TRAVELING SHABBAT ART EXHIBIT OPENS SEPTEMBER 9

The Temple will host a traveling art exhibit during the fall called "The Seventh Day: Revisiting Shabbat" from the Hebrew Union College - Jewish Institute of Religion Museum. The congregation is invited for the grand opening during our New Year's reception on Sunday, September 9 following the 8 p.m. Rosh Hashanah evening service.

The collection features 36 works, including photography, textile, collage and painting, all exploring some aspect of Shabbat. Created by a variety of international artists, the artworks and ritual objects represent a diverse, 21stcentury, approach to this day of rest.

The exhibit will be on display in the Social Hall from September through November. The public is welcome to visit on Thursday afternoons from 1 to 3 p.m., beginning September 13, and during other hours for groups by appointment.

In addition to the traveling exhibit, we will feature Shabbat programming throughout the year and items from the Temple's collection in the Madge Rothschild Resource Center. Thank you to the Dr. Harry W. Salon Foundation for its support.

Names are a type of label. Those labels often come with emotions that go well beyond the name itself. For some, the word grandmother conjures love, warmth, and a connection to family and history; to others this same word evokes a feeling of guilt, anger, and even fear. The word lvri in Hebrew is no different. It is one of the first labels given to describe the Jewish people.

This Akkadian term has the general meaning of being on the other side

of the river. It has been discussed by scholars for centuries and resulted in a number of perspectives. Rabbi Yehudah of the Talmud says it means that the world was on one side of the river, as idolaters, and Abraham was on the other, as a monotheist. Rabbi Nehemiah claims that Abraham came from the other side of the Euphrates and spoke a different language than the general population, Hebrew. Many commentators say the term refers to the descendants of Eber in the Bible. All refer to the word being Akkadian in origin.

The one I like the best is an understanding that the word is a pejorative in Akkadian and was used to describe a group of people that Abraham was a part of. A similar phrase was used in this country during the Depression. There was an expression,

"people on the other side of the tracks." It meant people living in a poor, depressed and dangerous place. It was intended to describe something ugly and unwanted, a people of the lowest economic strata. The Akkadians used the term lvri in a similar manner to describe the tribe that Abraham belonged to.

Yet this term can have a very different meaning. To cross over the river or be on the other side of the river can also mean to make a new beginning, one that is full of optimism and a belief that you are heading to a brighter and better future. Abraham and his family were traveling to a new land, a Promised Land. I have to believe they felt it was for a life of greater worth and success. For Abraham, the term lvri was not a term of contempt and disapproval but of high regard, appreciation, and optimism.

There are many people throughout the world today who look upon the lvrim, the Jewish people, with contempt, hatred, and prejudice. The label Jew in certain geographic locales has no different connotation than the original Akkadian version of being on the other side of the river. We can choose to cower and retreat from those who look on us in this way or choose to take an Abrahamic view. To look on being Jewish as something positive and good. To understand how our approach to life and living, to our moral and ethical foundation and a belief in living life in a Jewish way, will result in leading a life in the best way possible. It does not mean looking at life through rose-colored glasses, but with an understanding of how to live a fulfilled and prosperous life for all.

CHAPTER BOOKS, BIOGRAPHIES, AND MORE AMONG OUR NEW READS!

With a recent shipment of new releases from Kar-Ben, and a few books added for adults and teens, we have several brand new titles to offer this fall in the <u>Rabbi Richard B. Safran Library</u>.

Since Kar-Ben is a publisher of children's books, many of our acquisitions are picture books. Among my favorites are two arts-related titles: *An Unlikely Ballerina* by Krystyna Goddu, and *The World Needs Beautiful Things,* by Leah Berkowitz. The first is a beautiful biography of ballerina Lily Marks. The latter tells the biblical story of Bezalel and his creation of the ark.

In addition to picture books, we have a number of new short chapter books. *Pinky Bloom and the Case of the Missing Kiddush Cup*, by Judy Press, introduces a fourth-grade detective and her pet cat DJ. *Pickled Watermelon*, by Esty Schachter, takes place in Israel 1986,



told from the perspective of 11-year-old Molly. Two other new chapter books are *Susie Q Fights Back,* by Jane Cutler, about civil rights in Missouri of the 1940s, and *The Family with Two Front Doors,* by Anna Ciddor, set in 1920s Poland.


For teen readers and adults, we have two new fictional works about the Holocaust. Jane Yolen's latest novel, *Mapping the Bones*, is a powerful novel set in Poland in 1942, following twins, Chaim and Gittel from the Lodz ghetto through to a concentration


camp. *What the Night Sings*, by Vesper Stamper, follows Gerta's journey after she is released from Bergen-Belsen as a 16-year-old.


A few new biographies are worth mentioning as well. For adults, The Woman Who Fought an Empire: Sarah Aaronsohn and Her Nili Spy Ring, by Gregory J. Wallance, covers a group of Jews who worked as spies to aid the British in overthrowing the Ottoman Empire post-World War I. For middlegrade students, Jill Sherman's brief biography of Gal Gadot will probably be of interest. We also have a new graphic novel biography of Dr. Ruth Westheimer for kids, and a wonderful new picture book, When Paul Met Artie: The Story of Simon & Garfunkel by G. Neri.

Temple member <u>Irv Adler</u> attended the 2018 <u>International Association of Jewish</u> <u>Genealogy Societies Conference</u> from August 5-10 in Warsaw, Poland, continuing his research on family lost during the Holocaust and as president of the new <u>Northeast</u> <u>Indiana Jewish Genealogy Society</u>.

The IAJGS Conference was the first held in Eastern Europe and had a heavy focus on Galicia. Irv said it gave him the opportunity to represent our community's new Jewish genealogy group and to meet the leadership of the international society.

"The conference helped me make many valuable connections in support of the NEIJGS activities and to expand my research on finding my Viennese relatives and reconstructing my family's origin – all from Poland and Galicia," Irv said.

Irv also attended a symposium sponsored by the Gesher Galicia Society and the National Archives of Poland (AGAD) that focused entirely on Polish and Galician genealogy.

He explained that Galicia was formed in the late 1770's as a result of the collapse of the country of Poland, as it existed in the mid-1700's. There were three partitions of Poland starting in 1772 and ending in 1795: One third of Poland went to Prussia; one third to Russia (known as the Pale); and one third to the Hapsburgs. Galicia today is a part of western and southern Poland and western Ukraine.

Dear Temple Members:

Thanks to all of you for your support as we work to find the next Rabbi for our congregation. As President Ellen Tom informed you when we began this process, the committee members (along with us) are: Elissa Cohen, Bruce Colegrove, Marnie Lowden, Tom O'Neill, John Planer, Scott Salon,

Wendy Soltz, and Sally Trotter. These committee members represent a large cross-section of our Temple's very diverse community. As we have begun our work, their commitment to the Temple and its members couldn't be clearer.

When we began, we emphasized two major objectives for the process of our work: 1) That our committee operate with the best interests of our Temple families as opposed to advancing individual agendas; and 2) That we allow transparency in and access to the process and people as much as possible, while also maintaining the confidentially that is required.

We still share a commitment to those objectives.

The Search Committee has met several times and is working diligently to find appropriate candidates to be our next Rabbi. We are working in partnership with the Central Conference of American Rabbis, and the process is moving forward.

The goal of the committee is to recommend a candidate to the Board. If the Board approves the recommendation of the Search Committee, as mandated by our Bylaws, the Board will then go through the hiring process and will present the Rabbi to the congregation. If we do not find the right Rabbi for CAV when the position opens next July, then we will consider other short-term alternatives while the search process continues.

This process will take time, and it is in all of our best interest to be cautious and deliberative. We encourage you to phone or email either of us and/or any member of the committee along the way with your thoughts, concerns or considerations.
