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
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RESERVE NOW FOR OUR TEMPLE BOOK CLUB!



Our first "official" Temple Book Club on Tuesday, May 9 at 7 p.m. focuses on the thriller [Saving Sophie](#) by Chicago author [Ronald Balson](#), best known for his earlier novel *Once We Were Brothers*.

Saving Sophie follows Chicago accountant

Jack Sommers, as he tries to rescue his daughter, Sophie, from her maternal grandfather, who is a suspected Palestinian terrorist. Jack also happens to be a suspect in a huge embezzlement case and is on the run.

Pick up the book and reserve your seat for our program, including a 45-minute discussion with

the author via teleconference. Those attending will have the opportunity to give input on reading material for the group going forward. Resources will be available from the [Jewish Book Council](#), the sponsor of the "Live Chat" with the author, to help plan for the group. We plan to continue with three author chats next year.

There is no cost to attend, though we encourage members to purchase the book wherever possible (that is part of our agreement for the video-conference program). We do have one copy of *Saving Sophie* in our library at the Madge Rothschild Resource Center. To facilitate discussion, space is limited. CELEBRATE SHAVUOT WITH US

Plan to join us on Friday, June 2 at 7:30 p.m. when Rabbi Lenny leads our celebration of Shavuot, the Jewish festival marking the giving of the Torah on Mount Sinai. An Oneg Shabbat follows.



Shavuot, the Hebrew word for "weeks," occurs seven weeks after Passover. In ancient times, Shavuot marked the conclusion of the spring barley harvest and beginning of the summer wheat harvest.

THE IMPORTANCE OF HONOR AND RESPECT



Have you ever wondered about this mysterious time in the Jewish calendar called the sefirah, in which we count the omer? It is the time of the year between Passover and Shavuot. There is a custom during this time to mourn as a people. Why do we mourn as a people? Traditionally, there are no weddings or haircuts until Lag Ba'omer (the thirty-third day of the omer). The word omer, meaning "sheaf," is a dry measure-

ment of grain which was originally brought as an offering to God in anticipation of the new barley harvest.

The omer commandment seems fairly innocuous. Why then is this traditionally a period of mourning? In fact, the case could be made that this time was not only an agriculturally exciting one for our ancestors, but also a spiritually uplifting one as we moved from our liberation from Egypt to the foot of Mt. Sinai, counting down (or up) to receive the Torah.

One story in our history radically changed the nature of the counting of the omer from a joyous anticipation of a prosperous harvest and the yearly re-enactment of revelation at Mt. Sinai to a time in which we mourn. In the Talmud we are taught that during the period of counting the omer, 12,000 pairs of students of Rabbi Akiva perished on one day. The initial reason the Gemara gives is that they did not have kavod (honor or respect) for one another.

It is not difficult to imagine the way in which a disagreement over interpretation or halakhic practice could become heated, particularly about an issue which hits home personally. Within our own Reform Movement today there are many such "hot button" issues about which people are deeply passionate and continue to fundamentally disagree. The old adage about two Jews in a room ending up with three opinions is never more fitting than for our movement today. The lively discussions and representations of a wide variety of ideas are, I believe, the main reasons for Reform Judaism's continued vitality and dynamism.

There is, however, one very serious danger which threatens this pluralism, and that is a loss of respect for those with whom you disagree. The loss of dignified discourse destroys the ability for differing perspectives to coexist and hinders the free exchange of ideas – a characteristic that seems to pervade our secular politics today. The Talmud could have easily attributed the tragedy of Rabbi Akiva's students to a plague, whether natural or at the hands of the Romans. Instead our sages chose to ascribe it to a loss of kavod as a powerful reminder of what can happen to us when we forget how to conduct discourse grounded in honor and respect.

Ironically it is one of Rabbi Akiva's later students, Rabbi Eleazar Ben Shamua, who helps define for us the importance of kavod. He teaches in Pirkei Avot, "The dignity (kevod) of your student should be as precious to you as your own; the dignity (kevod) of your colleague should be as precious to you as your reverence for your teacher; your reverence for your teacher should be as great as your reverence for God" (Pirkei Avot 4:15). Taking this lesson to heart in the context of the sefirah, may we dedicate ourselves to discourse with honor with each other, thereby giving honor to the Torah and to God. Amen.

INSPIRED BY "FAMILY?" WE HAVE LOTS TO OFFER IN RESOURCE CENTER

For those inspired by David Laskin's presentation at our Grand Opening on April 30, we have [a number of related titles](#) in the Rabbi Richard B. Safran Library, along with Laskin's wonderful book [The Family: A Journey Into The Heart Of The Twentieth Century](#).

[Paper Love: Searching for the Girl My Grandfather Left Behind](#) by Sarah Wildman is another well-written quest for a family story based on letters discovered by the author. This one is more of a mystery than Laskin's book, as the reader is kept wondering what happened to the girl throughout the book. Like Family and several other titles, the focus is on victims of the Holocaust, but Wildman's book stands out by revealing the picture through the eyes of the survivors in this country. It is well worth a read. Other adult family histories in our collection include Daniel Mendelsohn's [The Lost: A Search for Six of Six Million](#) and Alan Weisman's [An Echo in My Blood: The Search for My Family's Past](#).



Just researching your name can prove fascinating, and we have several titles to help with that as well. A personal favorite is Ben Zion Kaganoff's *Dictionary of Jewish Names and Their History*. Although there is a dictionary included, a significant part of the book includes stories of the origins of Jewish names which are quite interesting. *Jewish Personal Names* by Shmuel Gorr and *Dictionary of Jewish Surnames from the Russian Empire* by Alexander Beider are also useful.

There are many family titles in our children's collection as well. For the budding genealogist, we have the official Ellis Island handbook, [Do People Grow on Family Trees?](#) by Ira Wolfman. [Grandma Esther Remembers](#) by Ann Morris may be inspiring to both younger and older generations, especially those considering writing down their stories. Among our many picture books are two favorites by [Patricia Polacco](#) – *The Keeping Quilt* and *The Blessing Cup* – both beautiful family histories in their own way, traced through heirlooms passed down through generations.

If you are inspired to dig into your own family's history, we have some of the classics in our collection to help you with that. [From Generation to Generation](#) by Arthur Kurzweil has long been considered the book for Jewish genealogy and family history. Miriam Weiner is another well-known author and researcher. We have her Encyclopedia of Jewish Genealogy as well as Jewish Roots in Ukraine and Moldova and Jewish Roots in Poland. And if the potential of DNA testing interests you, you might want to check out [Legacy: A Genetic History of the Jewish People](#) by Harry Ostrer.

Finally, remember that there are resources within our congregation that might be of help. If you haven't yet heard Irv Adler's family history presentation, plan to attend on Tuesday, June 6 at 7 p.m. And our Librarian Betsy Gephart has written numerous family history books for her daughters and would be happy to help you get started in that area. If you're at all curious about your family history, stop in and check us out!

WHAT DIFFERENTIATES REFORM, CONSERVATIVE AND ORTHODOX JUDAISM

As I write, we're preparing for the Grand Opening of the Madge Rothschild Resource Center on Sunday, April 30. This beautiful new addition is the centerpiece of our Rifkin Campus at 5200 project that formally began in 2012 when our membership adopted a plan to re-envision Congregation Achduth Vesholom as a Jewish community center.



Since we broke ground for the Resource Center in October 2015, Rifkin Campus Co-Chairs Sally Trotter and John Stein have worked tirelessly to bring the project to fruition. From fundraising duties to coordinating contractors, designers, and volunteers, Sally and John have persevered throughout the many months of the project, balancing the challenges involved in building with the rewards of the impressive new space.

Designed by Architect Richard Wismer, the 3,150-square-foot Resource Center will help our congregation welcome more members of the Fort Wayne community through its doors for educational, cultural, and other programs. Betsy Gephart has put considerable thought and talent into all aspects of the new Rabbi Richard B. Safran Library, which boasts many new titles donated through Betty's 100 Books and all sorts of touches that make it a very comfortable place to browse, borrow, or read.

The entry to the resource center featuring the Jacob L. Goldman Memorial Museum is still a work in progress. It's continuing to take shape with a focus on the Jewish experience in Northeast Indiana over the past two centuries. I'm looking forward to seeing the large timeline covering that period of history developed by Wendy Soltz, John Stein and Beth Zweig.

The museum displays will provide a chance to learn about Jewish holidays and traditions, highlight our Holocaust Torah remnant, and share aspects of our culture and customs. In the hallway leading to the Resource Center, a special donor wall shows appreciation to those who contributed to the Rifkin Campus Campaign, while a new replica of an olive tree will provide an opportunity to recognize donations to the Resource Center moving forward. We also look forward to developing the proposed sculpture garden in the 1,100-square-foot inner courtyard.

We are grateful for the generosity of the Rifkin Family Foundation and the Madge Rothschild Foundation as lead donors for our project. We are continuing to work with our Campus Partners – the Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne, the Fort Wayne Jewish Cemetery Association, IPFW's Institute for Holocaust and Genocide Studies, and Brightpoint Head Start. This truly will be a place for the entire community to enjoy for years to come.

Although the completion of the Resource Center has taken longer than expected and some finishing touches are still to come, the space already is being enjoyed for activities from photo exhibits to mah jongg. We also await a new Rifkin Campus sign in front of the building to replace the one by Sculptor Cary Shafer that was damaged by extreme winds.

With the completion of the Resource Center and the amenities in the Rifkin Campus at 5200, the Temple is creating new ways for the Jewish and non-Jewish community to come together and also opening new opportunities for revenue through our facility.

When our Congregation works together for a common goal, it is amazing what we can accomplish! We'll be celebrating this great achievement for a long time to come.
