To be responsible to our congregational community, the Temple's Board of Directors made the difficult decision to close our building beginning Friday afternoon, March 13 through at least Saturday, April 18 due to the COVID-19 global pandemic. All worship services, education classes, and social programs are canceled or being held by virtual communication methods.

Sadly, this means we will not have a second-night Seder on April 9 (see page 3) nor will we publicly be able to celebrate Leo Powell's Bar Mitzvah on April 4. (You're invited to share in Leo's simcha online.)

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RABBI MEIR BARGERON NAMED TEMPLE'S 24TH SPIRITUAL LEADER



We are very pleased to announce that Rabbi Meir Bargeron will join Congregation Achduth Vesholom on July 1 as the Temple's 24th spiritual leader.

Rabbi Meir will be ordained at Hebrew Union College -Jewish Institute of Religion in Los Angeles on May 17, 2020 and enters the rabbinate after a career

in clinical social work and nonprofit management in the health care sector. HUC-JIR has postponed the in-person graduation and ordination ceremonies and currently is working on plans to mark the occasion.

A native of Petoskey, Michigan, Rabbi Meir graduated from Michigan State University with a bachelor's degree in English Education. He began his working years in Silicon Valley and quickly learned how much he enjoyed working with people. This led him to complete a Master of Social Work degree at the University of St. Thomas and St. Catherine University in St. Paul, MN.

ADAPTING FOR AN UNUSUAL PASSOVER

Next year in Jerusalem

The words "Next Year in Jerusalem" are used to end every Pesach seder. They are used to remind us that we hope and pray each year that next year we will live in a world of peace, security, and freedom for all. I think this year, more than ever, these words resonate with us as we face a Passover without the physical presence of our friends, family and community. Sadly, we enter this Pesach with anxiety, fear and concern like what Jews have felt throughout the ages.

Our ancestors in Europe worried that during their seders someone would try to plant evidence that they were guilty of blood libel. During the time of the black plague, our ancestors worried they would be accused of spreading the disease. Many times in our history, some observed Passover in secret so neighbors would not know they were Jews.

And even the rabbis who created our seder rituals sat hidden in caves celebrating Passover out of view of the Romans. But celebrate they did because Passover gives us hope! Hope for freedom. Hope for the future and hope that all people and our world will be united and whole.

If the Coronavirus experience has taught us nothing else, it has certainly taught us how interconnected our world really is. We have learned how something from a city far away can affect all of us. We are truly one world, even if most of the time we forget that fact.

This Passover will be hard. We can't get all the foods we usually eat or use for our seder plates. We can't be with our loved ones in person. We can't invite our friends and neighbors to share our Passover experience in person. It won't be the same.

But not being the same doesn't mean it can't be fabulous!!! Fortunately, through the blessing of electronics, we can bring our loved ones into our homes. We can still cook a lovely meal and carry on our centuries-old rituals. We can definitely drink our four cups of wine (no driving to worry about this year!) and ask the four questions. We can also contemplate new questions about our world and the future.

In this newsletter and in the coming days, you will receive information about how to access materials for your family's seder. I will post videos to help guide you through the preparation for a seder and the various parts of the seder. We will gather to light the candles together on the first night of Passover on Wednesday, April 8 at 6 p.m. via Zoom to share in welcoming the holiday and greet each other.

We will rejoice in our community, our family, and our world this Passover and pray that next year we will be in the Jerusalem of our souls, reunited with family and friends and living in a world safe, secure, and free.

HAPPY 90TH BIRTHDAY TO RABBI SAFRAN!

Our Temple family wishes a very happy and healthy birthday to Rabbi Emeritus Richard B. Safran on his 90th birthday on Monday, April 6!

Rabbi Safran served as Achduth Vesholom's spiritual leader for 26 years, retiring in 1995. He's lived in Tucson for many years since.

ONLINE RESOURCES FOR BOOKS AND STORIES

With the <u>Rabbi Richard B. Safran Library</u> temporarily unavailable until the building re-opens, we're featuring resources that you can access at home to find Jewish books. There are several resources online for all ages of readers.

Beginning with the youngest readers, <u>PJ Library</u> has some wonderful kids' material on its website. In particular, "Listen" offers story podcasts and music audio for Jewish children. They also have a podcast, "Have I Got a Story for You!" that comes out monthly and features a Jewish folktale for kids. On the <u>PJ Library Facebook</u> page, they're offering virtual story times and craft-alongs and even virtual field trips.

Continuing the tradition of storytelling, <u>ReformJudaism.org</u> offers a weekly podcast called <u>"Stories We Tell,"</u> featuring a Jewish folktale or fairy tale. Read by various URJ Rabbis, the episodes are about five

minutes long and there are three years of weekly stories available.

For adults, the <u>Jewish Book Council</u> is the premiere resource for book suggestions, with book reviews, reading lists, and book club guides on their website. They have a new "Book Search"

option which allows you to search by genre and category. <u>Tablet magazine</u> is another good source for Jewish book reviews and ideas. Or if you're feeling really adventurous, check out the Online Digital Library at the <u>Yiddish Book Center</u>.

Rabbi Meir served the community as a leader in two nonprofit organizations in the health care sector before working in a group practice as a clinical social worker. Meanwhile, Rabbi Meir was an active member at Congregation Shir Tikvah, his home synagogue in Minneapolis, where he was a lay prayer leader, served on committees, and eventually served on the board of trustees. Jewishness and Judaism became the center of his life, and eventually he discerned a call to serve the Jewish people as a rabbi.

During his rabbinical education, Rabbi Meir served as a chaplaincy intern at a nursing home in Jerusalem and also at Cedars-Sinai Medical Center in Los Angeles, a student rabbi at Congregation B'nai David in Visalia, CA and a rabbinic intern at Congregation Or Ami in Calabasas, CA.

For the past two years, our Rabbinic Search Committee has been diligent in seeking the right rabbi for Achduth Vesholom. Thank you to Fran Adler and Mike Rush for their leadership and committee members Elissa Cohen, Bruce Colegrove, Marnie Lowden, Tom O'Neill, John Planer, Scott Salon, Mark Schneider, Wendy Soltz, and Sally Trotter for a job well done.

At Or Ami, Rabbi Meir taught in the religious school and led a program to engage teens in social action. He also provided guidance to a lay-led social justice team and to a group of older congregants as they built a village community within the congregation. Rabbi Meir coordinated communications and provided pastoral support as the congregation responded to the needs of those who were displaced or lost their homes in a series of wildfires. He continues this work to support congregational connection during the current public health crisis.

He also led High Holy Day services for two years for the Jewish community in Port Angeles, WA. Rabbi Meir's rabbinic thesis is titled "I Will Be What I Will Be: Biblical Texts for Those Who Are Becoming Jews," and provides pastoral commentaries to support those who are in the process of converting to Judaism. Rabbi Meir is married to Jon Tam, an engineer and college instructor.

The Temple's Board of Directors approved Rabbi Meir's hiring following the unanimous recommendation from the 11-member Rabbinic Search Committee chaired by Fran Adler and Mike Rush. We have signed a three-year contract.

In unanimously recommending Rabbi Meir to the board, the Search Committee members said they had "found a man who is warm, approachable, empathetic, and kind. He is intelligent and thoughtful and has a deep love of Judaism. He is eager to reach ordination and step into the position of a congregational rabbi. We were all very impressed with his authenticity."

The committee indicated that "the reason we even considered a soon-to-be-ordained student is that Meir came to the rabbinate as a second career, with a strong background in social work. He is mature, has tremendous life experience, and has the confidence to take on new challenges."

As July approaches, we'll keep you informed about opportunities to welcome Rabbi Meir and Jon. A Transition Committee will be named to assist them in getting settled in Fort Wayne and at Achduth Vesholom.

Rabbi Paula Jayne Winnig, who began serving as our Interim Rabbi in August 2019, will continue as our spiritual leader through June 30, 2020 before assuming a new post as Interim Rabbi at Congregation Rodef Sholom in Youngstown, Ohio. Please save the date to join us for services and an Oneg Shabbat in honor of Rabbi Winnig on Friday, June 26.

The Temple staff is working remotely and keeping all aspects of the operations of our congregation running. Phones are forwarded and messages listened to regularly. Email is continually monitored and mail that comes through the postal service is picked up. Rabbi Winnig is available for virtual visits and phone calls.

Individually and collectively, our day-to-day life has been upended during the past few weeks. Though the Temple is unable open its doors right now as a destination for Jewish community, we've shifted to offer online options to bring us together and continue to connect.


The decision to close

During the days and hours before the board meeting on March 12, closings of schools, decline of the stock market, cancellation of large gatherings, and worrisome news from health officials were accelerating. We moved the board meeting from the conference room to the main area of the Madge Rothschild Resource Center to allow for sitting farther apart and practicing social distancing.


A lengthy discussion about whether to close the building included the Temple board, along with Jaki Schreier, Executive Director of the Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne.

While everyone felt that action was necessary, concerns were discussed about the impact on our Campus Partners, including Brightpoint Head Start and its preschool program for low-income children ages 3-5. (Brightpoint later decided to close through May 1.)

The Temple board also decided that all Achduth Vesholom employees would be paid during the closing.



Rabbi Winnig offered a Shabbat greeting on Facebook that was recorded in the Sanctuary on March 13 - a last message in the building before the Temple closed in response to the COVID-19 health emergency.



With the Temple closed, some members shared Shabbat dinner with family at home and attended an online worship service.

Once the leadership decided to temporarily close our doors, the Temple's staff and volunteers stepped up to help. Phone calls were made immediately that evening to those impacted by the cancellation of a Religious School dinner the next evening, an upcoming simcha, and the second Seder.

The next morning, President Ellen Tom, Rabbi Winnig, Executive Director Samara Sheray, Administrative Assistant Marie McFadden, and Communications Committee Chair Beth Zweig consulted to develop plans and inform congregants and Campus Partners.

A letter from Rabbi Winnig and Ellen went by email to members and was posted on the Temple website and Facebook page. A Callingpost went to all members (to make sure to reach those without internet access). The ROMEOs (Retired Old Men Eating Out) and mah jongg players were alerted to cancel plans for the time being.

Phone-forwarding and voice-mail procedures were checked so we could maintain operations. A list of yahrzeit names for the coming weeks was prepped. Videoconferencing and livestream options were explored. We reviewed plans with Bonnie Pomerantz at the Federation and the postal carrier who brings our mail to maintain smooth operations.

Maintenance Chief Clint Rossiter and Anna Rossiter continued cleaning efforts and discussed plans to disinfect the building before we reopen.

Within an hour of closing and before Shabbat on March 13, Rabbi Winnig posted a video on our Facebook page with a message recorded in the Sanctuary offering her thoughts and the blessing over the Sabbath candles. In other posts, she said a Mishebeirach prayer of healing, as well as read yahrzeits and led Kaddish for our Achduth Vesholom family.

By Monday, March 17, Achduth Vesholom's leadership and Caring Committee began partnering with the Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne to reach out to the Jewish community to offer good wishes and support through virtual visits, food shopping, or helping with other needs.

The move to virtual community

On Fridays during the weeks of closing, Rabbi Winnig posts on the Temple's Facebook page to offer a Shabbat message, light candles, say Mishebeirach, read yahrzeits and recite Kaddish.

The Temple also has added new adult education sessions, including a Lunch & Learn class, with Rabbi Winnig online via Zoom videoconferencing. As sessions are planned, links are provided to members and subscribers in our weekly email on Thursdays and to the general community on our <u>Facebook page</u> and <u>website</u>. We've also made arrangements for a virtual service for Leo Powell's Bar Mitzvah.



We are providing links to online Shabbat services all over the U.S. and some of the other Jewish offerings. Our monthly Bulletin continues to be sent by e-mail with congregational news.

Our staff and volunteers have participated in virtual meetings with others in the Reform Movement to share ideas and resources.

<u>Maestro Robert Nance</u>, who has shared a musical piece on his Facebook page every day of the national emergency, reached out with <u>Shabbat greetings</u> to our Fort Wayne Jewish community. "Mi Chamocha," "Oseh Shalom," and "Mi Shebeirach" were the featured pieces. Bob played piano with vocals by Temple member Stanley Levine and Brian Sussman of <u>Heartland Sings</u>.

Several of our members were among the 400+ people who participated in a virtual Havdalah service on Saturday, March 21 sponsored by Goldman Union Camp Institute, our regional Union for Reform Judaism camp, as part of their new GUCI Gatherings.

Rabbi Winnig and Bruce Colegrove continue to teach their Hebrew students using internet conferencing.

Temple committees continue to meet via conference call. Our staff and leadership continue to be in touch and are navigating as the situation evolves.

Now what?

We wait and see what health and government officials recommend.

Allen County Health Commissioner Dr. Deborah McMahan issued an order beginning March 22 prohibiting church gatherings of more than 10 people. She encouraged places of worship to utilize online opportunities to meet spiritual needs and to encourage social distancing and avoiding any nonessential gatherings.

The Temple board will consult in the coming weeks to see when we can re-open for Shabbat worship and in-person events. We are postponing Mitzvah Day on Sunday, April 19, the L'dor Vador Shabbat service on Friday, May 1, and the Holocaust Symposium on Monday, June 15.

While we can't anticipate dates yet, we look forward to dedicating the newly remodeled Goldstine-B'nai Jacob Chapel, to celebrating in-person the milestone of Leo Powell becoming a Bar Mitzvah, and being together for Shabbat, meetings, and special occasions.

In the meantime, we need to work hard to stay connected to each other. Please keep in touch with each other. Please reach out to help people who might be in need of food assistance. Please stay calm and peaceful as we heal our bodies and our world in the coming weeks.

WORLD ZIONIST CONGRESS ELECTION NEWS

Voting for U.S. representatives to the <u>World Zionist Congress</u>, the international "parliament of the Jewish people," ended on March 11 and was conducted primarily online at <u>ZionistElection.org</u> with thousands of paper ballots also sent in by postal mail. Find <u>election results</u>.

The seven-week U.S. election for the World Zionist Congress garnered over 120,000 votes, more than double the turnout of the last election in 2015 and the highest number of votes since the election began for the entire American Jewish community 30 years ago.

<u>ARZA</u>/Vote Reform and Reconstructionist Movement won the election, garnering 31,500 votes, an increase of nearly 50% from the 2015 election, putting it in position to lead a powerful progressive block to work in the name of Reform values: pluralism, equality, and freedom.

"The election results demonstrate the strength of our platform, and the Vote Reform slate is ready and eager to help build a democratic society in Israel that truly reflects the Jewish values we hold dear: pluralism, equality, economic justice, and peace," says said Rabbi Josh Weinberg, URJ's vice president for Israel and Reform Zionism and the executive director of ARZA, the Association of Reform Zionists of America.

American Zionist Movement Movement התנועה הציונית האמריקאית

A total of 15 slates, composed of nearly 1,800 candidates, were vying for 152 American seats for the Congress during the election organized and facilitated in the US by the American Zionist Movement (AZM).

The World Zionist Organization designates representatives to The Jewish Agency for Israel, The Jewish National Fund, and other affiliates. The Congress meets every five years in Jerusalem, and it is the only body in which all of World Jewry is represented democratically. These decisions influence hundreds of millions of dollars in funding and paid portfolios.

After the votes are certified, the number of delegates per slate will be apportioned using a formula outlined in the official election rules. The 38th World Zionist Congress is scheduled to be held in Jerusalem from October 20-22, 2020.

APRIL IS GENOCIDE AWARENESS MONTH



Due to the current health emergency, Fort Wayne's annual Yom Hashoah commemoration this month has been postponed by the <u>Jewish Federation of Fort</u> Wayne.

Achduth Vesholom also has postponed its Holocaust education program planned for June and the keynote address by David Estrin, grandson of four Holocaust survivors

who is the founder and chief executive officer of Together We Remember. <u>Together We Remember</u> is a nonprofit organization dedicated to transforming remembrance of the past into a global movement to advocate for victims of atrocities, genocide, and identity-based violence.

April is Genocide Awareness Month. During the coming weeks, Together We Remember is transforming its in-person events into virtual experiences and helping others do the same. Find the events. The group notes:

"At a time when we have to come together to counter hate, the Coronavirus is keeping us apart. The haters and deniers won't rest and neither will we. That's why we're taking our national campaign online to transform remembrance into action."

Join the founders and architects behind the #TogetherWeRemember movement for the official (virtual) launch of the national campaign on Wednesday, April 1 at 8 p.m. During the meeting, the organization will commemorate and celebrate life and share its vision for Genocide Awareness Month and how to get involved in a meaningful way from the comfort and safety of your home. Expect speakers and maybe even a few special performances in the global TWR community.

Events include a <u>Virtual Yom Hashoah Ceremony</u>: 75 Years After Liberation, Turning Memory Into Action on Sunday, April 19 from 5 to 6:30 p.m. with the Los Angeles Museum of the Holocaust.
