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CELEBRATE THE HIGH HOLY DAYS WITH US

L'shana Tovah! Please join us at Congregation Achduth Vesholom for an exciting High Holy Days season as we welcome a new rabbi, guest cantors, and celebrate for the first time with two worship traditions!

The New Year 5780 will start with an expanded service schedule that includes Reform and traditional options on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. Selichot, Tashlich, Sukkot, and Simchat Torah will be celebrated jointly. Please review the new schedule on page 6 because customary dates and times may be different. DECONSECRATION CEREMONY SET FOR B'NAI JACOB



Please join us for a deconsecration ceremony at Congregation B'nai Jacob on Saturday, September 14 at 8 p.m. as we say good-bye to the beautiful facility that has served as a synagogue since August 1993. We'll have a nosh, make Havdalah, and deconsecrate the building, led by Rabbi Paula Jayne Winnig.

Groundbreaking for the building at 7227 Bittersweet Moors Drive began in March 1993, with the first two shovels of dirt dug by Leah Tourkow and Jeff Goltz, co-chairs of the building committee. The previous

building on Fairfield at Pierce had been sold to the Fort Wayne Philharmonic.

Worship services led by Rabbi Harvey Markowitz were temporarily held at Scottish Rite, with the synagogue office in rented space on West Jefferson. The generosity of Ted & Bessie Levy helped pay for the synagogue property and the parsonage next door.

The congregation moved into the building on August 13, 1993, in time for the Bat Mitzvah of Rachel Kelman on August 20-21. The synagogue dedication began on a Friday night on October 29, 1993, with the transferring of the Torahs. A formal dedication took place on Sunday, October 31.

As our Jewish community comes together as one congregation, we honor and remember the special times of worship, celebration, and learning that took place over the years in the synagogue building.

FINDING NEW INSIGHTS FROM THE LESSONS OF ELUL



On Friday night, August 30 and on Saturday and Sunday, August 31 and September 1, we will observe Rosh Hodesh Elul, the first days of the new Hebrew month of Elul. We will mark this celebration by reciting the Hallel Psalms during Shabbat worship. Elul is the sixth month on the Hebrew calendar and is the month directly preceding the month of Tishri during which we celebrate all of our fall

holidays.

During the month of Elul, we begin to prepare ourselves for the period of introspection and renewal that is our task during the holiday period leading us to Rosh Hashanah through to Yom Kippur. We participate in soulful examination and worship which leads us to forgiveness and another chance for a better life in the New Year.

During the month of Elul, we add Psalm 27 to our liturgy and we begin to hear the sounds of the shofar each day. Traditional communities do not blow the shofar on Shabbat; however, we will be adding the sounding of the shofar and the reading of Psalm 27 to our Erev Shabbat worship, beginning August 30 through September.

Psalm 27 is meant to both comfort and unsettle us simultaneously. It pushes us to seek to find ways to better connect to God, our world and ourselves. Yet it also reminds us that the world can be a scary place if we face it alone. Psalm 27 also reminds us that we can and will find safety and security in our world if we actively seek it. We are reminded that we cannot be passive and expect our world to change around us. We are required to do the work to make change happen.

The month of Elul is the beginning of the period of time during which we are called upon to help change what happens in our lives and in the life of the world around us. Little by little, day by day, we can find new ways and new insights if we but open ourselves to see them.

The word Elul is spelled in Hebrew אלול

The rabbis describe the spelling of the month as an acrostic for the famous phrase from the biblical book the Song of Songs, 6:3

אֲנִי לְדוּדִי וְדוּדִי לִי

Ani L'Dodi V'Dodi Li

I am my beloved's and my beloved is mine.

This phrase is chosen to remind us that even, or perhaps especially, during difficult times, we are God's beloved people and God can be our beloved connector to the world if we but open ourselves up to the beautiful spiritual possibilities around us.

This Elul, and this High Holyday season, may we all find ourselves surrounded by loving companions, beauty and an ever-growing appreciation of how special our world can be if we help make it so.

My best wishes to you for strength and courage to do this introspective work during this month and throughout our High Holiday season. (Read Psalm 27 on page 5.)

CELEBRATING MUSIC

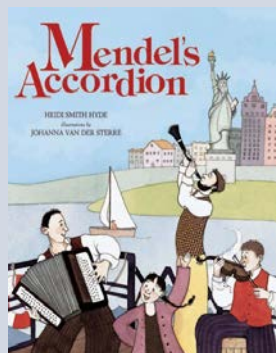
Partially in honor of the upcoming Violins of Hope programs in November, our Temple programming is focusing on music this year. We have dozens of titles in the Rabbi Richard B. Safran Library related to music and the Holocaust, which we'll feature next month. During September, we'll feature non-Holocaust materials, from Klezmer to classical.

First, we have more than 100 music CDs in our collection available for checkout. These include lots of PJ Library recordings for kids and a few lullaby collections. For adult listeners, we have Yiddish songs, Israeli music, and holiday blessings. Our classical collection includes a CD by Israeli cellist, Amit Peled. We also have several collections by Alan Goodis, Dan Nichols, Rick Recht, Craig Taubman, and Debbie Friedman.

Our biography collection features several Jewish musicians and composers. Irving Berlin is the subject of our newest picture book biographies for younger children. Other titles cover Simon & Garfunkel, Bob Dylan, Woody Guthrie, Leonard Bernstein, Benny Goodman, George Gershwin, and Isaac Stern.

In our non-fiction collection, we have a few books of sheet music, including *The International Jewish Songbook* by Velevel Pasternak, and several music prayer book supplements. Holiday music and the blessings of Debbie Friedman are also available. The history of Jewish music, including Yiddish theater and folksong, is also represented in our collection. One of the more intriguing non-fiction titles is Roger Bennett's, *And you shall know us by the trail of our vinyl: The Jewish past as told by the records we have loved and lost*.

Music features heavily in Jewish fiction written for all ages. In our picture book collection, klezmer is part of *Mendel's Accordion*, by Heidi Smith Hyde, Amalia Hoffman's *The Klezmer Bunch*, and *The Kugel Valley Klezmer Band*, by Joan Betty Stuchner. Perhaps the most well-known music picture book in our collection is Leslea Newman's *Ketzel, the Cat who Composed*. Thanks to the Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne, the author was able to visit with our Religious School students last fall.



For older readers, *You'll Miss Me When I'm Gone* by Rachel Lynn Solomon, features a viola prodigy, *Birdland* by Tracy Mack works in Charlie Parker, and Kathryn Lasky's *Broken Song*, is about a young violinist. Renee Rosen's *Windy City Blues*, a novel about Chicago jazz, will be featured in our Temple Book Club in January.

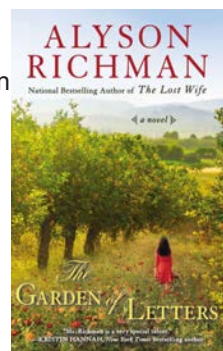
MAINTAINING A BEAUTIFUL TRADITION

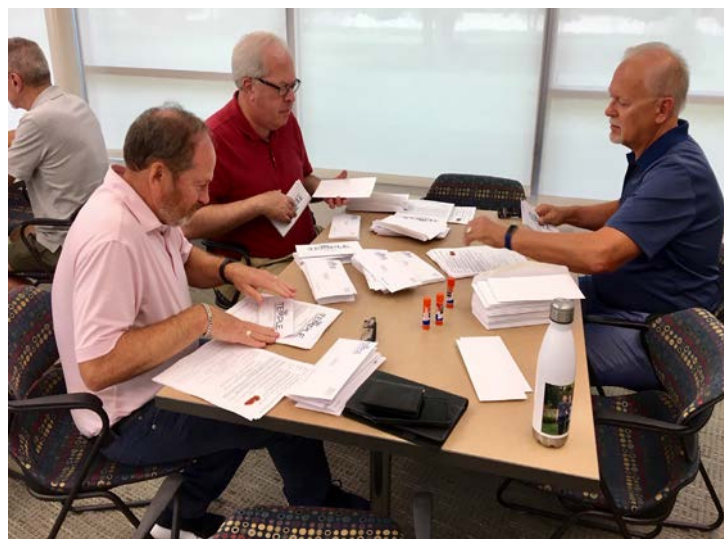

REMEMBERING BETTY STEIN

December 10, 1916- August 9, 2019



Betty Stein has been a powerful influence in the lives of her family and well beyond. She was a force: She was strong-willed, opinionated and sometimes formidable. But she also had a way with people that got them onboard with her ideas. She was able to make many wonderful things happen and stayed an engaged, active member of the community till the age of 102 – and a half!

She was a towering figure in the community. She wasn't religious in a traditional

sense; in fact, she was something of an agnostic, and definitely irreverent. But social action is a bedrock principle of Reform Judaism, and it's how she lived her life, including her work for the Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne and Congregation Achduth Vesholom – much of which spilled over into the general community. And that was just how she wanted it.

Her leadership included some traditional roles: She served two terms as the Temple's Sisterhood president and was on the boards of both the Temple and the Federation. In fact, she was the **first** woman elected to the Temple board and the **first** woman to serve as its president. But she was also a groundbreaker.

She co-chaired a Jewish-Catholic dialogue between members of the Temple and members of the Church of Saint Mary and developed a close friendship with Bishop John D'Arcy. Years later, in 2014, she was the maybe unlikely recipient of the Father Tom O'Connor Light of Christ Award, presented by Bishop Kevin C. Rhoades. The award is given annually "to persons of faith whose life and work reflect the values of Father O'Connor," who served as pastor of St. Mary's from 1970 until his death in 2004.

In the late '80s, with the Federation, she created the Minority Literature Project, an award-winning program that sent volunteers to area schools to introduce poetry by African-American and other minority poets to students – because materials used at that time contained almost none. As then-executive director of the Jewish Federation Vivian Lansky Skadron said, "She brought the idea to me because her dream 'was to enrich the lives of students through an understanding and compassion for the minority experiences in America.' "

She chaired the Federation's People of the Book program for many years, and she took great pride in bringing truly top-notch authors to Fort Wayne – such as Chaim Potok, Thomas Cahill, Carl Bernstein and one of her personal favorites, Calvin Trillin. She loved having regular attendees from the general community tell her how much they looked forward to these programs every year.

Having witnessed the horrors of the Holocaust, she became passionate about trying to ensure that all students would learn its lessons, that "Never again" was more than a slogan. She was instrumental in producing a video of interviews with eight survivors in Fort Wayne while they were still able to tell their stories. That video remains available for all area schools – and in fact, it's now on YouTube.

She also chaired the Temple's Holocaust Education Committee for many years, finally giving up that role at age 98 but staying on the committee. We regularly met around her dining room table, including a meeting just last December!

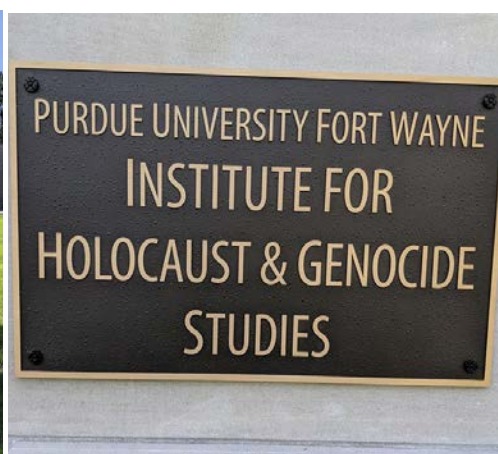
In 2016 the Temple, thanks to librarian Betsy Gephart, honored Betty's 100th birthday with a project that was near and dear to her heart. With Betty's help and approval, Betsy created a list of "Betty's 100 Books" to add to the Temple Library. Friends could – and did – donate books – even beyond the 100 on the list.

Her efforts didn't go unnoticed: She was given the Goldie DuBow award for service to the Jewish Federation in 1991. In 2004, she was honored with the William Brosler Award for her lifetime of service to the Temple and the community. And one final accolade is still coming: The Indiana Jewish Historical Society will officially designate her a Hoosier Jewish Legend at its Annual Lunch on August 25th. The award was announced in June, and she was thrilled.

Betty Stein truly WAS a legend, a role model of an extraordinary life. She was an inspiration, a mentor and a very dear friend to many. May her memory be for a blessing.

Temple member Fran Adler, Betty's former daughter-in-law, talked about Betty's service to the Jewish community during a eulogy at the memorial service on August 15, 2019. These thoughts are excerpts from her remarks.





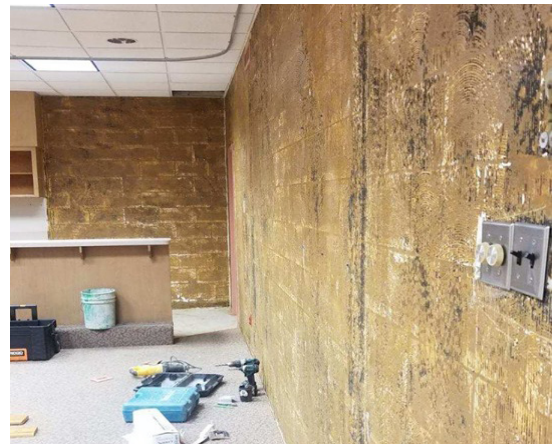

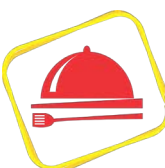
