JEWISH HOLIDAY EXPERIENCE PROVIDES A CONSTANT IN OUR LIVES



The role Judaism plays in our lives varies with the individual and family. Yet there are certain times in our lives and in our year that it plays a larger role. Passover is certainly one of those times. Outside of the High Holy Days, it is the one religious holiday that most Jews partake in, although with varying degrees. Yet for almost all it will play a part.

When I was little, our extended family would get together for the seder. There were also friends that joined in. The friends may not have been Jewish, but were welcomed and enjoyed the evening. It was a chance to show what Jewish hospitality was all about. The numbers ranged from 30 – 50 each year and it was always a fun night, a joyous night, a night to remember.

When I was little, most of the family lived within a few miles of each other. Passover became one of those times of year when everyone knew the extended family would be together. As time went on, like most American families, our family spread across most of the United States. We could no longer come together for that infamous seder evening.

Other changes came to our seder celebration. There was a point in time when my parents grew old enough that they no longer could take on this large celebration. Although my siblings were older than I, my enthusiasm for Judaism, as well as the support

and desire of my wife Karen, shifted our seder celebration to our house.

Changes took place. Although relatives up to 100 miles away would come for the seder, it still reduced those numbers by at least two-thirds. A shift socially took place as this characteristic was not unique to our family. What resulted were very strong ties to friends and their immediate families that lived in our area. In many ways they became our new extended family. We would attend their important family functions and were very much involved in a family-type way in their lives as they were in ours. For Passover seder, it was expected that these friends/new extended family would get together. The resultant number remained at 30-50 for the evening, but the faces were very different from my youth.

Changes happen throughout our lives. It is a constant that permeates all people. We adjust and move on. Judaism and how we practice our religion becomes a stabilizing and comforting aspect in our lives. We know we will experience matzah, marror, gefilte fish, much wine, and other holiday delicacies. We may celebrate with different people every year, we may make new memories, yet we are surrounded by familiar religious customs and it helps us make our way down the pathway of life.

NEW TITLES TO CHECK OUT IN THE LIBRARY!

In the last few weeks, we've added several new books to the Rabbi Richard B. Safran Library. Of note are a number of 2017 National Jewish Book Award Winners and Finalists, announced this past January.

Lioness: Golda Meir and the Nation of Israel by Francine Klagsbrun was named the Jewish Book of the Year for 2017. Bettina Berch from the Jewish Book Council asks, "how is it, that in 2017, an 800+ page biography of Golda Meir can be an absolutely riveting page-turner?" Ethan Bronner of the New York Times Book Review calls the book, "A thorough and absorbing examination of the woman and her role in Zionism and Israel."

Other non-fiction award-winning titles include *The Choice: Embrace the Possible* by Dr. Edith Eva Eger, a moving memoir of a Holocaust survivor and a guide to healing, and *The Book Smugglers: Partisans, Poets, and the Race to Save Jewish Treasures from the Nazis* by David E. Fishman, a recounting of residents of the Vilna ghetto who struggled to save rare books, Torah scrolls, and other treasures from the Nazis.

We've also added several adult fiction titles to our shelves. *The Weight of Ink* by Rachel Kadish was the winner of the Book

Club Award. From *The Forward*, "*The Weight of Ink* has enough mysteries to keep readers turning pages, and a fair amount of thematic and intellectual heft...Rewarding." It tells the story of two women of London, separated by more than 300 years.

The winner in Debut Fiction, *Barren Island* by Carol Zoref is a historical novel of immigrants set off the shores of Brooklyn after World War I. David Grossman's *A Horse Walks Into a Bar* took the JJ Greenberg Memorial Award for Fiction for 2017. From NPR, "Unsettling and mesmerizing... As beautiful as it is unusual, and it's nearly impossible to put down." It is also a New York Times and Washington Post Notable Book.



Several finalists in the various fiction categories are also now in our collection. These include *4 3 2 1: A Novel* by Paul Auster, *Waking Lions* by Ayelet Gundar-Goshen, *Three Floors Up* by Eshkol Nevo, *We Were the Lucky Ones* by Georgia Hunter, and *Viva, Rose!* by Susan Krawitz.

The Indiana Jewish Historical Society will hold its spring meeting on Sunday, April 22 at 1 p.m. in the Madge Rothschild Resource Center. The program will highlight the new space and Congregation Achduth Vesholom's efforts to preserve and share Jewish history in northeast Indiana.

Now headquartered in Indianapolis, the organization was founded in Fort Wayne in 1972 by Joe Levine to collect, preserve, publish, and share the Jewish experience in Indiana. Wendy Soltz, a member of Achduth Vesholom, is the Executive Director.

COEXISTENCE AT THE GALILEE MEDICAL CENTER AND BEYOND FOCUS OF TALK

Two physicians – a Jewish Israeli and a Christian Arab Israeli – will speak on “Diverse Faiths Together in Israel: Coexistence at the Galilee Medical Center and Beyond” on Thursday, March 22 at 7 p.m. at The History Center.

Dr. Arie Eisenman, head of Internal Medicine in the Emergency Department, and Dr. Khalid Atalla, a specialist in Internal Medicine and resident in Emergency Medicine, will speak about their experiences working as part of a diverse team in the hospital and how the Galilee Medical Center is a microcosm of life in this diverse area.

The program is sponsored by the [Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne](#) and the [Partnership2Gether of Western Galilee Central Area Consortium](#).

The medical center, located only six miles from the Lebanese border, serves a demographically mixed population of Jews, Muslims, Christians, and Druze. The hospital has provided medical care for more than 2,000 Syrian casualties over the last several years, about a third of whom were women and children.

PRESIDENT'S CORNER
ELLEN TOM



March used to be one of my favorite months. It was a sign that winter shouldn't last too much longer, school was more than halfway over for the kids, and it was time to enjoy Spring Break with a family vacation. While it still holds true that sunnier days are around the corner, now, with grown children, the latter has changed. It's a reminder that while we get comfortable with the familiarity and the continuity of life, we also recognize the need to adapt to a new familiarity.

This new familiarity is something the Temple Board has been addressing from the results of our Operational Study, which we shared in the [December/January issue](#) of the Bulletin. The study identified ways in which we could streamline processes and allow the Board to focus more on strategic initiatives and long-term planning with some duties incorporated into staff responsibilities rather than board tasks. While we may choose to do things differently moving forward, it does not mean the system is broken. We have been hearing and seeing stories that show us how much opportunity we have to meet the ever-changing needs of our current congregants.

The first opportunity we have embraced is elevating the Temple Administrator position by appropriately renaming it as Executive Director, effective March 1. This role will now become a full-time position and will be generously funded by the recent bequests from Dorothy Gitlin and Danny & Bill Latz. Please join me in congratulating Samara Sheray on her promotion and continued best wishes as she provides management for the day-to-day operations of our Temple.

The Board also feels strongly about embracing some additional recommendations:

- **Reducing the size of our Board.** This change recognizes that we have fewer people available, combined with many who are unable or unwilling to volunteer their time. Decreasing the size of the Board will lessen the burden of finding enough people to fill existing slots.
- **Integrating the role of the Treasurer into the Vice President of Finance position.** This change will allow us to remove duplication of efforts within the two job descriptions. The VP Finance also would work more closely with the bookkeeper to eliminate any disruption to our internal processes.

While the Board would like to implement these changes for the next fiscal year (effective July 1, 2018), these modifications do require some minor changes to our Bylaws. Any changes to our Bylaws require congregational approval.

During the next few months, we'll be hosting a "Bagels with the Board" series on Sundays. The entire congregation is invited so you can gain a better understanding of the proposed changes and the thoughts behind them, as well as ask questions.

Your feedback is critical to the overall success of our congregation. You DO have an impact on the experiences and ongoing health of our community. I hope you will take this opportunity to collaborate with the leadership and ask any questions. Please watch for dates in upcoming weekly and monthly bulletins.
