SCHOLAR-IN-RESIDENCE LOOKS AT REFORM JUDAISM'S EFFORTS TO PRESERVE THE SABBATH

<u>Dr. Gary P. Zola,</u> our Scholar-in-Residence, will examine Reform Judaism's struggle to preserve the Sabbath on Friday, March 1 at the Temple. We'll gather at 7 p.m. for an abbreviated Shabbat service, led by Rabbi Lenny with musicians Ronnie & Norm Greenberg, followed by Dr. Zola's talk.

Dr. Zola is the Executive Director of The Jacob Rader Marcus Center of the <u>American Jewish Archives</u> and <u>Edward M. Ackerman Family Distinguished</u>
<u>Professor</u> of the American Jewish Experience & Reform Jewish History at Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion in Cincinnati.

During his presentation, Dr. Zola will explore the Sunday Sabbath, the Friday night service, the Oneg Shabbat, and other programmatic innovations by the Reform Movement to make the Sabbath relevant, meaningful, and observable in the modern era.

The Shabbat program will be the second of two given by Dr. Zola. His first talk on Thursday, February 28 at 7 p.m. at the Temple will introduce some of Judaism's most remarkable rabbinical leaders through voice recordings and how they handled pivotal world events from the pulpit, including the rise of Adolf Hitler and the civil rights struggle of the 1950s and 1960s.

AVOIDING IDOL WORSHIP: REAL OR IMAGINED



In the Torah portion we read a few weeks ago, we had the famous golden calf incident. Many people believe that the calf was a type of god idol. It actually was not. Moses had acted as a mediator between the people and God. It is interesting to note that Moses was not the secular leader of the people - that was Joshua; he was not the religious leader of the people – that was Aaron. Moses had no formal title or position. Yet he could mediate and interpret between God and the people. In that respect he had a significant status and was relied

upon by the entire nation.

Moses went up on Mt. Sinai to receive the Torah. The people expected him to be up there for a specified amount of time. When he did not return, the people became anxious. They wanted a mediator between them and God. They thought that Moses had died. They built the golden calf to act as that mediator. So in the strict sense of the term, the calf itself was not considered a god. Yet it was an idol. In that sense, it went against the very foundation of Judaism.

Judaism tends to be fairly conservative in its approach to most of the mitzvot, laws and ordinances. The one exception is idol

worship. Concerning idol worship, it goes to the extreme. The Hebrew word for prostration is transliterated as yishtachavoo. When you run across this word in the chumash, within just a few verses, something bad is going to happen. It makes you feel as if you do not want to even see the word. Jews do not prostrate.

There is a wonderful set of passages in the Talmud. It says that we place no figures, pictures or representations of people, animals or other such things within our sanctuary. Why? Because if a non-Jew should pass by and look into the sanctuary and see people davening (swaying as they pray) and there is a figure in the sanctuary, the angle of the view may make it seem as if the Jew is praying to the figure. We do not wish even non-Jews to get any kind of impression that we may be praying to an idol. Therefore, we place no such figures inside the sanctuary.

In our modern sense, we can have many different kinds of idols. Money, land, and other things we wish to possess in the extreme are types of idols. Addiction, in any form, is a kind of idol worship. We can idolize power. As human beings, we can manipulate science in any number of ways. This can make us feel as if we are above everything else - godlike. In Judaism, we do not raise people to god-like status. None of our patriarchs or even Moses was given that status. In Judaism, we reject our modern golden calves. In Judaism, we reject idol worship in whatever form it takes. It is a foundational concept of our religion.


BEGINNER MAH JONGG LESSONS RETURN IN MARCH



CELEBRATE WOMEN'S HISTORY MONTH WITH A GOOD BOOK

March is Women's History Month, and the <u>Rabbi Richard B. Safran</u> <u>Library</u> is full of books about strong Jewish women. From picture books to adult biographies, we have titles for all ages.

One of our newest books is the 2018 National Jewish Book Award finalist, *Regina Persisted*, by Sandy Eisenberg Sasso. This picture book tells the story of Regina Jonas, the first woman to be ordained as a rabbi. Other biographies for young readers cover Ruth Bader Ginsburg, ballerina Lily Marks/Alicia Markova, Emma Lazarus and Golda Meir.

Trina Robbins' *Lily Renee, Escape Artist: From Holocaust Survivor to Comic Book Pioneer* is one of our more popular books for middlegrade readers. Along with a plethora of books about Anne Frank, our juvenile biography section includes books about women from Gal Gadot and Dr. Ruth Westheimer to Judy Blume, Margaret Rey and Lise Meitner.


For teen readers, we have Aly Raisman's book, *Fierce* on our shelves, along with biographies of Elena Kagan, Margarita Engle and Betty Friedan. And we have a great collection by Emily Taitz, *Remarkable Jewish Women*.

In our adult biography collection, we have *The Woman Who Fought an Empire: Sarah Aaronsohn and Her Nili Spy Ring*, by Gregory Wallance, which was a National Jewish Book Award finalist last year. And the 2018 National Jewish Book of the Year was *Lioness: Golda Meir and the Nation of Israel*, by Francine Klagsbrun. Lynda Schuster's memoir, *Dirty Wars and Polished Silver: The Life and Times of a War Correspondent Turned Ambassatrix*, was recently discussed in our Temple Book Club. Other women covered in our adult collection include Ruth Bader Ginsburg, Marie Syrkin, Emma

Lazarus, and Katharine Graham.

Interested in the women in the Bible? We have a variety of titles on that subject as well, including adult women's commentaries, and story collections for children. One of our newest titles for middle-grade readers is Jane Yolen's *Meet Me at the Well: The Girls and Women of the Bible*.

WELCOME TO OUR NEW MEMBERS



Eva Kor, a Holocaust survivor and forgiveness advocate, will give a campus lecture on Monday, March 18 from 2 to 3 p.m. at Indiana Tech's Multi-Flex Theater in the Snyder Academic Center. She is one of the few surviving twins still sharing her personal account of the medical experiments supervised by Nazi doctor Josef Mengele at Auschwitz.

With the driving message of "never give up" in mind, Kor has emerged through a life filled with trauma as a brilliant example of the power of the human spirit to overcome. Founder of the CANDLES Museum in Terre Haute, Kor received the <u>Sachem Award</u>, one of Indiana's highest honors, in 2017. <u>Tickets are free.</u>
