness sustain the world" (Sukkah 49b). When life feels heavy, the small ways we show up for each other — checking in with a friend, bringing someone a meal, listening without judgment — can make a huge difference. These everyday acts of care remind us that we're not alone.

Tikkun Olam gives us a reason to keep going. Even when we can't fix everything, we can still make things better. As Pirkei Avot (2:16) teaches, "It's not your responsibility to finish the work, but neither are you free to ignore it." That's powerful. It means that every effort, no matter how small, matters. Each step we take toward healing the world is worth something.

And we don't do this work blindly. *Torah*, our tradition of learning, helps guide us. Whether we're studying sacred texts or learning with others in our community, engaging with Torah gives us the tools to think clearly, act wisely, and find meaning in our choices. It's how we stay connected to the wisdom of our ancestors — and how we find our own path forward.

Finally, we have *Kehillah*, our sacred community. None of us is meant to do this alone. Community gives us strength. When we pray together, celebrate together, mourn together, and support one another, we create a space where everyone belongs. When we gather to pray, we often begin with the words of Psalm 133, "*Hinei mah tov umah na'im, shevet achim gam yachad*" — "How good and pleasant it is for us to dwell together in unity."

So in these uncertain times, let us lean into our values. Let *Tzedek* guide what we do, let *Chesed* shape how we care for one another, let *Tikkun Olam* fuel our hope, let *Torah* deepen our understanding, and let *Kehillah* remind us that we are never alone. By living our values, we not only find strength — we help bring a little more healing into the world.

Yom Hashoah

Fort Wayne's annual community Yom HaShoah commemoration on April 21 brought together a large audience at the Rifkin Campus to remember the six million Jews who perished in the Holocaust and to hear from Irene Miller, one of the last Holocaust survivors actively traveling and speaking publicly.

The service of remembrance was led by Rabbi Meir Bargeron and included community participants and music by Maestro Robert Nance, accompanied by Heartland Sings.

Miller, author of *Into No Man's Land: A Historical Memoir*, shared her captivating story of survival and the important lessons for today. She said her mission is to use her Holocaust experiences "to show what hate and prejudice did -- and what hate and prejudice can do again unless we learn from it." Watch the service and her talk.

New From Kar-Ben in the Temple Library




As part of our "ASAP" subscription with Kar-Ben Publishing, a Jewish children's book publisher, we recently received nine new titles to add to the Rabbi Richard B. Safran Library collection.

Two were Passover picture books: Joy Preble's Happy Passover, Edie Rose! and Zayde Babysits before Passover by Jane Sutton. And two were Purim books - The Elephant and the Purim

Crown by Haviva Klerzenblat and a board book, Who Brought the Hamantaschen? by Marcia Gresko.

The Secret Recipe, by Ilan Stavans, shares the story of the Ladino language and the history of Spanish and Portuguese Jews through a family story of a child and his grandmother. Another story of grandparents, Danielle Joseph's The Mitzvah Fairy, follows a grandson as he helps his ailing Bubbe. The See-You-Soon Spice Box, by Pamela Ehrenberg, tells of Silas and his Great-Grandma Faye and their Havdalah celebrations over video calls.



Two Holocaust-related titles rounded out the order. Twist, Tumble, Triumph: The Story of Champion Gymnast Ágnes Keleti, by Deborah Bodin Cohen, is a picture book biography of the well-known Holocaust survivor and gymnast. She competed at the 1952 Olympics. Amanda Friedeman's Interrupted Lives: Nine Stories of Child Survivors of the Holocaust, is written for older, middle-grade children. These stories of children from different European countries and family backgrounds illustrate the

differences and similarities between the survivors.

Vote on Proposed Bylaws Changes on May 7

During the past few years, leadership development has been an important focus at Achduth Vesholom to strengthen our congregation and engage our members. Most recently, 16 congregants participated in our CAV Leadership 2025 group in January to become more familiar with Temple operations and opportunities. They also began to explore areas meaningful to them and to our kehilla kedosha (holy community).

Our recent efforts have reinvigorated interest in congregational leadership and led the Board Development Committee to recommend the creation of a new officer position called President-Elect.

Special Congregational Meeting

The board has embraced the idea and is seeking congregational approval of a change to our Temple Bylaws during a special meeting on Wednesday, May 7 at 7 p.m. on Zoom. Information about the proposal and meeting has been sent to members, along with an absentee ballot for those unable to attend.

During the special meeting of members on Zoom, President Ronnie Greenberg and Board Development Co-Chairs John Stein and Beth Zweig will answer any questions before a vote is held. The proposed bylaws changes, an absentee ballot, and meeting link will be sent to members in advance of the meeting.



The Director will oversee all aspects of the Religious School's operations, curriculum, and community engagement, ensuring alignment with the congregation's mission and values, and expanding programs to engage families and youth beyond the classroom.


Don't Delay! Vote Today for Israel's Future!

Share Shavuot with Our Temple Family

Please join us for our Shavuot and Yizkor service on Sunday, June 1 at 7 p.m. when we celebrate the giving of the Torah on

Mt. Sinai, led by Rabbi Meir Bargeron. Join us in person or on YouTube.

In ancient times, Shavuot marked the conclusion of the spring barley harvest and the beginning of the summer wheat harvest. The holiday is celebrated 50 days after Passover. Traditionally, the Book of Ruth is read on Shavuot because just as that story recounts how a young Moabite woman chose to become an Israelite so did the Israelites choose to accept the commandments when they stood before Mt. Sinai.

It is customary to eat dairy foods on the holiday to symbolize the sweetness of Torah and the association of Israel as the land of milk and honey.

Outside the birds have returned, flowers have burst through the ground and blooms are on the trees. Accountants have filed their last returns and headed to Las Vegas for a week without eyeshades or pocket protectors.

But on the Rifkin campus, the financial staff and the finance committee have been

whittling away at what looks like yet another deficit budget. Our board got its first look in April, and we spent some time dealing with a familiar problem, an expected deficit. That is exactly what we have been presented with in each of the last few years.

You probably have heard some of us say income is too low while expenses continue to rise. We don't take this job lightly, the job of holding down expenditures. This past year we changed natural gas providers to cut our costs. Again this year, however, we are forced to add a cost of expenses/cost of living adjustment to our dues base. We don't do this to keep with costs, mind you. No, no, that is not happening. We make that adjustment so we don't slide back any further or faster.

We had a large planned deficit for the year that ended last June 30. Surprisingly, we ended up with a surplus. How, you might ask, did you pull that off? And why can't you do that all the time? Turns out that the only way that happened was we went many months during that year without a complete staff. If no one

shows up, we don't pay. But lots of work is left undone. And that is not good or effective for us to provide what you all expect to be done here. That is not a solution for a congregation to provide full services for its members.

We talk about this at board meetings. Members want us to provide religious education for our children. For adults, we want to have weekly services on Shabbat and to celebrate all of our holidays, not just the big, important ones. It's nice if everyone in the congregation can afford to come to the second night seder or the Hanukkah party.

We have a wonderfully successful fundraiser each fall. We have rental income from our tenants. We have been fortunate recipients of past gifts that allow us to do some of this. But, sadly, our dues base does not keep up with our appetite.

Again this year, you will receive a letter asking you to review your own dues, calculate how much you can increase them this year and try to help us catch up. We know you understand the situation. All we ask of everyone is to stop and consider for a few moments how much joy you get from our congregation throughout the year. Remember what each month has brought to you this year. There is another year being planned again even at this moment that I am writing my message. It will be another splendid year, of that I am sure. Please help us with our battle against that nagging problem where expenses exceed income.
