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CELEBRATE THE HIGH HOLY DAYS ONLINE WITH US

L'shana Tovah! Please join us as we welcome the New Year 5781 online as a community, gathering together to hear the sound of the shofar and offering prayers for renewal, forgiveness, good health, and peace.

As we share Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur during the time of a pandemic, we are meeting virtually to maintain the safety of our Temple family while also embracing the opportunity to experience the holidays in new and significant ways. These include Reform and traditional worship options for a second year.

Rabbi Meir Bargeron will lead Reform worship with Cantor Yvon F. Shore and Maestro Robert Nance.
Cantor Shore, Director of Liturgical Arts and Music at Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion in Cincinnati, also joined us last year for the High Holy Days.

Returning to lead our traditional services is Michael Small, who previously served as the guest spiritual

leader for the holidays at Congregation B'nai Jacob. An attorney, he is an active synagogue member at



North Suburban Synagogue Beth El in Highland Park, IL, where he frequently davens as a *shaliach tzibur* (prayer leader) and gives lay sermons. Ron Friedman, who regularly leads our Shabbat morning service, and Pamela Friedman, our Religious School principal, also will lead holiday worship.

Only the clergy, service leaders, and a very small number of support personnel will be in the building. This will allow us to offer a worship experience from the bimah and our familiar sacred spaces, as well as follow distancing guidelines. We will not hold any in-person services either in our sanctuary or Goldstine-B'nai Jacob Chapel.

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JOIN US AT OUR DRIVE-IN TO HEAR THE SHOFAR!

As we reimagine New Year's traditions during this most unusual season, we invite you to come hear the sound of the shofar from your car at our "CAV Drive-in."

Please join us on Sunday, September 20 at 2 p.m., the second day of Rosh Hashanah, in the Temple's parking lot to hear the blast of the ram's horn and fulfill the biblical commandment.



Experience the shofar service in a new way – perhaps imagining the echoes heard on Mount Sinai or at the Temple in Jerusalem. As the sounds of *tekiah*, *shevarim*, *truah*, and *tekia gedolah* fill the air, enjoy the spirit of Jewish community from a new vantage point (while socially distant) and reflect on the year ahead.

Rabbi Meir will offer insights on the symbolism of the shofar, described by some as both earthly and Divine.

Following the shofar service, Rabbi Meir will focus on the meaning and traditions of Tashlich. The Hebrew word *tashlich* literally means "You shall cast away."

In the book of Micah (7:18-20) we find the verse: "And you shall cast (*tashlich*) into the depths of the sea all their sins." Traditionally, Jewish communities throughout the world have taken Micah's words to heart by gathering on Rosh Hashanah and symbolically casting away their sins by throwing breadcrumbs into a lake, stream or ocean. However, due to health precautions, we will not go as a group this year to the water.

ACCOUNTING FOR FEAR AND DREAD

One of the first things I noticed when I arrived in Fort Wayne was the geese. As a former and now once-again Midwesterner, these ubiquitous birds are a familiar sight to me, and not always a welcome one.

I recall childhood warnings about their aggressiveness, and an incident when I was chased by a territorial goose because my dog veered too close! But geese also play an important role in the rhythm of the year. The transit of migratory geese in the spring and in the fall signal an important seasonal transition. As they fly in formation, honking loudly, they cause us to stop what we are doing, to look up and to pay attention, even if only for just a moment.

As Midwestern Jews, we well understand the seasonal transition of being called to stop what we are doing and to pay attention. We are in the midst of the Hebrew month of *Elul*, a time when Jewish tradition draws us to introspection in preparation for the hard, holy work of *Yamim Noraim*, the Days of Awe.

This month occurs at the beginning of the autumn season, when the cooling weather, the changing leaves, and, yes, the honking geese signal us that change is on the horizon, and that we best get ready. We are called to take an accounting of our soul (*cheshbon hanefesh*) to identify the ways in which we have fallen short of being the person God has created each of us to be.

Psalm 27 can be considered a map for self-reflection throughout *Elul*. It begins, "The Eternal is my light and my help; whom should I

fear? The Eternal is the stronghold of my life, whom should I dread?"

Concerning this verse, the 19th century biblical commentator Malbim writes, "'dread' is from something that is known, and 'fear' is from something unknown." This is a helpful way to frame much of the uncertainty of life that confronts us in the liturgy of the High Holy Days.

What are the things in our life that weigh on us, both the known problems that concern us and the unknown events over which we have no control?

How have our actions exacerbated this fear and dread without meaning? What can we do to face these concerns head-on and with meaning? Through everything, the psalmist reminds us, God is our light, our help and our source of strength. We do not experience this dread and fear alone.

I wish for each of you an introspective and meaningful *Elul*, and look forward to Friday, September 18 when we will welcome 5781 as a Congregation Achduth Vesholom community.

BUILDING REMAINS CLOSED FOR TEMPLE EVENTS; BRIGHTPOINT CLASSES TO RESUME



As September begins, our building remains closed for congregational worship and activities, with only essential staff activities taking place inside. We remain committed to engaging our members and building Jewish community through online services, programs, and meetings. Religious School also is utilizing virtual learning. Our High Holy Days worship will be online this year.

Our Rifkin Campus partners have access to their offices within our health and safety guidelines during the pandemic. Masks are required in the building, along with social distancing.

Plans call for <u>Brightpoint Head Start</u>, which offers a free preschool program for children ages 3 to 5 from low-income families, to resume in-person classes at the Temple on Tuesday, September 8. About half the number of students will attend, compared to last year's 72 children, with staggered attendance schedules and new COVID-related safety measures. In recent months, Brightpoint used a federal grant to add air-conditioning and sinks to their classrooms in our Religious School wing.

Temple Executive Director Samara Sheray has been working with Brightpoint to ensure safety precautions are in place. These include enhanced cleaning throughout the building and detailed plans for kitchen, classroom, and facility use by Head Start.

No decisions have been made yet by the Temple's leadership regarding when the building will re-open for in-person services and events. Our staff is in communication with local faith communities and other Indiana Jewish congregations to compare operational plans in response to COVID-19. We continue to review state and local public health guidance, and best practices provided by the Union for Reform Judaism for its member congregations, as well as feedback from members of our congregation.

Thank you for your ongoing support of the Temple during the past several months as we navigate these difficult times of COVID-19. We continue to focus on upholding Judaism's highest priorities of maintaining life and health.

LIBRARY UPDATE: ORDER ONLINE AND PICK UP AT THE TEMPLE

Though the building remains closed, we have worked out a way for members to access the resources of our <u>Rabbi Richard B. Safran Library</u>. Order your book anytime online and pick it up at the Temple Office!

First, check out <u>our online catalog</u> for an easy-to-use list of our materials. We have more than 6,000 titles in our collection, and you can search them easily from any device. You'll find not only books, but also videos and music as well.

Once you've found something you're interested in, you'll need an account number to place a hold and manage your account. All members of Congregation Achduth Vesholom have an account number, which can be obtained by e-mailing our librarian, Betsy Gephart, at library@templecav.org.

When you click the "Place Hold" button in the catalog, you will be prompted to enter this number. This will send an e-mail to our librarian, and she will contact you as soon as your materials are ready to be

picked up at the Temple office. Since we have reduced staff at the building, our pick-up days will be Wednesdays and Thursdays between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m.. Our lending period is two weeks, after which you will receive reminder e-mails.



To check your account, simply click on the small "person" icon on the top right of your catalog screen and log in with your account number. That will bring you to your "borrowing" page, where you'll see what you have checked out. You can also edit your contact information from this page. It is very important that we have a current e-mail address for those who borrow library materials.

child abuse intervention organizations.

In Pirkei Avot (1:4) we read, "Let your home be a meeting place for sages." Indeed, today our homes have become study centers in which we strive to make connections with one another as we learn to adapt and grow in an everchanging world.

HOLIDAY FOOD DRIVE RETURNS WITH DROP-OFF GUIDELINES

For many years, Congregation Achduth Vesholom has held a High Holy Days Food Drive. You know the one, "Pick up a bag at Rosh Hashanah and bring it back filled on Yom Kippur."

Unfortunately, in keeping with the current theme of this year that "nothing will happen the way it always has," the act of bringing bags of food and household items will be different since services are online this year.

Our Social Action Committee has decided that this mitzvah really should continue. We ask you to again fill grocery bags with non-perishable items to donate. Especially preferred are canned goods (tuna, chicken, and beans), cereal, instant mashed potatoes, pasta, peanut butter, and rice.

We have two options to make this happen to benefit the food bank at <u>Wellspring Interfaith Social Services</u> and ask for your help.

Drive up and drop off at the Temple

Tuesday, September 22 and Wednesday, September 23 11 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Members of the Social Action Committee will be waiting for you. Before leaving home, put your bags to donate in the trunk of your car. Drive up to the Temple, pop the trunk open, and a volunteer (who will be wearing a mask) will gladly gather the groceries. You don't need to get out of the car or come in direct contact with anyone.

Before leaving home, put your bags to donate in the trunk of your car. You'll need to ring the doorbell at Wellspring, but can then return to your car and someone will come out to pick up the donations from your trunk.

With the social isolation at this time, it can be hard to feel a sense of helping. This simple act of caring goes a very long way in *tikkun olam*, an act of repairing our world. Your help in continuing this very worthwhile food drive is so very appreciated.

Please note that traditional, Reform and all-congregation services, including Selichot, Rosh Hashanah, Shabbat Shuvah, Yom Kippur, and Break-the-Fast, will be livestreamed either on Zoom or another service. Our staff is in the process of finalizing these details. If you receive the Temple's weekly email, then you will receive the links. Members without internet access should call the Temple office as soon as possible to discuss alternatives. Please ask any guests to contact the Temple office for access information.

Tips for Zoom

Please familiarize yourself with these procedures to help make the videoconferencing experience safe and enjoyable for all:

- Please be patient as it may take some time to identify everyone.
- Please "rename" yourself so we can see who you are as you enter our Zoom waiting room.
- Please try to get online early so that we can begin on time. You will be able to join the waiting room starting 20 minutes before the service.
- Everyone will be placed on mute. The chat box will be available to offer greetings, but please limit comments to the beginning and end of the service out of respect for those leading the service and worshiping.
- Just a reminder that you can be seen during a Zoom gathering, so please be aware of surroundings. You have the option of turning off your camera at any time. You also can use Zoom on your phone by using the call-in number. We won't be able to see you, but you will be able to hear. <u>Learn more about Zoom.</u>

PLƏN AHEƏD TO BORROW MƏCHZORIM FOR THE HOLIDƏYS

With online services this year for the High Holy Days, we are making the Temple's *machzorim* (holiday prayer books) available for congregants to borrow during the Days of Awe for both Reform and traditional worship.

If borrowing, members must follow guidelines for keeping the prayer books in great condition and return them no later than Thursday, October 15. Please note that the borrower is responsible for replacement of any misplaced or damaged books at \$40 per copy.






The hour-long film depicts the story of nearly 20,000 Jewish refugees from Nazi-occupied

Europe to the Chinese port of Shanghai during World War II.

Doris, 86, was flown to New York to be interviewed about her experiences from the time she and her mother left Berlin in January 1939 when Doris was 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ years old. They boarded a ship for California on her 13th birthday, weighing 65 pounds, later settling in Peoria, Illinois.

After 52 years living in Fort Wayne, Doris relocated near family in Chicago. She is a past president of the Temple and also is a past president and executive director of the Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne.

ELUL IS TIME OF INTROSPECTION BEFORE NEW YEAR

The month of Elul is the period leading to the High Holy Days and New Year 5781. During this time of introspection, we traditionally take "an accounting of the soul," *cheshbon hanefesh* in Hebrew, looking deeply inside ourselves to evaluate our actions and seeking personal insights for the New Year ahead. <u>Find readings for the month from the Central Conference of American Rabbis.</u>

Several customs during Elul are designed to remind us of the liturgical season and help us prepare for the holidays. <u>Find five things to know about Elul</u>, including hearing the sound of the shofar, visiting the graves of loved ones, and reading Psalm 27. Learn about <u>The Shofar Project</u>.
