AN EXPANDED VIEW OF THE SABBATH



On Friday, October 19, Achduth Vesholom will host an interfaith Shabbat. This program was developed as part of "The Seventh Day: Revisiting Shabbat" traveling art exhibit currently on display in the social hall. A panel will convene on the 19th in our sanctuary to discuss how different religions approach Shabbat. You will have a chance to learn how other faiths understand this concept and how their point of view differs from ours.

In Judaism, Shabbat is the most important observance there is. It is the only observance described as part of the Ten Commandments in the bible. The Hebrew root Shin-Beit-Tav means to cease, to end, or to rest. A day of rest was unique to the Jewish people in the ancient world. No such concept existed in any of the other great early civilizations.


Jewishly we do not refrain from all work on Shabbat. The precept was understood to reflect those activities related to the construction of the tabernacle, i.e. lighting a fire, sewing, metal working, etc.

The Talmud describes 39 work prohibitions in all. In the modern world, many Jewish communities restricted travelling, buying, and selling as part of the prohibitions, as well as the operation of an automobile.

In the Reform perspective, we generally constrain the definition to not doing your occupation. If you are a gardener, go play the piano. If you are a piano player, go garden. All Jewish populations stress being with family, community, and congregation on Shabbat. As with all the mitzvot, life always takes precedent. If you are a surgeon and a life is in danger, you perform your occupation to save that life, even if it is on Shabbat.

Regardless of denomination, Shabbat is a time of great joy. It is a time to direct our energies to higher pursuits.

I hope you will join us on the 19th to represent our Temple and our religion to the guests who will be involved in our discussion. Dialogues between people of different religions creates greater understanding between the groups and hopefully leads to respect, tolerance and a sense of community across religious lines.

EXPLORE ART BOOKS IN OUR LIBRARY COLLECTION

If you haven't yet viewed our visiting art exhibition, "The Seventh Day: Revisiting Shabbat," please take the time to look in the Social Hall next time you're in the building. Afterward, browse our own museum exhibits in the Madge Rothschild Resource Center, and then you might want to look for more art in the Rabbi Richard B. Safran Library. We have a number of art books in our collection, including several quite beautiful volumes.

Skies of Parchment, Seas of Ink: Jewish Illuminated Manuscripts, by Marc Michael Epstein, was purchased in honor of Betty Stein's 100th birthday, and is a National Jewish Book Award winner. This beautiful book covers a wide range of manuscripts from the Middle Ages to present-day, from Bibles to marriage documents and other texts. How about 3000 years of art in one volume? Jewish Art, by Grace Cohen Grossman, is a full survey of Jewish art history, and was awarded the National Jewish Book Award.

Another particularly attractive volume is Ellen Frankel's, *The Jewish Spirit: A Celebration in Stories & Art.* Included are 75 stories – folk tales to 20th-century authors – illustrated with works of art from an equally wide spectrum. Along a similar vein, *The Jews: A Treasury of Art and Literature*, meshes centuries of Jewish writings with illustrations ranging from 3rd-century frescoes to Marc Chagall. Edited by Sharon R. Keller, it was also a National Jewish Book Award winner.

Two of our more beautiful titles are in our children's collection. Linda Falken's *Noah's Ark*, includes the text of the tradition Bible story illustrated by works of art from the collection of the Metropolitan

Museum of Art. Fireflies in the Dark: The Story of Friedl Dicker-Brandeis and the Children of Terezin, by Susan Goldman Rubin, is a beautifully illustrated Sydney Taylor Honor Book. Along with I Never Saw Another Butterfly, it conveys the creativity and spirit of the children of Terezin.

Whether it's a coffee table book, an artist's biography, a history or a children's book, we have <u>a wide range of titles to further your</u> interest in Jewish art.

ISRAELI WOMEN LEADING A DIALOGUE: OVERRIDING DIFFERENCES

What happens when a group of Jewish, Muslim, and Christian women in the Western Galilee come together for conversation – people who traditionally wouldn't interact on a personal level? Could they overcome obstacles resulting from political tensions, religious differences, and diverse upbringings? Is it possible to find common ground to develop a relationship that could bring about larger change in Israel?

Twelve Israeli women who did come together in this way will visit Fort Wayne for three days in October to take their story to schools, universities – and the public. OCTOBER MOURNING: A SONG FOR MATTHEW SHEPARD

"October Mourning: A Song for Matthew Shepard" is award-winning author Lesléa Newman's deeply personal literary and theatrical response to the events of October 6, 1998, when 21-year-old Matthew Shepard was brutally beaten and hung on a fence to die in one of the most brutal gay hate crimes of recent memory.

This work of poetic imagination, married to the hauntingly beautiful music of Curtis Heard, serves as an illumination to those unfamiliar with the tragedy, and as a powerful, enduring tribute to Matthew Shepard's life and legacy.

Newman will be in Fort Wayne for the Midwest premiere on Sunday, October 7 at 3 p.m. at Plymouth Congregational Church. <u>Find ticket information</u>. It is sponsored by Heartland Sings, Plymouth Congregational Church, Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne, Fort Wayne Pride, and others to be announced.

The author will be offering a talkback session after the concert as well as making presentations around Fort Wayne leading up to the performance.

PRESIDENT'S CORNER

Shana Tova! We are off to a great start for the New Year as we welcomed several new families for worship, programming, and Jewish community.

The Temple's leadership is beginning a renewed focus on strategic initiatives and long-term planning. As part of this effort, we're looking at opportunities to not only strengthen our

congregational relationships, but also consider ways to grow as a Jewish community.

With that goal in mind, we currently are exploring ways that we might partner with Congregation B'nai Jacob. This is a time of transition for both houses of worship, with changes in rabbinic leadership next year and recognition of demographic and other realities that inspire discussion and possibilities.

An eight-member committee called "B'yachad" – Hebrew for "together" – has met with support from the board of directors at both congregations to brainstorm about the future. Three of the Temple's past presidents join me in representing Achduth Vesholom in these conversations with B'nai Jacob President Pam Friedman and three others from the synagogue.

Fort Wayne is fortunate to have two congregations that share core values and similar cultures. We have collaborated at various times over the years in different ways. We welcome each other's members, whether for adult learning, worship, social and holiday events, and religious school activities. Currently, our youth groups bring together Jewish children and Thoughtful Thursdays regularly involves members from both congregations and the Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne.

We don't know what a partnership would look like or what aspects of congregational life might be involved. Many different models have worked across the country, depending on the needs and desires of the congregations. We feel the timing is right to at least look at possibilities. Please be assured that any arrangement would not diminish Achduth Vesholom's long-standing commitment to Reform Judaism or to our members. Our goal is to strengthen the Jewish community, as we did in recent years by creating the Rifkin Campus.

I'd like to share with you some words that Pam Friedman included during her Yom Kippur address to B'nai Jacob members:

"Rabbi Lord Jonathan Sacks discusses seven key principles for maintaining Jewish dialogue. He touches upon the ideas of being humble, not seeking victory, talking even when we disagree, listening carefully to one another, and being respectful. He states, 'we are united by a covenant of shared memory, shared identity, and a shared fate, even if we have differing perspectives on our faith."

As we continue these discussions with respect for each other, I'm hopeful that the conversations will be fruitful for all. Please know that any recommendations will be discussed with the congregation at the appropriate time.

I also hope the New Year will find us re-energized and recommitted as a congregation. When you're at the Temple, take a look around. Do you notice people who seem to enjoy their experience here and take advantage of what we have to offer? Do you see members enjoying the programming, the friendships, and the food? Why not make a commitment to get more involved? (Continued on page 10)
