RABBI LENNY SARKO LIFE EXPERIENCES CREƏTE MEƏNINGFUL ADULT B'NEI MITZVAH



The primary function of a Bar/Bat Mitzvah is the declaration of an individual that they are ready to take on the responsibilities of a Jewish adult. This is no small declaration. The typical student is a young adult at the age of 12 who has received religious training. There are circumstances that sometimes do not allow a person to experience this life-cycle event. In the recent past, a new approach to Bar/Bat Mitzvah has provided opportunities for adults to have this experience.

The perspective and background of a child will vary considerably from that of an adult. An adult can bring life experiences to religious study and as such can make the learning process of a Bar/Bat Mitzvah far more intensive and significant. Regard-

less of age, it is important that a person obtain a basic understanding not only of Judaic principles but how they apply outside the walls of the synagogue.

I would like to offer the opportunity for any adult in our congregation who has not had a Bar/Bat Mitzvah to have one. There is no age limitation. I have worked with adults as old as 90 who have successfully completed this life-cycle event.

At my last synagogue, I worked with a group of 13 adults. We met for nine months for group study, averaging about one time per week for one hour. The group was then divided up, individually or in pairs, and continued the study, one-on-one with the rabbi, working toward a chosen week to be called to the Torah. The personal time frame varied based on the needs of the student and the scheduling of the Shabbat chosen.

The group study will cover 10 areas. The purpose of the study is to allow you to understand the breadth and meaning of Judaism. In all cases, the study will be framed to understand how the topic relates to the practice of Judaism. The following are the topics we will cover: history, Jewish texts, holidays, halacha/ minchag, Jewish serivices/Shabbat, mitzvot, Jewish philosophy, comparative literature, Jewish life-cycle events, and Hebrew.

The depth that we will study any specific topic will be decided by the class. If there is more interest in one area versus another, we will spend more time on that topic. If any student wishes to go more in-depth on their own, I will be happy to supply a number of texts on that subject and work with that student to further understanding.

Learning is a function of setting aside a segment of your time, a commitment to the process, and participation and collaboration with other students, as well as the teacher. Ultimately, what you will get out of an adult Bar/Bat Mitzvah is what you will put into this learning opportunity.

If you have any questions or have interest in an adult Bar/Bat Mitzvah, please contact the rabbi. I hope to begin the course of study at some point in November.




COMPLETE THE CYCLE AND BEGIN ANEW ON SIMCHAT TORAH

A NEW YEAR FOR SHABBAT KATAN


