## RABBI LENNY SARKO December Challenges



Christmas is a complex and difficult issue for Jews. In the United States, one can argue, it has become a secular holiday - one that focuses on gift giving and being a little nicer toward others.

Religiously for Christians, the holiday celebrates the birth of Jesus. The first recorded date of Christmas being celebrated on December 25th was in 336 CE, during the time of the first Christian Roman Emperor,

Constantine. The origin of the Christmas tree is not clear. The use of evergreen trees, wreaths, and garlands to symbolize eternal life was a custom of the ancient Egyptians and even the Chinese. Tree worship was common among pagan Europeans. The Scandinavians had the custom of decorating the house and barn with evergreens at the New Year to scare away the devil. There is much documentation on the symbolism of trees in Viking and Saxon communities where they worshiped trees.

The stories around Santa Claus also vary on community. I was in Amsterdam in December one year and was surprised to learn that for their community Santa did not come in a sleigh, but on a ship and dressed very much like a pirate.

For American Jews, this time of year can be difficult. We are surrounded by Christmas culture. Christmas songs abound on the radio, Christmas decorations are in every store, television/ theater/school programming have one Christmas themed show after another. The Jewish people can get overwhelmed by the volume of Christmas that exists.

This can get more complicated. How do we as Jews deal with interfaith families? When we have a Christian spouse, not to mention if there are children in an interfaith family, how do we deal with Christmas? Should a Christmas tree be placed up in the household? Should we give gifts, if the holiday of Hanukkah comes at a different time?

It is interesting that American Jews have established some customs themselves this time of year. A few that are well known include going out for Chinese food on Christmas and going to the movies. Some communities create a Matzah Ball (a night of dancing, music and food), and some get together as family units, much like their Christian neighbors. One of the nicer customs I have seen in most communities is the Jewish population will substitute as workers at hospitals, nursing homes, and the like, to allow their Christian friends to spend the holiday at home.

Regardless, it is a difficult time for Jews. In my family, we try our best to give Christmas presents to those of our associates that are Christian and try to tell them in as nice a way as possible that if they wish to give to us, please give Hanukkah presents. There is also a generic approach of simply giving holiday presents, without specifying a religion. Regardless, the idea of being a little nicer to people fits well within our religion and scholars can find no issue with embracing these kinds of ideas at this time of year.

Thanks to Irv Adler, Fran Adler, Denny Reynolds and Nancy Salon for their efforts.

We also welcomed visitors from Congregation Beth Or in Dayton, Ohio, who observed our operations as they prepare to launch their first corned beef sale in the spring.

Our sponsorship efforts included reaching out to connections in the community and congregation. We continued a weekly e-blast with corned beef reminders to previous customers and increased our social media presence on Facebook with paid advertising, regular posts, and help from our congregants in sharing news of the sale with friends.

Our new online ordering was very popular, with nearly 1,000 meals ordered directly. When picking up their meals, customers reported that they heard about our sale most often from their friends or social media, or were repeat purchasers. Thank you to all who assisted with these efforts!

Our Prep Night continued to be a popular and fun evening, with volunteers weighing corned beef, scooping coleslaw, slicing brownies, bagging pickles, and preparing condiment bags. Teamwork and flexibility also paid off on sale day, with orders steadily filled and deliveries successfully made.

Thank you so much to everyone who donated money making it possible for 81 Brighpoint Head Start families and their teachers to receive a 12-pound turkey for Thanksgiving.



We have five new picture books for Hanukkah this year in the <u>Rabbi Richard B. Safran Library</u>. And in case you're looking for one for each night, we have more than 400 others to choose from!

All-of-a-Kind Family Hanukkah by Emily Jenkins is based on the well-known chapter books for slightly older readers. Caldecott Award-winning illustrator, Paul O. Zelinsky, contributes to this family holiday story set in 1912.

"Eva," a documentary by Ted Green and Mika Brown in partnership with WFYI, Indianapolis' PBS affiliate, highlights an Indiana story with international scope and impact.
