

RABBI LENNY SARKO BALANCING HOSPITALITY AND FEAR



It is a difficult and complex world today. Everything moves fast and change can happen before a person realizes it. Violence in our society may or may not have increased over the years. Regardless, because our communications and news agencies are so much faster and in every corner of our world, our knowledge of every violent act is in the forefront of our existence.

The idea of hospitality is foundational in Judaism, as it is with most religious institutions. How do we balance the idea of hospitality with the fear and/or reality of violence? When we see on the news that a school or church shooting kills people, our thoughts naturally turn to what if that happened to us. This causes us to react in ways that are not always productive.

Our reaction to violence tends to make us install greater security at all points of entry to our buildings, to install cameras, and to shrink back to a type of xenophobia – a comfort of interaction with only those people we know. An unknown person comes to our Temple. We stop them electronically at the door, ask for ID, and question why they have come to our building. Although prudent for our own protection, how does that make the newcomer feel? From their perspective, we are unwelcoming, unhospitable, and a place they do not want to be. From our part, we are simply protecting ourselves from a violent world. I recently had lunch with a local Christian clergyman. Just a year or so back, he was deployed as part of our armed services and did multiple stints in places like Iraq and Afghanistan. He told me something I never realized. He said that even after significant training and extended practice with live ammunition, a high percentage of soldiers when first faced with live fire, do not react properly in the firing of their weapons. Some freeze and cannot shoot at all. Most cannot even come close to hitting their target.

We hear proposals about arming teachers to protect our children in the classroom from those who wish to harm them. By arming even trained teachers, we may well endanger the very lives we are trying to protect. This clergyman stated emphatically that this immediate reaction to school shootings by arming teachers is perhaps the worst idea we could employ.

I understand that it is possible to go too far the other way as well. To be so open and welcoming as to invite attack is also not prudent. We cannot and should not be naive. A person we do not know comes to our Temple. How do we act? How much do we question? How do we balance the need for safety and the application of hospitality?

We have to remember that we are a religious institution. If we have to err, it needs to be on the side of welcoming. It may not be the safest route, but we need to remember what this institution stands for. We can keep our door locked and employ the procedure of buzzing people in to enter our building. BUT – when we talk to them, it needs to be friendly, open and welcoming.

AMERICANS AND THE HOLOCAUST FOCUS OF KEYNOTE

Dr. Rebecca Erbelding, the keynote speaker at a six-day Symposium to educate tomorrow's teachers about the Holocaust, will discuss "Americans and the Holocaust" on Wednesday, May 16 at 7 p.m. at the Temple in a program open to the public.

A historian, curator, and archivist for 15 years at the <u>United</u>. <u>States Holocaust Memorial Museum</u>, Dr. Erbelding is currently a historian for the USHMM's exhibition that opened in April on Americans and the Holocaust and author of *Rescue Board: The Untold Story of America's Efforts to Save the Jews of Europe*. She holds a PhD in American history from George Mason University. Her speech will look at questions that include "What did Americans know about the Nazi persecution and murder of European Jews, and what did they do about it?"

Dr. Erbelding will examine the motives, pressures, and fears that shaped Americans' responses to Nazism, the refugee crisis, war, and the genocide in Europe during the 1930s and 1940s.

Her visit is part of the second <u>Holocaust symposium</u> sponsored by The Temple's Holocaust Education Committee and <u>IPFW's</u> <u>Institute for Holocaust and Genocide Studies</u> on May 13-18 on the IPFW campus for pre-service teachers interested in learning more about teaching the Holocaust and genocide. Thank you to the Dr. Harry W. Salon Foundation for its support of Dr. Erbelding's visit.

We encourage you to share in this meaningful mitzvah effort even if you don't have loved ones buried at Lindenwood. Many of the headstones are quite old.

Achduth Vesholom was organized in 1848 as a Society for Visiting the Sick and Burying the Dead. In 1884, the Temple purchased two acres of land at Lindenwood Cemetery, having outgrown its original burial ground near McCulloch Park. Over the next decade, graves were relocated to the Jewish section of Lindenwood. The original Y section contains space for about 1,100 graves. In 1999, the Temple purchased additional land at Lindenwood, the YY section, to accommodate 209 more plots.

Dress appropriately for the weather, including boots if it has rained recently. Gym shoes are recommended. If you would like, bring a blanket/towel/stool to kneel on while cleaning.
