SPECIAL SHAVUOT SERVICE IN HONOR OF RABBI LENNY

Please join us for a special Shavuot service and Oneg Shabbat on Friday, June 7 at 7:30 p.m. honoring Rabbi Lenny Sarko for serving as our spiritual leader for the past three years. We'll have an opportunity to offer our good wishes and offer a blessing as a congregation for Rabbi Lenny and Karen.

Rabbi Lenny, who finishes his tenure at Achduth Vesholom on June 30, became our 22nd spiritual leader in July 2016. During that time, he taught a well-attended weekly Talmud class, added Torah readings on Shabbat evenings, and developed our TempleConnect video-conferencing system for services and programs. He also organized interfaith programs in the community around the National Geographic film "Jerusalem" and a traveling art exhibit focused on Shabbat.

During the service, Rabbi Lenny will share insights about <u>Shavuot</u>, which marks the giving of the Torah on Mt. Sinai. In ancient times, Shavuot marked the conclusion of the spring barley harvest and the beginning of the summer

wheat harvest. It is customary to eat dairy foods on the holiday to symbolize the sweetness of Torah and the association of Israel as the land of milk and honey.

RABBI LENNY SARKO MARKING SHAVUOT IN NEW WAYS



The holiday <u>Shavuot</u> is found in the month of June. Along with Passover and Sukkot, it is known as the Shalosh Regalim, the three pilgrimage holidays. A time when Jews of Temple days would make a special trip to Jerusalem to bring an offering. We are aware of the importance of pilgrimage from our Muslim friends, who to this day make a trip to Mecca or Medina at some point in their lives. Yet, since the destruction

of the Second Temple, the practice for the Jewish people has waned.

Shavuot is significant for Jewish meaning. The word itself means "weeks." We count the Omer for 49 days (seven weeks) and on the 50th day from the Egyptian Exodus, the Jewish people received the Torah on Mt. Sinai.

Biblical commentary asked the question, why did the people have to wait to receive the Torah? Why didn't God give it on leaving Egypt or when they crossed the Reed Sea? Most believe it was because the people were mentally not ready yet to receive it.

Slavery was still fresh in their minds, and as such it was believed they could not yet comprehend what they would need to have Torah and to fully practice Judaism as a way of life. It would take 50 days for them to mentally prepare, and it can be argued that even then they were truly not ready or understood what it meant to be free and to accept this way of life.

In Biblical days, the people would bring their first harvested fruits to the Temple. In the Middle Ages, many communities would come together to do a study session that might last all night. This festival was a major mark on the calendar. After the formation of Israel in 1948, kibbutzim would put together elaborate festivals of fruit complete with parades, singing and dancing.

You would think that the receipt of the Torah would be cause for a major celebration, but in our modern world Shavuot is hardly recognized. A shift occurred, and the celebration of the Torah was found most often as part of Simchat Torah, a festival found after Yom Kippur, in the fall. This is the time when we finish the reading of the fifth book of the Five Books of Moses and immediately start over with Bereshit – Genesis, on the same day. Most congregations and communities do elaborate festivals for Simchat Torah, but rarely do you find much done for Shavuot.

I would like to suggest that this year, families do just a little something to mark the occasion. Dairy foods are traditional for the holiday in reflection of the comparison of the land of Israel to a land of milk and honey. Perhaps as part of a June dinner, close to June 8, the day of Shavuot, serve some blintzes or honey cakes or cheesecakes and let everyone know at the table why. Perhaps read the book of Ruth, the small scroll associated with this holiday. You might also do a little study of a Jewish text. Try to mark and remember the importance of the receipt of the Torah by the Jewish people at Mt. Sinai.

JOIN OUR TEMPLE FAMILY FOR VIOLINS OF HOPE FINAL CONCERT

We're looking forward to <u>Violins of Hope</u>, a community-wide series of events coming to Fort Wayne on November 9-24 and organized by the <u>Jewish</u> <u>Federation of Fort Wayne</u> and the <u>Fort Wayne Philharmonic</u>.

The Temple has reserved a block of seats for the final concert by the Fort Wayne Philharmonic on Saturday, November 23 at 7:30 p.m. at the Embassy Theatre, featuring 16 violins that survived the Holocaust and three composers banned by the Nazis.

Members of Achduth Vesholom may purchase seats in the block by making a reservation with payment to the Temple office at (260) 744-4245 no later than Wednesday, July 17. Cost is \$53 per ticket. Seats will be on the main floor, left of center. Checks should be made out to "CAV: The Temple." We will not order extra tickets, so please make your payment by the deadline to ensure a seat with our Temple family. No refunds will be issued for cancellations.

We anticipate this will be a popular event in the community. The Philharmonic will begin ticket sales to the public in August.

What is Violins of Hope? <u>Violins of Hope</u> is described as "a collection of instruments that tell remarkable stories of the defiance, resilience, and legacy of Jewish musicians during the Holocaust, and of the Israeli violinmaker dedicated to bringing these inspirational Strings of the Holocaust back to life."

Save the date: Our Shabbat service on Friday, November 15 at 7 p.m. will combine traditional prayers and songs with music performed on the Violins of Hope.


CONGRATULATIONS TO OUR GRADUATES:

AGREEMENT WITH B'NAI JACOB AND BYLAWS CHANGE ON AGENDA FOR ANNUAL MEETING

Please join us on Wednesday, June 12 at 7 p.m. at the Temple's 171st Annual Meeting when we vote on a proposed agreement with Congregation B'nai Jacob about coming together as one congregation with two traditions.



Members of Congregation B'nai Jacob approved the proposal at their annual meeting on May 19. If **MEETING**

approved by the members of Achduth Vesholom, then the transition to one congregation would begin over the summer. The leadership of B'nai Jacob also announced to its members that they have accepted an offer to sell the synagogue building on Bittersweet Moors Drive.

Information about the proposed framework of the agreement with B'nai Jacob was mailed to Temple members and the focus of two town hall meetings in April. Updates will be shared prior to the vote at the annual meeting.

Congregants also will vote on proposed bylaws changes that expand eligibility for election to the Temple's Board of Directors to include non-Jewish members of the congregation. Under the proposal, non-Jewish members would be able to serve on the board in any position except President and chair of the Ritual Committee.

In addition to the proposals, we'll vote on candidates for leadership and the budget for the next fiscal year. President Ellen Tom and the Board of Directors will update the congregation on efforts of the Rabbinic Search Committee and the past year's activities.

The change to our bylaws is recommended by the Temple's leadership in recognition of the increased number of interfaith families, the valuable contributions made by non-Jewish members, and the desire to be more inclusive. Our current bylaws prohibit non-Jewish members from serving on the board. Membership in our congregation is open to any Jewish adult and any spouse or domestic partner of a member "who wishes to associate with and follow the principles of this congregation," according to the bylaws.

The annual meeting of our membership will include the presentation of the William Brosler Award to a member whose long-term involvement at the Temple and commitment to the congregation have gone above and beyond. We also will recognize:

- Outgoing Board Members: Betsy Gephart (Vice President Programs), Jamie Berger, Elissa Cohen, and John Stein
- **Members of the L'dor Vador Legacy Society** for indicating they've made a planned gift to the congregation.

Absentee ballots, agendas, and the proposed budget will be available beginning Wednesday, May 29 in the Temple office. To be eligible to vote, members must be current in their financial obligations to the congregation.

FORT WAYNE JEWISH COMMUNITY STANDS TOGETHER
