STRINGS OF INSPIRATION WITH BRUCE COLEGROVE



Temple member Bruce Colegrove returns on Wednesday, February 17 at 7 p.m. on Zoom with more stories of some of the most remarkable events in the life of the women's orchestra at Auschwitz-Birkenau.

He first shared incredible stories of these women in fall 2019 when the Violins of Hope programming captivated members of the Fort Wayne community.

This time Bruce will turn his focus to the ironic tragedy that befell the Jews of Hungary. As before, Bruce will share some recent discoveries in his research. He will discuss two Jewish women whose exemplary skill with the violin earned them a place in the women's orchestra at Auschwitz.

The first of these women toured the capitals of Europe with her band of Gypsy boys, and then succeeded Alma Rosé as the leader of the orchestra. The second was a young beauty who arrived at Auschwitz as a pregnant newlywed, and then languished in near oblivion - up to this very day.

Bruce describes the women's orchestra as the most eclectic, the most unique, the most controversial, and, without any question, the most zealously documented gathering of female musical talent the world has ever known. By many regards, it was also the most inspiring.

An ardent researcher in Holocaust studies, Bruce is the developer of the website Women's Orchestra of Auschwitz-Birkenau at https://thegirlsintheauschwitz.band/. He is a long-standing Hebrew teacher at Achduth Vesholom and a 20-year faculty member at Canterbury High School.

BE HAPPY, IT'S ADAR!



The secular month of February, which overlaps significantly with the Hebrew month of Adar, presents an interesting meeting of two themes. Precisely in the middle of February is Valentine's Day, a day when we celebrate the relationships we share with our most beloved ones. And precisely in the middle of Adar is Purim, an upsidedown holiday that commemorates the transformation of grief and mourning into festive joy. The rabbis teach about this month, "When Adar begins, we increase in joy." (BT Ta'anit 29a)

This delightful confluence of secular love and traditional joy makes this a very special month on both calendars. The Torah that we are reading in February/Adar adds substantially to the richness of this time. The Exodus *parashiyot* tell of the Israelites receiving the Ten Commandments, building a social order, and establishing the basis of religious practice. There is so much to inspire the love of Torah and the joy of life in February and Adar!

This month as we prepare for Purim, while we continue to endure the age of COVID, I invite you to set aside time to reflect on where you find joy – even in the smallest of ways. The Purim story shows us that even in the most difficult of times, our fortunes can change in an instant, ushering in joy and pointing us toward a radiant future.

While we have certainly sewn many tears in recent months, may we now fully reap the joy of Adar.

Three weekly study options are available online for those interested in a deeper exploration of Torah or Hebrew texts. Links are sent through the weekly email to our Temple family. Torah Study With Rabbi Meir

Delve into important lessons in the weekly Torah portion with Rabbi Meir Bargeron on Tuesdays from 7 to 8:30 p.m. on Zoom.

This learning series grew out of robust discussions during our Shabbat morning services that demonstrated an enthusiasm and interest from congregants in nurturing and encouraging an in-depth study of Torah. Everyone who is post-B'nai Mitzvah and older is welcome.

Study the Five Books of Moses with Rabbi Kornspan

Read and study the Torah, verse by verse, with classic commentaries by Rashi, Rashbam, Seforno and many others during a weekly study group led by Rabbi Mitchell Kornspan on Sundays at 7 p.m. on Zoom. Temple members, as well as members of the larger Fort Wayne Jewish community, are invited to participate.

This approach to the study of Torah delves into the depths of Rabbinic teaching on the Torah Portion. Note that this group is not studying the texts on the same schedule as the weekly Torah portion. Participants should attend with a *Tanakh*, and learners with any level of Hebrew proficiency are welcome.

Hebrew Liturgy Study Group with John Planer

Study the Hebrew texts – both Orthodox and Reform – of the daily and Shabbat liturgies on Mondays at 7 p.m. led by John Planer on Zoom.

The group will begin at a basic level of Hebrew with a focus to understand the meanings and grammar of the texts we recite and to note significant variants. John says he hopes the group will not only study, but also become a *chevra* (fellowship). The group is open to any and all.



FOOD, MITTENS, & MORE FOR THOUGHTFUL THURSDAYS FAMILIES



Even though our Thoughtful Thursdays volunteers are unable to be together at the Temple to assemble bags due to COVID-19, our team has really stepped up to gather the necessary items for the bags.

Whether shopping in person or ordering online for delivery to the Temple, our volunteers are making sure that we will have food for the Brightpoint Head Start families through the end of their school year in May. Thank you to our amazing team!

The Jewish community not only made the Thoughtful Thursdays Turkey Project in November the most successful to date, but the outpouring of generosity also helped with a few

immediate needs of some of the Brightpoint Head Start children.

We were able to give each child a pair of warm, waterproof mittens before they left for winter break. We also provided 10 pairs of sweat pants to be kept for "emergencies" on site and three warm, winter jackets to children who had none. Thank you to our wonderful supporters!

This month we will be sending home bags that include peanut butter, jelly, chicken rice soup, canned mandarin oranges, crackers, four rolls of toilet paper, tissues, hand sanitizer, and a Valentine goodie bag, as well as a few extras.

Though the building is closed, your <u>Rabbi Richard B. Safran Library</u> is open and available to you! If you're able to get to the Temple office to pick up materials, we can have them ready and waiting.


During this "down time," we've added lots of titles to our catalog – from some recent Hebrew and family book donations to some new books for children and teens. And we've continued to update our catalog with books from B'nai Jacob's collection. With more than 6,500 titles in the library, there are no doubt more selections available now than last time you checked.



Among our most recent donations was a wonderful family history by member Harriet Miller recounted by her parents, Joe and Marion Sweedler. We are happy to add family histories of Temple families to our collection. We also recently received a handful of new Hebrew titles, including an especially adorable Hebrew version of *Winnie the Pooh!*

Perhaps our most topically relevant new book is the picture book, *The Polio Pioneer*, by Linda Marshall. A biography of Jonas Salk for young children, it addresses the idea of vaccines and their importance. Two other new picture book biographies cover violinist Itzhak Perlman, and Judy Kaplan, the first girl in America to have a Bat Mitzvah. Also for the picture book set, you might liven things up with *Zombie Vacation*, a picture book about Israel by Lisa Rose with a Zombie twist!

We've added several Holocaust-related titles to our collection. Most intriguing is a set of three graphic novels based on the life of Irena Sendler. Created by Jean-David Morvan, they are perfect for middle school readers. Also for middle-schoolers, children's book author, Ule Shulevitz, has written an autobiography, Chance: Escape from the Holocaust: Memories of a Refugee Childhood. And Ruth Behar's Letters from Cuba, traces



Finally, we've added numerous titles to our catalog from the B'nai Jacob collection, and hope to conclude that process by this spring. A significant number of Torah study titles and commentaries are there to explore. Among other books, we've added *The Tenth Song* by Naomi Ragen, *Jewish Parenting Wisdom* by Steven Rosman, and *Cracking the Bible Code*, by Jeffrey Satinover. Also intriguing is Alan King's *Matzo Balls for Breakfast and Other Memories of Growing Up Jewish*, a collection of reflections of Jewish celebrities.



The next virtual Temple Book Club on Tuesday, March 2 at 7 p.m. features a discussion with author Goldie Goldbloom about her novel, *On Division*, winner of the 2020 Jewish Fiction Award. Please RSVP to receive the link.

Set in Brooklyn's Chasidic community, the book follows Surie Eckstein, a 57-year-old wife, mother, and grandmother, who has just discovered she is pregnant. From *The National Book Review*, "Goldbloom captures the full scale of human emotion in this family in a contemporary ultra-Orthodox community as Surie contends with this news, and somehow taps into the particular demands of Chassidic life, as well as the universality of shifting generational boundaries."

Rachel Kamin of the <u>Association of Jewish Libraries</u> writes, "The result is a multi-layered story of how secrets can shake even the most secure and close-knit families that is accessible to readers both familiar and unfamiliar with the insular world of ultra-Orthodox Jews." REFLECTIONS ON RELIGIOUS SCHOOL

Have you ever considered the essence of Jewish time? That a Jewish day begins at sunset, that a Jewish week is measured by the days leading up to Shabbat, that a Jewish month begins with a new moon, and that Jewish years are timed from creation providing us with order, contentment and well-being.

Soon we will enter the Hebrew month of Adar, the month in which we celebrate the holiday of Purim. *Mi sh'nichnas Adar marbim b'simcha* (Talmud) "one who enters (the month of) Adar increases joy."

Jewish education is fluid in that it has changed throughout time. Religious school for my parents' generation was different than religious school of my generation which in turn is different when we think about religious school for today's generation. Whereas in the past we have studied prayers and language, history and texts, what relevance does that approach hold in empowering our youth to negotiate the world we live in today? Perhaps, providing our students with experiences that bring them joy is an answer.

"...boogie woogie, shake your tushie..." was part of the lyrics to the "Chanukah Bamba" song that greeted our students for our Hanukkah Roundup last month. Amidst marshmallow dreidels, a dreidel spinoff and origami, Hanukkah Mad Libs and bingo, and Jewish Jewpardy, students had a joyous Hanukkah celebration.

Tu B'shevat and learning about Dr. Seuss' *The Lorax* made us aware of our responsibility to our planet. Engaging our kids so that they make connections with our heritage should be an end goal of a Jewish education; making those connections joyful will further add to their sense of well-being and contentment.

NEWS FROM THE BOARD

COVID Guidelines Adopted

The Temple Board at its January 14 meeting adopted recommendations from the congregation's COVID Task Force that include procedures and guidelines for health risk screening, contact tracing, and re-opening. Joe Cohen, chair of the COVID Task Force, said his committee will continue to monitor reports from government and health officials before recommending a re-opening date to the board.

Rabbinic Transition & Formal Ordination

President Ellen Tom and Rabbi Meir Bargeron told about their about their participation in the Shallat Rabbinic Transition program through the Union for Reform Judaism. The sessions provided resources for understanding the challenges of successfully integrating a new rabbi into the community and doing so during the time of COVID. Rabbi Meir said we're blessed with good leaders and resources to help position us through this unusual time.

Rabbi Meir's formal rabbinic ordination will take place in May through Hebrew Union College - Jewish Institute of Religion in Los Angeles. Planning also will begin soon for Rabbi Meir's installation in Fort Wayne. It's not known yet whether the events will be virtual or in-person.

Hanukkah Gift Thank Yous

Many letters have been received from congregants thanking the congregation for the bottle of olive oil sent to members for Hanukkah in December. One wrote a note saying "it felt so nice to be thought of." Rabbi Meir said he was glad that we had the opportunity to show the congregation how much community means to us. He said we also had an enthusiastic response to our Hanukkah at Home candle lighting evenings, with some congregants attending each of the eight nights.

New Adult Learning Classes

Rabbi Meir said he's excited about two new adult learning classes that are being offered, including a Hebrew Liturgy Study Group with Dr. John Planer and a Study of the Five Books of Moses with Rabbi Mitchell Kornspan. Rabbi Meir also offers a weekly Torah Study program.

Generous Bequest To Endowment Fund

Vice President-Finance Scott Goldberg reported that the Endowment Fund has received a generous bequest of \$50,000 from the estate of Leona Zweig Rosenberg. She will be recognized as part of the Temple's L'dor Vador Legacy Society in June at our congregation's Annual Meeting. A Chicago

resident, she maintained membership at Achduth Vesholom and B'nai Jacob before her death at age 98 in December 2019. A Fort Wayne native, she was secretary to CAV's Rabbi Frederic Doppelt for a time after she graduated from high school.

Leadership Development

Board Development Committee Chair Beth Zweig said that 14 members participated in January in our Leadership CAV 2021 program. She said the sessions provided an opportunity for congregants to learn more about the Temple and to find ways to get more involved.

Torah Scribe Visits

Executive Director Samara Sheray said a sofer (Torah scribe) spent two days in January at the Temple evaluating and repairing our scrolls. She said he'll provide a report that will highlighted in an upcoming Bulletin.

B'nai Jacob Transition Board Update

Jay Zemmol reported for the Congregation B'nai Jacob Transitional Board that efforts are moving forward to integrate the finances of the former B'nai Jacob into Achduth Vesholom's as part of the transition to one congregation that formally began in July 2019.



Congregation Achduth Vesholom joined in solidarity with the Fort Wayne faith community and other communities nationally on January 19 to remember those who have died from COVID-19. Congregations were asked to "ring their bells" for five minutes beginning at 5:30 p.m. We honored the memories of those who died from the coronavirus with a prayer shared by Rabbi Meir, followed by the sound of shofars blown by Dan Bradley and Norm Greenberg in front of the Temple. Tips from Rabbi Sarah:

How should I prepare for class?

Prepare your hamantaschen dough and chill it in the refrigerator, following the recipe's instructions.

Love butter? Me too! I recommend this recipe from Jewish cook Tori Avey's blog.

Prefer something dairy-free? Use <u>Tori Avey's dairy-free recipe</u>. I typically use this one when teaching hamantaschen classes in person. It's delicious and easy to handle!

What should I bring to class?

- Hamantaschen dough
- Rolling pin
- Circular cookie cutter/biscuit cutter/drinking glass at least 3" in diameter
- Baking sheet
- Parchment paper cut to the size of your baking sheet
- Your favorite fillings. Here's a link to <u>some more traditional inspiration</u>. And <u>something a little wilder!</u>

He serves on the Board and Executive Group of JRI-Poland, is the founder of Bialystok Area Jewish Genealogy Group, and is on the Advisory Board of Gesher Galicia. Halpern was honored in 2018 with the IAJGS Lifetime Achievement Award.
