

MAH JONGG WORKSHOP COMING TO THE TEMPLE

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Curious about mah jongg, the centuries-old Chinese game that has been a staple for years among Jewish-Americans? The Temple's Adult Education Committee is offering a four-week mah jongg workshop on Sundays, February 5, 12, 26 and March 5 from noon to 2 p.m. The workshop will not only teach newbies the art of this classic game, but also will provide learning and teaching opportunities for seasoned players.

Participants will watch the documentary film "The Tiles That Bind," hear Gregg Swain, author of *Mah Jongg: The Art of the Game*,

speak about the history of the connection between the Jewish community and the game, examine the artwork depicted on various mah jongg tiles, and learn the details of the card. After the workshop concludes, drop-in games will be scheduled in the Temple's new Madge Rothschild Resource Center.

BETWEEN STRUGGLE AND TRIUMPH



There is a rabbinic teaching that each of us is to carry two pieces of paper in our pockets. From our left pocket we can pull out the piece that reads: "From dust and ashes I have come." From our right pocket we can pull out the piece that reads: "For my sake the world was created."

There are moments when we need our feet pulled down to the ground and there are moments when

we need to be lifted up from low places. This powerful little tradition acknowledges that we each have our ups and downs, and we must struggle to ground ourselves in the middle — balancing our achievements with our failures, our doubts with our certainty.

I believe the story of Moses is also supposed to have this leveling effect. Moses is a great leader who delivers the children of Israel from slavery, leads the people through the Sea of Reeds to safety, speaks face-to-face with God, and records and composes the law code for the Jewish people. That is the Moses who is leader par excellence.

Yet, when we look closely at Moses at the beginning of the book of Exodus, we see the other side of Moses. He narrowly escapes death as a condemned baby boy, is raised by an Egyptian princess, is separated from his Israelite family, then flees his home in the palace after committing murder. Moses is a wanderer with no grounding in home or family. He is the "other" amongst his family in the palace, his family in Midyan, and his birth family of Israel. His identity is unstable and he has no sense of who he is or of what he is capable.

We watch Moses struggle and question. He struggles against himself, his people, and his God. What we witness in the scene of the burning bush is Moses' move from wanderer to a man with a mission. God calls out to Moses from the bush and Moses eventually embraces the role. But, first, Moses rejects God's charge.

Moses, tending the flock of his father-in-law Jethro, drove the flock into the wilderness and came to Horeb, the mountain of God. An angel of the Lord appeared to him in a blazing fire out of a bush. He gazed, and there was a bush all aflame, yet the bush was not consumed. Moses said, "I must turn aside to look at this marvelous sight; why doesn't the bush burn up?" When the Lord saw that he had turned aside to look, God called to him out of the bush: "Moses! Moses!" He answered: "Here I am."

God's revelation was given gradually in a way that Moses could take it in. First he was given a visual experience, then auditory, and then tangible. God's revelation demanded Moses' participation. Moses had to take the first step toward God, and only then did God call out to him.

We are each pulled between life's struggles and triumphs. As Moses wandered, we wander sometimes, seeking our way. As Moses rose to the heights of Sinai, we accomplish great things when we follow our mission bestowed upon us. Yet we must take that first step. Leadership can be hard, it can be scary, it can be daunting. Yet we must take that first step. If we take that first step, God will walk beside us, and that understanding is perhaps one of the greatest lessons we can learn as Jews. Amen.

interested in helping out. Third, though we’d obviously prefer to be there to help you in person, self-checkout is always an option when you’re in the building. Instructions are posted on the library desk.

Finally, with your account number, you can place a hold or even check out a book from your own computer, phone or tablet. [Browse our catalog](#) from home, pick out a book, and place a hold on it or check it out, and we’ll leave it in the office for you to pick up at your convenience. We may even be able to deliver it to you if you are unable to come in! Our lending period is for two weeks, with online renewal available. All Temple members have account numbers. If you have not received a library card and would like this information, contact Betsy for your number.

As we prepare for our Grand Opening, we will be adding more materials to our collection. Please check us out – online or in person.

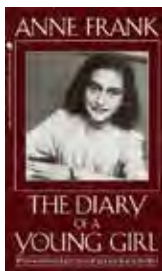

TEMPLE BOOK CLUB COMING IN MAY!

Join our inaugural Temple Book Club meeting on the evening of Tuesday, May 9 at 7 p.m. We will read *Saving Sophie* by Ronald Balson, the author of *Once We Were Brothers*. In our new Madge Rothschild Resource Center, Mr. Balson will join us via video-conferencing for our discussion.



The novel is a thriller, following Chicago accountant Jack Sommers, as he tries to rescue his daughter, Sophie, from her maternal grandfather, who is a suspected Palestinian terrorist. Jack also happens to be a suspect in a huge embezzlement case, and is on the run.

Our hope with this program is to start a book club for Temple members that will meet on a fairly regular basis. Following discussion of *Saving Sophie*, those attending will have the opportunity to plan meeting times and reading material for the group going forward. We will have resources available from the Jewish Book Council, the sponsor of the 45-minute "Live Chat" with the author, to help plan for the group.

There will be no cost for the program, though we encourage members to purchase the book wherever possible, as that is part of our agreement for the video-conference program. We do have one copy of *Saving Sophie* now in our library at the Madge Rothschild Resource Center. Further details and reservation information will be provided closer to the event.

The administrator position was created in December 2001 to provide extra support to the volunteer leadership and congregation. For many years, the position was funded by the late Lorry Goldenberg, with Janet Katz fulfilling the duties from March 2002 to November 2005. Funding for the position now comes from congregational budget.

Sally previously served on the Temple board and chaired the Fundraising and Facility committees. She also was co-chair of the Temple's first "Corned Beef on Rye-Sure to Satisfy" Fundraiser.

If I am not for myself, who will be for me? If I am only for myself, what am I? If not now, when?

These are the words of Hillel that I would like you to consider as we begin the process of developing a budget for the 2017-2018 fiscal year, and as we look ahead for the

next few years. The key part of this process is our dues pledge campaign, which will start in a few weeks.

Members will be getting a letter and a dues pledge sheet from the Temple with contribution guidelines. We ask you to make a dues pledge to your congregation and return it to us by mid-March. We rely on your generosity and on your sense of responsibility to provide sufficient dues to support the operating expenses of our Temple.

Because of demographics and other factors, our membership base has been shrinking, while the needs of our congregation continue. And with shrinking membership comes a loss in revenue from dues, which puts significant strains on our budget.

With the Rifkin Campus at 5200 and the new Madge Rothschild Resource Center as a focal point for the Fort Wayne Reform

Jewish Community, and likely other Jews as well, we hope our membership will increase. However, we have to deal with the reality of our demographics.

As we plan for our upcoming fiscal year, we need sufficient revenues from dues and we ask you, our congregational family, to support your Temple through your continued dues commitment. For the past 168 years, our Temple has been an example of Judaism for the Greater Fort Wayne Community.

Congregation Achduth Vesholom provides a moral compass to the Jewish community, a house of counsel, a sanctuary for those of our community in need, a center of education and a safe haven for those who require assistance.

We realize that there are congregants who may have financial issues and we respect that. Fortunately, we have congregants who accept the responsibility of stepping up for those who are less able, and the Temple is grateful for their generosity.

So when you receive your dues pledge letter in the mail, please respond and if at all possible, raise your dues commitment. Please support your congregation and its good works. Thank you!
