Their dedication to the Temple led both to be honored with the William Brosler Award for Outstanding Volunteerism on June 13 at our 170th Annual Meeting. President Ellen Tom announced the recipients of the award, which recognizes members whose involvement in and commitment to the Temple goes above and beyond that of other volunteers. The award is intended to honor a lifetime of service to the congregation – even though we want our volunteers to keep on volunteering.

RABBI LENNY SARKO SUMMER OFFERS NEW WAYS TO EXPERIENCE JUDAISM



Synagogue life in the summer slows to a crawl. In some respects, this is nice as it gives those who administer and operate Achduth Vesholom a time to breathe a bit easier than the normal multiple tasks we are involved with during the remainder of the year. It also allows time for examination of the past year and to make plans for the following year, not to mention a break prior to the monumental task of the early fall High Holy Days.

Although synagogue life modifies a bit, Judaism, and its involvement in our lives, never slows. It simply takes on different faces, different directions. From a rabbinic perspective, we hope the summer provides our congregants the opportunity to apply Jewish concepts outside of the synagogue. That the mitzvot are tried out in all sorts of locations and that congregants see how Judaism is applied in our day-to-day lives.

One example is with our children. Some of them had the opportunity to attend Jewish camp, such as Camp Joe or GUCI. Young people doing prayers together in a location not the synagogue find this experience bonding with others of their own age. They find new relevance to an activity that seems repetitive and not very relevant when continually only done at the synagogue. Many families do not use prayer in the home and so the application of this aspect of Judaism takes on new

meanings in this different environment. Camp life also gives children an opportunity to make Jewish friends. They find out how much they have in common with each other. Many of the friendships made in these camps last a lifetime and turn out to be very important foundations in their lives.

Adults also get opportunities to apply Judaism in different ways across a summer. You might have a cookout and invite some Jewish friends over. There are times for small excursions that help form bonds between people. No differently than the children, adults find many common bonds with other Jewish people. They make and extend friendships as a result of the opportunities to get together.

Summer is a time for vacations. These might be with family and/ or friends. Again, we have opportunities to explore and apply our Jewish roots in locations not the synagogue. Perhaps it is visiting a museum or historical site and recognizing the Jewish role in those places. Perhaps it is just an opportunity to get closer to family and/or friends.

Others take the summer as a time to explore new charitable works with our children. Learning the realities of Tzedakah in a less intense environment. All can be done in recognition of how our Judaism informs our decisions and in what we do.

I hope the summer has been nice for you and I look forward to praying together as we meet across our High Holy Day season.



News from the 170th annual meeting

President Ellen Tom highlighted the congregation's many activities during the past year. These included the Operations Study spearheaded by Irv Adler, which helped us identify ways to streamline processes to allow the Board to focus more on strategic initiatives and long-range planning.

Ellen mentioned many programs, including Hot Topics Shabbat, Home Shabbat, Temple Book Club, and th esecond Holocaust Symposium. Rabbi Lenny taught Talmud weekly, conversion classes, and adult b'nei mitzvah.

The congregation supported youth and interfaith programs, ROMEO-hosted events, the Seven Species of Israel adult ed series, Thoughtful Thursdays, and Mitzvah Day, to name a few. We marked Melissa Kessel's 25 years teaching in our Religious School. The Madge Rothschild Resource Center was transformed with the addition of the Northeast Indiana Jewish history timeline and photo mural.

Ellen thanked committee chairs, staff, and all the volunteers who do so much. The 16th Annual Corned Beef Fundraiser chaired by Larry Adelman, Jaki Schreier, and Steve Zacher sold 1,300 sandwiches and raised a record \$23,000.

The focus for next year, Ellen said, will include exploring ways to increase and retain members, exercise fiscal responsibility and seek improved financial investment strategies, and enhance our opportunities to partner with the Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne and Congregation B'nai Jacob.

Finances

Treasurer Scott Goldberg said we began the 2017-2018 fiscal year anticipating a small deficit and ended with a large surplus thanks to two generous bequests, an extremely successful Corned Beef Fundraiser, and lower than anticipated expenses.

During the coming year, Scott said, we'll continue to look at fundraising and other financial opportunities beyond dues and the Endowment Fund. He reported that our membership numbers 148 households.

The congregation approved the fiscal year 2018-2019 budget of \$410,105, with anticipated revenues of \$395,897. Steve Zacher, Vice President for Finance, explained that some of that difference comes from the expanded duties of the Executive Director position. Those additional costs will be covered for the next few years from recent bequests, Steve said, leaving an expected \$4,200 deficit for the coming year. He said the amount is manageable due to our special reserve funds.

Steve, who is co-chairing the upcoming 17th annual Corned Beef Fundraiser with Chuck Replane, said we are budgeting \$20,000 in income from the sale.

Bylaws Changes Approved

The congregation unanimously approved changes to the bylaws restructuring the board to integrate the role of the Treasurer into the Vice President

Finance position and reducing the size of the Board of Directors. Under the new plan, a minimum of 10 officers and trustees are required, down from a maximum of 17. The Immediate Past President still continues to serve for one year following his/her term. The changes take effect July 1.

Rabbi's Report

Rabbi Lenny Sarko reflected on the past year and the many duties of our spiritual leader. He emphasized that a rabbi is pulled in many directions. Rabbi Lenny described his schedule, including preparation time for services, adult and Religious School classes, attending meetings, involvement in the communiy, providing pastoral care, and officiating at life-cycle events, and providing rabbinic coverage when requested in Northern Indiana.

New Board Elected for 2018-2019

Board Development Chair Elissa Cohen presented the slate of candidates. Officers and trustees were elected at the Annual Meeting for the new fiscal year beginning July 1:

Officers: President Ellen Tom is completing a two-year term, ending in June 2019. Elected to one-year terms: VP Programs Betsy Gephart, VP Finance Steve Zacher, and Secretary Kathy Sider.

Trustees: Elected to a two-year term ending in June 2020 were Talia Bugel, Elissa Cohen, Bobbie Golani, and Scott Goldberg.

Trustees Who Were Not Up for Re-election: Jessica Ash, Jamie Berger, Denny Reynolds, John Stein, Wendi Wallet, and Beth Zweig. They are serving two-year terms that end in June 2019.

Outgoing Board Members

We thanked outgoing board members - Immediate Past President Joe Cohen and outgoing trustees Steve Carr, Leah Hadashi, and Richard Manalis - for their service to the congregation. In appreciation, a bookplate was added to our High Holy Days prayer books honoring each

Joe Cohen has been the Temple's legal expert for many years, advising us on a variety of congregational matters, whether construction agreements, employee handbooks, job descriptions, bylaws, or rabbinic contracts.

In addition to helping Achduth Vesholom behind the scenes, Joe has served as chair of Mitzvah Day and member of the Board Development Committee. He led us as president for two years and just completed a year as Immediate Past President.

In appreciation for his dedication, President Ellen Tom presented Joe with the William Brosler Award for Outstanding Volunteerism. Joe said he feels honored to receive the award and fortunate to belong to a congregation that has been supported by so many volunteers.

"I received the benefit growing up of their time, talen and treasure," he said. "As a result, I wanted to recognize the benefit I received by making sure my kids and their kids have a Temple to call their home as well. The Temple and its membership only prospers with the help of its volunteers."

The Cohen family has a long association with the Temple that now spans five generations. Joe is the fourth generation to belong to Achduth Vesholom. He and Leslie, his wife of 18 years, are active members of the Temple, along with their sons, Sam and Jacob. Joe's parents, Elissa & Steve Cohen, also are members. His brother, Andy, also came for the award presentation from Columbus.

As the Temple's attorney, Joe has drawn on the skills he learned at Indiana University, where he earned a bachelor's degree in Law & Public Policy and a juris doctor degree from the IU School Of Law in Indianapolis. We've benefitted from his professional expertise strengthened as a partner at Barrett McNagny, specializing in Labor & Employment Law.

Much of what Joe does on behalf of the congregation is confidential or takes place behind the scenes, where more than a few times as our legal advisor he's been a calming presence for an exasperated Temple leader trying to handle a challenging situation. At other times in his congregational leader role, he is not bashful about sharing his viewpoint and reasoning.

Most days when not at work or responding to calls regarding Temple matters, you can find him and Leslie supporting Sam & Jacob's love of soccer whether driving to practices, attending local games or traveling. He is passionate about the Temple and various philanthropic causes in the community.

That milestone grew out of a family tradition that began with her mother, Carole Stillpass Krainess, and her great-aunt Hannah Stillpass Cohen, who were both Religious School teachers at the Temple. One of her own traditions involved her late father Edward Krainess. For many years, Melissa stopped by her father's house on the way to teaching on Sundays to share a "bagel supreme."

In appreciation for her involvement in our Religious School and in other ways, President Ellen Tom presented Melissa with the William Brosler Award for Outstanding Volunteerism.

Melissa said she learned the importance of helping others from a young age by watching her parents care for her disabled sister at home for 37 years before nursing home care was required.

"My family was not wealthy, but we were a very loving family," she said. "I was my parents' helper in every way I could be...

They instilled in me to always 'help' and I think that is why I volunteer. I may not be able to give money to different charities, but I donate my time to as many as I can."
