Striving to Be Human in the New Year

Elul, the month in the Hebrew calendar immediately preceding Rosh Hashanah, is sometimes called a time of spiritual stretching. The shofar is sounded each morning to remind us that something

big is coming, and that we still have time to prepare. Elul invites us to ask: Am I living the life I am meant to live? Am I treating others with the humanity they deserve?

Our humanity must never be taken for granted. We read in *Pirkei Avot: "In a place where no one is human, strive to be human."* (2:5) It is precisely in this season when we account for our lives and can commit to "Strive to Be Human."

It may be tempting to think of the <u>Days of Awe</u> as being only about God: what God wants from us, whether God forgives us. But Jewish tradition makes it clear that the real work begins with one another. Maimonides teaches that <u>Yom Kippur</u> does not atone for wrongs between people until we make them right. Before we face God, we must face each other.

Elul gives us the breathing room to begin. A phone call to someone we've neglected. A note of appreciation to someone who has carried us. An honest conversation with ourselves about the ways we've fallen short. None of these are grand gestures. They are simple, deeply human ones, and they prepare our hearts for the holy days ahead.

Then comes Rosh Hashanah, the threshold of the new year. The shofar blasts ring out not as calls to perfection, but as reminders of our shared humanity. They awaken us to the possibility of beginning again. They remind us that while the past shapes us, it does not have to define us.

To strive to be human is to embrace our contradictions: strong and fragile, flawed and capable, wounded and healing. It means resisting the temptation to turn away from each other in a difficult world, and instead leaning into compassion, connection, and courage.

As we prepare to step into 5786, let us not measure ourselves against impossible standards of perfection. Instead, let us measure by the quality of our relationships, by the depth of our kindness, by the ways we show up for each other and for the world.

Our task is not to be superhuman. It is to be human—to the fullest, most compassionate, most courageous extent possible. It is everything, and it is enough.

L'shana tovah—may it be a good, sweet, and deeply human New Year.

LIBRARY NEWS

How Does Our Library Select Book Titles?

To address a few questions that have occasionally arisen, I thought I'd write something different for the Temple Bulletin this time. A few members have asked how books are selected for the Rabbi Richard B. Safran Library, so this is a brief description of what goes on "behind the scenes."

The three main ways of selecting titles are through the <u>Association of Jewish Libraries</u> newsletter, <u>National Jewish Book Award winners</u>, and our subscription to <u>Kar-Ben's "ASAP"</u> program.

Through the latter, we receive all Kar-Ben's new titles, sent twice a year to our library.

The Association of Jewish Libraries is a group of librarians from various Jewish libraries. Our membership entitles us to their quarterly newsletter, which includes dozens of reviews of books for children and adults. Several titles are selected to add to our collection from those reviews.

The AJL and the Jewish Book Council award the Sydney Taylor Awards and the National Jewish Book Awards annually. Almost all the award-winning books for young readers are purchased for our collection along with some adult fiction titles.





Temple Book Club Titles Announced





Our Temple Book Club will return this year in November and March, with <u>LiveChats</u> through the <u>Jewish Book Council</u>. All Temple members are invited to read the books, join our discussion on Zoom, and virtually meet the author.

On Tuesday, November 11 at 7 p.m., we'll discuss We Would Never, a novel by Tova Mirvis. A murder mystery centered around a separation and custody battle, Hadassah Magazine called this novel, "More than a whodunnit, Mirvis's characters are multidimensional, wrestling with doubts and guilt, not just about murder, but also about a lifetime of questionable choices."

On Tuesday, March 10 at 7 p.m., we'll discuss *The Last Dekrepitzer*, with author Howard Langer. A winner of the National Jewish Book Award, the novel tells the story of the Dekrepitzer Rebbe, a fiddler who survived the war, tracing his journey from the mountains of Southern Poland to the Columbus Circle subway station in New York City. From Marc Katz in the *Jewish Book Council Review*, "The Last Dekrepitzer is a novel that will surprise readers with its depth and introduce them to one of the more unique characters to appear on the contemporary Jewish literary scene."



Written by Dan Clancy and directed by the Rev. John Tolley, the play is set at a concentration camp in the Nazi era and tells the deeply moving story of an unlikely bond between a Jewish prisoner and a homosexual inmate.

Described as an inspirational tale of transcendence in the midst of a world gone mad, *The Timekeepers* has been praised for its masterful storytelling and emotional depth. A "talk back" that includes Rabbi Meir Bargeron follows the play. The theater is located at 300 West Wayne Street.

When I think back over the three years since becoming a member of this community, I can't help but marvel at how much we have returned

Just days later, our classrooms will be filled again for a new year of Religious School, as both new and returning students come together to learn, grow, and connect with friends.

The following weekend, our youngest members will welcome Shabbat with Joy Vey on the same night that Guy Copeland begins his bar mitzvah weekend on the bimah. We hope the whole community will join in celebrating this milestone with Guy and his family the next morning. Soon after, our High Holiday festivities begin — from our third annual Apple Picking and Potluck Picnic, to our first-ever Joy Vey Rosh Hashanah service, to a daytime "Pizza in the Hut" with a guest musician, and our annual Simchat Torah service.

As we step into this season, my hope is that each of us finds our own way to "return" — whether that's returning to services, returning to the classroom, or returning to the traditions of our holiday season. We've got so much ahead of us — services, celebrations, music, learning, and moments you won't want to miss. Whether you're joining us for the first time or the hundredth, this is your invitation to jump in, show up, and be part of the energy that makes our Temple family thrive. Let's make this return our most joyful one yet!

Terezin Tree Serves as Symbol of Resilience, Remembrance & Hope



A silver maple tree descended from the legendary tree of Terezin (Theresienstadt) has a new home on the grounds of Indiana's oldest Jewish congregation.

A dedication ceremony will take place on Sunday, October 19 at 10 a.m. with our Religious School students and Temple

community near the playground behind the Temple in honor of the tree whose powerful and moving story began in a Nazi concentration camp and serves as a living symbol of resilience, remembrance, and hope.

The tree was planted in 1943 by the children at Terezin with the help of a Jewish teacher named <u>Irma Lauscher</u>. They nurtured the tree using their limited water rations, learning that even those with little can do much. The descendants of this tree were spread around the world, including the <u>Illinois Holocaust Museum & Education</u>
<u>Center</u> and the <u>Museum of Jewish Heritage in New York.</u>

The tree came to Achduth Vesholom through Kevin Kolar, a friend of Temple member Steve Zacher, via Kevin's friend Sam Harris, a Holocaust survivor. Sam's wife, Dede Harris, is the author of The Children's Tree of Terezin (available in our Rabbi Richard B. Safran Library.) This sapling had been at the Illinois Holocaust Museum.

Our Jewish community is honored to preserve and share this remarkable legacy.

"Was My Ancestor Rich or Poor: What We Can Find From Polish Business Court Records" begins at 3:30 p.m. Anna is a historian, lecturer, researcher, and genealogist who was associated with the Varsaviana research group at Jewish Historical Institute in Warsaw from 2011 to 2018. Her scientific interests include the history and culture of Jews in the 19th-century Kingdom of Poland, the position and role of women in the 19th century, and the everyday life of Jewish families in the Kingdom of Poland.


