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CELEBRATE THE HIGH HOLY DAYS AT THE TEMPLE



Please join us at Congregation Achduth Vesholom to welcome 5778 with some traditional favorite events as we also integrate fresh ways to celebrate the <u>High Holy Days</u>.

We'll transition to the holiday season on Saturday evening, September 16 with a Selichot Reception, followed by our service when we change the Torah covers to white.

In addition to worship opportunities, two favorite traditions continue - the Erev Rosh Hashanah Reception and Break-the-Fast hosted by the

ROMEOs. Also coming this season are Minyan Katan for children, a Sukkot Celebration with dinner and sukkah decorating, and a Simchat Torah service.

New opportunities for the holidays include a Tashlich program with PJ Library at Foster Park following the Rosh Hashanah morning service and a Yom Kippur afternoon program with Rabbi Lenny on the Book of Psalms. SHARING HOLOCAUST HISTORY THROUGH FIRST PERSON SURVIVOR ACCOUNTS

Journalist Bill Benson interviews Holocaust survivors to chronicle their life stories in their own words through the <u>First Person program</u> at the <u>United States Holocaust Memorial Museum</u>, uniting personal experiences with history in a powerful way. He'll discuss his involvement and experiences on Thursday, September 7 at 7 p.m. at the Temple.

Mr. Benson is in his 13th season as host of First Person, a weekly series of interviews with Holocaust survivors before live audiences at the museum

in Washington, DC. He also is an expert on aging and a former undersecretary with the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.

His visit is sponsored by the Temple and IPFW's Institute for Holocaust and Genocide Studies with support from the Dr. Harry W. Salon Foundation. Additional support for his visit comes from StoryPoint, offering the latest in Independent Living, Assisted Living, and Memory Care.

JERUSALEM INSPIRES DIALOGUE AND QUESTIONS



The Temple recently sponsored the National Geographic movie "Jerusalem" at Cinema Center. Although one showing was directed to the Jewish community, nine others were open to the public and advertised to the churches in town.

The project was originally conceived as a Temple fundraiser. However, I believe its greatest contribution may have been fostering dialogue between Christian groups that attended and the Jewish representatives, as each showing was followed by open discussion. I thought I would provide a few

examples of the questions posed after the showings:

"Do Jews sacrifice animals at the synagogue?" After an emphatic "no," I went on to explain that Jews have not sacrificed animals for close to 2,000 years, when the Second Temple was destroyed by the Romans. A similar question was asked at another showing: "When the Third Temple is built, will the Jews sacrifice animals there?" This guestion is a bit more complicated. Reform, Reconstructionist, and Conservative Jews say that there will never be sacrifice again. When the Temple was destroyed, the first rabbis replaced sacrifice with prayer. However, some Orthodox groups do say sacrifice will return when the Third Temple is built.

"Is it safe to travel to Jerusalem today?" This question speaks to the effect the media has on our world. Seeing pictures of conflicts in that part of the world has a chilling effect on those living in the U.S. My response was that I always felt safe during the times that I visited. It does catch your eye initially to see the military presence in public areas as this is not something we are familiar with. Yet this uneasiness quickly disappears.

I tell the story of the time Karen and I were in Jerusalem for Chanukkah. There were military groups roaming the area with Uzis slung over their shoulders. Yet they also had trays of sufganiyot – jelly donuts – and were passing them out to whoever wanted them, laughing, joking, singing, and having quite a good time with the civilians and tourists. This kind of interaction made a person feel welcome and comfortable. I had the occasion in the past to walk a bit through the streets of south Chicago and I can tell you I did not have that same safe

"Can a Christian go to the Western Wall?" There is a political anomaly in this area that is not found anywhere in the rest of the world. The day-to-day access to the holy sites is not controlled by the government of Israel, but instead was given to the religious groups. Access to the Church of the Holy Sepulchre is controlled by the Christians, the Western Wall is supervised by Jewish groups, and the Dome of the Rock is managed by the Muslims. Here in the United States, access to religious buildings is covered by secular law. The times I was in Jerusalem, all people could enter the Western Wall area.

It was also interesting that there were 6-10 attendees per showing of the film who had visited Jerusalem. Those who had visited reflected that they felt safe and that the experience was heartfelt, enjoyable, and very emotional. There is something about traveling to this locale that you cannot put into words regardless of your religious affiliation.

The discussion between the attendees was always respectful and illuminating. The fact that people representing different religions and backgrounds could come together in Fort Wayne to talk in an open and civil way is a great reflection of this project. That the Jewish community could lead such an effort helped not only to extend an understanding of our religion, but to create bonds across religious lines. These bonds will bring great fruit to our entire city in the future.



CONGREGANTS INVITED FOR GREEN OAK FARM TOUR


In 2010, Temple members <u>Janet & Andy Katz</u> purchased a five-acre lot on Eggeman Road in southwest Fort Wayne. The site was flat and sunny, perfect for a large garden and orchards, and also for solar panels.

With architect Tim Gray of Ball State University and Crane Builders from Indianapolis, they designed and built their home, Green Oak Farm – named for the food they wanted to grow, the oak trees on the property, and the home's environmentally friendly features.

The Katzes moved into their home in May 2016. Though some work is still ongoing, they look forward to welcoming Achduth Vesholom members to visit <u>Green Oak Farm</u>, 3819 Eggeman Road, on Sunday, September 10 from 2 to 5 p.m. for an open house arranged by the Temple's Adult Education Committee.

The home was built as part of Andy & Janet's longstanding commitment to the environment and tikkun olam (repairing the world). They hope to be ready to apply for LEED Certification this fall, aiming for Gold Certification.

Visitors will be able to take a self-guided tour of the home, and Andy and Janet will be happy to answer questions and provide more detailed explanations of the home's green features. This program is geared for adults

Those who live nearby are encouraged to walk or ride their bikes, as the home is directly on the Aboite Trail. Visitors can also park in the parking lot at the Aboite Township Trustee Community Center at 11321 Aboite Center Road and walk along the Aboite Trail about 0.25 miles to the house.

"I am passionate about Jewish Education because I see the value a positive early experience can have on a person as they grow older," Leah said. "I want the education that the students receive here at CAV and the experiences that they partake in to stay with them and help to build the solid base that they are able to stand on as strong and proud Jewish adults."

Leah began teaching in our Religious School in late 2010, working with students in second grade through b'nei mitzvah. She is cochair of this year's new honey for the holidays fundraiser and continues as co-chair of Home Shabbat. She also chairs the Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne's Rosh Chodesh Women's Club.

WENDY SOLTZ NAMED DIRECTOR OF INDIANA JEWISH HISTORICAL SOCIETY

Mazel tov to Wendy Soltz on her new role as Executive Director of the <u>Indiana Jewish Historical Society</u>. She succeeds fellow Temple member Eileen Baitcher, who will retire in September after 22 years in the position.

Wendy, who chairs the Temple's Adult Education Committee and is actively involved in development of our museum in the Madge Rothschild Resource Center, comes to the position with significant background in Jewish history, public history, and museum work.
