HIGH HOLY DAYS WORSHIP MOVES ONLINE FOR 5781 When we celebrate the High Holy Days next month,

we'll welcome the New Year 5781 as a community, gathering together to hear the sound of the shofar and offering prayers for renewal, forgiveness, good health, and peace.

However, as we begin a year like no other, we'll share Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur online to maintain the safety of our Temple family while also embracing the opportunity to experience the holidays in new and significant ways.

Only the clergy, service leaders, and a very small number of support personnel will be in the building, and they will be taking all appropriate precautions. This will allow us to offer a worship experience from the bimah and our familiar sacred spaces, as well as follow distancing guidelines. We will not hold any inperson services either in our sanctuary or Goldstine-B'nai Jacob Chapel.

Our clergy, prayer leaders, Ritual Committee, and staff are preparing a meaningful and memorable High Holy Days experience for all of our congregants. Both Reform and traditional worship options will available for a second year.

Rabbi Meir Bargeron will lead Reform worship with Cantor Yvon F. Shore and Maestro Robert Nance.

Our Mishebeirach list helps us come together as a congregation and community to think of those among us who need healing, care, and compassion. We encourage you to add your loved one's name to our list by calling the Temple office at (260) 744-4245 or emailing us at office@ templeCAV.org so that those we hold dear will be called to mind during our Shabbat services.

At the same time, we ask you to let us know when a loved one's name should be taken off the list. If you have a family member and/or friend with long-term health issues, please check in with us periodically to say you'd like him or her to remain on the list because otherwise we usually remove names after three months. Rabbi Meir and our Caring Committee are available to offer support and comfort, so please let us know when situations arise where we may be of help. Thank you!

RABBI MEIR BARGERON SACRED SEPARATION

One of my favorite parts of Shabbat is its ending. Don't get me wrong -- I love lighting candles, making *kiddush* and *hamotzi*, and saying and doing all of the beautiful prayers and rituals of Shabbat. I love them all, really. But there is something magical about coming together for Havdalah to mark Shabbat's end by again lighting a candle, and blessing wine, and scent-filled spices, and warm light, culminating in a blessing of *ha-mavdil*, separation.

We bless the distinction between holy things and ordinary things, between light and dark, between the Jewish people and God's other peoples, between the rest of Shabbat and our work lives. We bless God who distinguishes between the sacred and the ordinary. In saying these blessings, we experience the sadness of saying goodbye to Shabbat while we also acknowledge the reality that if the sacred time of Shabbat was not separated from the rest of our lives, we wouldn't have Shabbat at all. It is in separation that we have the opportunity to experience the sacred.

Our society and the world at large are experiencing separation every day of the week. COVID-19 roared into our lives and the result was a near-total breakdown of physical social interaction. People stopped going out, non-essential businesses closed. It wasn't even safe to pray together in our synagogue. Human separation has become the painful new reality of a post-COVID-19 world.

Avoiding large groups, standing six feet apart and wearing face masks are at the core of public health guidelines for avoiding COVID-19. We are made safer by maintaining our distance, but we can't hug each other, and we can't see each other smile. Social distancing and maskwearing are draining. It is so difficult to keep going, even if we are committed to doing so in order to stay well and to protect the vulnerable.

Yet, COVID-19 is showing us in a previously unimaginable way that in separation we have the opportunity to experience the sacred. By maintaining physical separation, we are living the Jewish values of *Pikuach nefesh* ("preservation of life") and *Ve'ahavta lerei'acha kamocha* ("Love your neighbor as yourself," Leviticus 19:18) as we care for our own wellbeing and for those around us.



When we avoid groups, stand apart and wear masks, we acknowledge the interdependence that is at the core of *Kol Yisra'eil areivim zeh ba-zeh* ("All Jews are responsible for one another." Babylonian Talmud Shavuot 39a). By enacting these values in our daily lives, we are creating sacred separation.

But we are not alone. When we come together to pray via Zoom, we see that even though we are physically separated, we are still a holy community. We are still connected.

5 packs of ramen noodles	1 box of cereal bars




AWARD WINNERS ON TAP FOR TEMPLE BOOK CLUB

Whether we meet in person or via Zoom, we're excited to share two award-winning titles with Temple members through our book club this year. Through the LiveChat program of the <u>Jewish Book Council</u>, we will discuss these two titles virtually with authors Talia Carner and Goldie Goldbloom.



For our first meeting on Tuesday, October 13 at 7 p.m., we'll discuss <u>The Third Daughter</u> by Talia Carner, a finalist for this year's <u>National Jewish</u> <u>Book Award</u> in the Book Club category. A novel, it takes on the dark period of sex trafficking of Russian women to South America in the late 19th century. Batya is a 14-year-old girl when she is taken to "America" by a wealthy stranger who promises to marry her. She ends up in Buenos Aires, and the story continues from there. Look for a Zoom link as the date gets closer.

On Tuesday, March 2, 2021, we'll discuss <u>On</u> <u>Division</u> by Goldie Goldbloom, the winner of this year's <u>American Jewish Libraries Jewish Fiction</u> <u>Award</u>. Set in present-day Williamsburg, Brooklyn, the novel centers around 57-year-old Surie Eckstein. After discovering she is pregnant with



her eleventh child at this advanced age, she begins to question the dynamics of her Chasidic community.

TEMPLE MEMBER INTERVIEWED FOR DOCUMENTARY ON JEWS OF SHANGHAI

Temple member Doris Fogel shares details of the eight years she spent in Shanghai as a young refugee from Germany as part of a new documentary airing on Tuesday, September 8 at 10 p.m. on PBS Fort Wayne called Harbor from the Holocaust.



The hour-long film depicts the story of nearly 20,000 Jewish refugees from Nazi-occupied Europe to the Chinese port of Shanghai during World War II. It explores the relationship of these Jewish refugees and their adopted city of Shanghai, even through the bitter years of Japanese occupation from 1937-1945 and the Chinese civil war that followed.

Doris, 86, said she has not yet seen the documentary. She was flown to New York to be interviewed, describing the questions as "never ending" about her experiences from the time she and her mother left Berlin in January 1939 when Doris was 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ years old.

She said she talked about her schooling in Shanghai's Jewish Ghetto and living in one room with her mother and close friends she considered her "aunt," "uncle," and "cousin," who was five years older. After the war, they were sponsored by an American couple. Doris said she boarded a ship for California on her 13th birthday, weighing 65 pounds, later settling in Peoria, Illinois.

"What was most meaningful about this project was to let the world know what happened – most people don't know there were 20,000 Jews at Shanghai," she said.

When she volunteers at the Illinois Holocaust Museum in Skokie, Doris said she speaks to visitors who have no idea that "Shanghai was the



port of last resort."

"That's why I do what I do – to let the world know that we are survivors from a ghetto rather than a concentration camp and we went through hell and back," she said.

After living in Fort Wayne for 52 years, Doris moved to the Chicago area to be near her three children and grandchildren. She is a past president of Achduth Vesholom and past Executive Director and president of the Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne. She spoke last April about her experiences, via videoconferencing, at the Temple's Yom Hashoah service.

The Federation is a sponsor of the documentary on PBS Fort Wayne.

INTERFAITH PRAYER AND PEACE VIGIL

Rabbi Paula Jayne Winnig and Rabbi Meir Bargeron were among the religious leaders who gathered on May 31 in Fort Wayne for an Interfaith Prayer and Peace Vigil to protest the killing of George Floyd in Minneapolis.

During her remarks, Rabbi Winnig said we have a duty to speak out about injustices that people of color face in this country every day. She said the Torah teaches us *Tzedek, tzedek tirdof*-- "Justice, justice you shall pursue" and that we must seek justice "with every fiber of our being to make justice a reality in this world."

She added: "We are far from having justice for all people, and, as we've been taught, if there is injustice for one person, then there is no justice for all people. So we seek justice today for George Floyd and for other people who have been discriminated against, killed by policy brutality, and other baseless hatred and racism throughout our country."

She and Rabbi Meir then read a Psalm of Protest in memory of George Floyd written by poet Alden Solovy.

ANNUAL MEETING GOES VIRTUAL DURING YEAR OF TRANSITION

For the first time in 172 years, members of Indiana's oldest Jewish congregation met virtually for an annual meeting, coming together to elect leaders, review finances, and share details of what was a historic and transitional year for Congregation Achduth Vesholom.

Nearly 100 congregants attended the hour-long gathering on June 10 in the largest event held via videoconferencing since the Temple and its Rifkin Campus temporarily closed in March and shifted to online worship and programming in response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

To accommodate the Zoom format, voting was conducted entirely by absentee ballot in advance of the meeting and questions from members were asked in real-time via the chat box and then addressed.

President Ellen Tom recapped a year with many firsts, including the coming together of Congregation B'nai Jacob and Achduth Vesholom, the hiring of an Interim Rabbi, and the shift to virtual activities. At the same time, she said, we also look ahead to the arrival of Rabbi Meir Bargeron as our new spiritual leader as we prepare to say good-bye to Rabbi Paula Jayne Winnig.

Ellen highlighted Rabbi Winnig's tenure at Achduth Vesholom, which ends on June 30, especially her guidance in working with the Ritual Committee to integrate two worship traditions. With respect for the long history of B'nai Jacob, Rabbi Winnig led a meaningful deconsecration ceremony of the synagogue building and a burial of sacred items at the Fort Wayne Jewish Cemetery. She also created a beautiful Simchat Torah service as part of our B'yachad (together) celebration.

As part of the community-wide Violins of Hope programming, Rabbi Winnig designed a Shabbat service incorporating the music of European Reform synagogues in the years leading up to the Holocaust. Through Violins of Hope, she also participated with Bishop Kevin C. Rhoades in a Jewish-Catholic prayer service focusing on shared religious connections. Most recently, she provided a vital role in offering virtual worship, including an online bar mitzvah, and numerous learning opportunities for the Jewish community during this current health crisis.

Ellen thanked our volunteers for their contributions to our congregation's success. The Hebrew word for volunteer is *mitnadev*, she said, which means "one who becomes noble," adding that volunteers should be treated with respect and honor for their dedication and tireless efforts.

A Transition Committee is working with Rabbi Bargeron and his husband, Jon Tam, to help them settle into the Temple and Fort

Wayne. The committee includes Ron Friedman, Ronnie Greenberg, Marnie Lowden, and Sally Trotter.

This past year marked the 10-year milestone for Thoughtful Thursdays, the Jewish community's social action program. Ellen said

the program, started by Jamie Berger, has made a difference in the lives of the children who attend Brightpoint Head Start in our building. Ellen thanked Jamie, who will be stepping down at the end of the year as chair, and Sally Trotter, who will assume leadership of the program.

Our Religious School had another great year under the direction of Principal Leah Hadashi and Rabbi Winnig, and teachers Bruce Colegrove, Dave Flapan, Rachel Gordon, Micah Soltz and Librarian Betsy Gephart. She said our children are very lucky to have these amazing educators.

Ellen also thanked our Temple Staff – Samara Sheray, Jamie Fritz, Marie McFadden, Clint Rossiter and Anna Rossiter -- for keeping our Temple running smoothly, especially during the past few months of closure. She also thanked the board and Executive Committee for being adaptable and responsive to the needs of the congregation.

COVID-19 and Building Closure

As the Board contemplates how and when to reopen the Temple, Ellen said the details to consider and resolve are complex and mindboggling. She said the board is discussing options and consulting with other places of worship locally and around the U.S., as well as the URJ.

Recommendations from these sources and medical and health experts evolve as new information becomes available. Decisions about when and how our Temple will reopen likely will become clearer in the coming weeks.

Plans for implementing worship, educational, and programming services will be ongoing, she said, as we look at three potential scenarios: Opening at full capacity, implementing a hybrid model comprising both remote and onsite activities at limited capacity, or continuing full-time remote activities.

Regardless of how we move forward, Ellen said, we are committed to doing so in a manner that safely accommodates our congregants, staff and visitors.

Finances

Vice President-Finance Scott Goldberg presented the 2020-2021 budget, which was approved by the membership. He gave a general overview, though said the financial impact of the pandemic on dues, investments, and our annual corned beef fundraiser is not clear.

While the budget of \$471,869 for the fiscal year beginning July 1 indicates a \$29,752 deficit, Scott stressed that a budget is a planning tool. In this year's 2019-2020 budget, he said, the anticipated deficit was \$32,418, but the Temple likely will end the fiscal year in June with a \$30,000-\$40,000 surplus, largely the result of dues from new members from B'nai Jacob.

Partnership and Renovation Update

Pamela Friedman said we can look back on the past year of holidays, study sessions, social gatherings, life-cycle celebrations, *tikkun olam*, and weekly Shabbat services to realize that we are creating a *kehila kodosha*, a holy community that is strengthened and more unified.

She said congregants who came from B'nai Jacob have been welcomed by Temple members and Achduth Vesholom's leaders have been eager to include them in decision-making roles. Pam added that the former synagogue members had a voice on committees that include ritual, board development, facilities, and rabbinical search.

In addition, she noted that during this transition period she is serving on Achduth Vesholom's Board of Directors representing B'nai Jacob and Temple President Ellen Tom sits on the Transitional Board of Congregation B'nai Jacob, Inc. The Transitional Board oversees the integration and finances, serving as the legal entity for the former congregation while business matters are completed.

Pam said our journey together began long before July 1, 2019, when the B'yachad Committee brought to fruition the concept of "one community, two traditions." In the past year, she said, renovations of what is now called the Goldstine-B'nai Jacob Chapel took place. Yahrzeit plaques and the Tree of Life panel also will be installed in the building.

"Our work is not complete," she said. "We will continue to learn from one another, we will strive to keep the lines of communication open, and we will wrestle with growing pains as we continue to bring two traditions together.... As we work together and worship together, let us continue to grow together....*b'yachad.*"



Rabbi Winnig's Report

Rabbi Paula Jayne Winnig said she feels fortunate to have landed in Fort Wayne as our Interim Rabbi. While we had a few bumps as the congregations came together with two traditions, she said we moved forward nicely.

Rabbi Winnig said the year came to an interesting place in March with COVID-19 when we moved to virtual events, creating and maintaining community in a different way. She thanked the Lowden family for being open to an online bar mitzvah, which she called a wonderful experience.

In showing her appreciation for all who support the congregation, Rabbi Winnig thanked the Temple's leadership, staff, Religious School teachers, Hazemir choir, and volunteers. She also thanked Joe Lyon, our security chief, and Jaki Schreier and Ben Eisbart from the Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne.

L'dor Vador Legacy Society Recognized

Beth Zweig, who co-chairs the Planned Giving Committee with Steve Zacher, said the L'dor Vador Legacy Society is important as we grapple with uncertainties from the pandemic on the Temple's finances, including dues and donations.

She recalled the late Leonard Goldstein, who formerly co-chaired our planned giving efforts, for always emphasizing that "it's incumbent on us to stand up and guarantee the future stability of our congregation for those who follow us."

A legacy gift is a way to make a lasting impact in a way that may not be possible in your current budget. Beth said it's also a way to make a statement that a Jewish presence in Northeast Indiana is important to you today, as well as for the next generation.

Through the legacy society, she said, the Temple has received planned gifts of \$122,000 since 2012. Some 44 people have signed a letter of intent indicating they've made a planned gift to the Temple.

Sadly, we lost four legacy society members in the past year: Betty Stein, David Seligman, Leona Zweig Rosenberg, and Charles Weinraub. May their memories be for a blessing.

FAREWELL FOR RABBI WINNIG ENDS IN VIRTUAL HUG

More than 50 congregants offered their best wishes and shared a virtual hug with Rabbi Paula Jayne Winnig on Friday, June 19 during a farewell Shabbat service via videconferencing, marking the completion of her year as the Temple's Interim Rabbi.

Her tenure began in the early weeks of the historic coming together of Achduth Vesholom and B'nai Jacob with the blending of traditions. The final months of her time with us included a global pandemic, Zoom services and simchas, and marching against racial injustice.

During the Shabbat service, Rabbi Winnig discussed the Juneteenth holiday and the Emancipation Proclamation before also reflecting on her Fort Wayne memories, with a montage of photos taken during her time at the Temple and in our community.

On behalf of the congregation, President Ellen Tom offered a prayer for Rabbi Winnig as she leaves for a new position as Interim Rabbi at Congregation Rodef Shalom in Youngstown, Ohio. Ellen presented her with



a framed photo – taken by Rabbi Winnig from her downtown apartment window - of the Fort Wayne skyline to help remember her time with us.

During the Oneg Shabbat, members thanked Rabbi Winnig for being a *mensch* during what was described as "a peculiar and blessed year." We also watched a slide show with highlights chronicling Rabbi Winnig's year.



HOLOCAUST TESTIMONIES AVAILABLE AT PFW

The <u>Institute for Holocaust and Genocide Studies</u> is partnering with the <u>Helmke Library Purdue University Fort Wayne</u> to bring the <u>Yale Fortunoff</u> <u>Video Archive for Holocaust Testimonies</u> to citizens of Northeast Indiana.

The Fortunoff Archive currently holds more than 4,400 testimonies, which are comprised of over 12,000 recorded hours of videotape. Testimonies were produced in cooperation with 36 affiliated projects across North America, South America, Europe, and Israel, and each project maintains a duplicate collection of locally recorded videotapes.

The Fortunoff Archive and its affiliates recorded the testimonies of willing individuals with first-hand experience of the Nazi persecutions, including those who were in hiding, survivors, bystanders, resistance, and liberators. Testimonies were recorded in whatever language the witness preferred, and range in length from 30 minutes to over 40 hours (recorded over several sessions). Once the campus reopens, anyone may access this collection from one of the computers at Helmke Library.

NEW COVID-19 ANTHOLOGY INCLUDES PIECE BY RABBI MEIR

Congratulations to Rabbi Meir Bargeron on having a piece included in the new anthology called <u>When We Turned</u> <u>Within: Reflections on COVID-19</u>. Edited by Rabbi Menachem Creditor and Sara Tuttle-Singer, the book is a collection of reflections, prayers, and poems of "many, many individual souls who collectively tell the story of right now with depth and heart and startling brilliance."



All proceeds from the book will support UJA-Federation NY's COVID-relief efforts, more than \$46 million of allocations to date, supporting the most vulnerable parts of our world.

GENEALOGY SOCIETY ANNOUNCES FALL PROGRAMS


