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

After a year of online worship during the pandemic, we're excited to begin a phased reopening of the Temple in April by resuming in-person services in the Sanctuary with limitations on crowd size and masking and distancing guidelines in place. At the same time, virtual services will continue for those at home via livestreaming.

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JOIN US FOR AN EVENING WITH 'NOTORIOUS RBG' AUTHOR

Learn more about the life and times of Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg during "An Evening with Irin Carmon," co-author of Notorious RBG, on Monday, April 12 from 7 to 8 p.m. on Zoom. Organized by the Temple's Social Action Committee, the program is open to the Jewish and greater community.



This is the first in what we hope will be a continuing series of journalists speaking directly to our members about issues of the day and the newsmakers who make the decisions regarding those issues, "Behind the News."

The author will speak about the late Justice Ginsburg, one of the Supreme Court's most liberal justices, and how her presence on the Court has affected the laws of our country. Filled with humor and inside stories, Carmon shares the time she spent with

Justice Ginsburg to prepare for the book's publication in 2015, plus the rich history of one of America's most admired women. The hour will include a question-and-answer segment.

This year we were extremely lucky to secure Carmon so soon after the untimely death of Justice Ginsburg in September 2020. Her story is one that will provide insight into the life and mind of Justice Ginsburg, and we are the first venue to schedule Carmon after the vacancy occurred on the Court.

Carmon is a journalist, co-author of the Top Ten, non-fiction New York Times bestselling Notorious RBG with Shana Knizhnik, and a frequent speaker around the country. A New York magazine senior correspondent and on-air CNN contributor, she reports and comments on gender, politics, and the law. Carmon and her co-author were featured in the award-winning and Oscar nominated 2018 documentary RBG.

Please join us on Sunday, April 4 at 10 a.m. for a Yizkor service on the last day of Passover, led by Rabbi Meir. Pesach is one of the three festival times each year when Jews observe <u>Yizkor</u> and share memorial prayers.

In-person worship resumes in April at the Temple with limited attendance and safety protocols in place. Masks must be worn in the building.

Ushers also are needed to ensure our safety protocols are followed. Please volunteer to assist with this important duty by contacting the Temple office. If we do not have enough ushers, then the in-person service will be canceled and worship will be offered only via livestream.



Our first in-person Shabbat services will be held on Friday, April 2 at 6 p.m. and Saturday, April 3 at the new time of 9:45 a.m. Yizkor for Passover will be observed on Sunday, April 4 during a service at 10 a.m. Please see the article at the top of this page for new information about prayer books on Saturday mornings.

The Temple remains closed for in-person programs, classes, Religious School, and meetings. Our leadership will continue to monitor the situation in the coming weeks, with the possibility of canceling or limiting in-person gatherings if conditions warrant and following recommendations of the congregation's COVID Task Force. Upcoming life-cycle events, including b'nei mitzvah, also would fall under the guidelines.

Safety protocols have been sent to congregants. These include refraining from singing, sitting only with your family unit, and maintaining distance from the bimah and other attendees. Oneg Shabbats will not be held.

Please understand that priority reservations will be needed for some services, such as simchas or Religious School programming. Please also regularly check your communications from the Temple in case of changes as a service approaches. Outdoor options will be considered in the coming months as the weather allows. Thank you in advance for adhering to our guidelines so that we may begin reopening safely.

RABBI MEIR BARGERON COUNTING OUR DAYS

As a still-newcomer to Fort Wayne, I have not yet run out of new experiences. All the more so, due to the pandemic. On a recent morning, I stumbled across a story in the paper that described a pair of peregrine falcons that have made their home at the top of the Indiana Michigan Power Center building, the tallest building downtown. I was delighted to find a link to the <u>IMP Falcon Cam</u>, which I immediately clicked to find a live image of one of the falcons sitting on their nest that contains four eggs.

This nest and its occupants quickly became a bit of an obsession for me. Each time I checked in on the falcons, they were in the same place, sometimes changing position, sometimes even taking a break but never staying away for long lest their eggs cool off. This pair of birds is waiting for the days to pass, an experience that is relatable to any expectant parent.

In this time after the Passover festival begins, we are also quite literally counting our days. I am referring of course to the *mitzvah* of <u>Sefirat HaOmer</u>, the counting of the Omer. During the seven-week period between Passover and Shavuot, it is tradition to count off each day in the evening after reciting a blessing.

The Torah commands the counting of the days, but it does not provide a narrative that we can use to construct meaning for this act. <u>Rabbi</u> <u>Abraham Joshua Heschel</u> (z"I) provides a key for understanding the meaning of counting the days. "Judaism teaches us to be attached to holiness in time, to be attached to sacred events, to learn how to consecrate sanctuaries that emerge from the magnificent stream of a year," he taught. Counting the Omer gives an opportunity for daily reflection on our people's redemption on Passover and the giving of the Torah on Shavuot. The 49 intervening days allow us to pause and consider the holiness of redemption and of revelation. This extended period invites us to slow down and recognize the sacred in each and every day.



Some people adopt a practice of

intentional reflection during the counting of the Omer. I invite you to explore these resources for contemplating the sacred time between Passover and Shavuot:

The entirety of life is built on individual days. The falcons in downtown Fort Wayne wait patiently for the 33 days that it typically takes their eggs to hatch, bringing new life into Creation. Counting the Omer gives each of us the opportunity to re-live the journey of the Israelites' redemption from slavery to the revelation of Torah at Mount Sinai.

May this period of counting and waiting bring each of you meaning and a connection with the sacred.

FROM 'MATZAH CRAZE' TO 'AND A CAT IN CARMEL MARKET': NEW FROM KAR-BEN IN OUR LIBRARY

As part of the ASAP program from Kar-Ben Publishers, we recently received a box of 11 new titles for our children's collection in the <u>Rabbi Richard B. Safran Library</u>. The books range from board books for the youngest set to a couple of juvenile fiction novels for middle-grade readers.

For our youngest patrons, *Rah! Rah! Mujadara*, by Jamie Kiffel-Alcheh, is a rhyming board book about the variety of Israeli foods. Also by Kiffel-Alcheh is one of the Passover books received, *Matzah Craze*. Told from the perspective of young student feeling singled out at school lunchtime during Passover, her matzah treats for lunch become the envy of her classmates. *The Great Passover Escape*, by Pamela Moritz, was the other Passover book in the box. Set in the Biblical Zoo in Jerusalem, some adorable animals are used to tell the story of the holiday.



Another picture book with adorable animals is Alyssa Satin Capucilli's *And a Cat from Carmel Market*. It's a great introduction to the traditions of Shabbat and the outdoor Carmel Market in Tel-Aviv. *An Egg for Shabbat*, by Mirik Snir, is another Shabbat title for younger children. In this book a young boy and his

Ruth Calderon's A Rainy Day Story is a retelling of a famous

folktale about Rabbi Hanina. *The Upside-Down Boy and the Israeli Prime Minister*, by Sherri Mandell, is a fun picture book about a boy who has trouble behaving, with a nod to David Ben-Gurion. The last picture book in the box is Lisa Rose's *The Singer and Scientist*, which tells the story of Albert Einstein and Marian Anderson.

To fill out the shipment, there

were three titles for older readers. Blake Hoena's *Natan Sharansky: Freedom Fighters for Soviet Jews* is a biography in graphic novel format. *The Woodcarver's Daughter*, by Yona Zeldis McDonough, follows a young Russian girl leaving their home for America. Batya hopes she can be a woodcarver like her father, but only boys are allowed. Barbara Krasner's 37 Days at Sea is a novel written in verse. Twelve-year-old Ruthie is the subject of this novel for middle-grade readers, which is set onboard the M.S. St. Louis, bound for Cuba in May of 1939.

RELIGIOUS SCHOOL STUDENTS EXPLORE "ESCAPE TO FREEDOM" AND PASSOVER

PURSUING JUSTICE: STANDING WITH MEMBERS OF THE AAPI COMMUNITY

Rabbi Meir Bargeron and Jaki Schreier, Executive Director of the Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne, sent this letter to the Jewish community on March 19. It also appeared as an op-ed piece in <u>The Journal Gazette</u>.

We are enraged and saddened by the wave of violence against Asian American/Pacific Islander (AAPI) people in America, including the shootings in Georgia and random street attacks, such as what occurred in San Francisco, also this week.

This violence is despicable and must come to an end immediately.

However, these violent acts are only the most recent and visible aspect of discrimination against AAPI people in our society. This is a systemic problem rooted in xenophobia, racism and sexism, and heightened by the toxic climate of white nationalism that has racked our country in recent years. The inattention of other people with privilege has allowed this current crisis to spread without enough people speaking up in support of AAPI people in America.

As leaders of the Fort Wayne Jewish community, we offer our solidarity to members of the AAPI community, locally and nationally. Jewish tradition commands us to pursue justice whenever we see injustice (Deuteronomy 16:18) and to love our neighbors as ourselves (Leviticus 19:18).

Further, our sages taught that "*All people are descended from a single human being, Adam... so that no one can say, 'my ancestor is worthier than yours.*" (Mishnah Sanhedrin 4:5) There is no room for racism and discrimination in the Creation made by the Eternal One, as we are all members of the same human family.

We call on all people of good will to stand up for the inherent dignity of every human being and to work within their means and their capabilities to stand up against white supremacy, racism and discrimination in all of their forms.

Every person has the right to be treated with respect, and to live and prosper in a society without fearing violence. It is up to each of us to do our part to make this so.

NEWS FROM THE BOARD

Budget Planning Underway

Finance Vice President Scott Goldberg reported at the March meeting of the Temple Board that the budgeting process is underway for the fiscal year 2021-2022, which begins July 1. A letter has been sent to members asking them to make a dues pledge for the coming year. The information helps us create the annual budget.

Nominating Timeline Outlined

Beth Zweig, chair of the Board Development Committee, told the board that the committee is working on nominations for the Temple's leadership to be elected at the Annual Meeting on June 9. She said the committee's focus this year has included leadership development in hopes of inspiring more congregants to get involved with committee and future leadership roles.

In developing a slate of candidates, the committee also must find the next president of the congregation since Ellen Tom is serving her fourth and final year in the post due to term limits. Filling the top leadership position has been challenging for many years, Beth said, and the committee has been discussing how the busy volunteers of today might approach the duties of president so they won't seem so daunting.

At the same time, she said, this period of transition is an exciting time at the Temple as we continue the coming together with B'nai Jacob, welcome a new rabbi, begin reopening for worship and navigating the pandemic, embrace the support of staff, engage members in all ways, and address strategic planning for the future.

She said she's fortunate to work with experienced congregational leaders on the committee: Fran Adler, Jamie Berger, Betsy Gephart, Mark Schneider, and John Stein.

Pesach Bags

President Ellen Tom said the Temple is working with the Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne to put together 170 bags for members who live locally in celebration of Passover. The bags will be ready prior to the end of March for pick-up for Pesach.

Rabbinic Consecration Ceremony

A Consecration ceremony to formally welcome Rabbi Meir Bargeron as our spiritual leader will take place on June 25-27. It will be a

"hybrid," with in-person and virtual components. The pandemic delayed our traditional welcome weekend when Rabbi Meir and his husband, Jon Tam, arrived in July 2020. A committee is working on plans for the weekend.

Developing Protocols for In-Person Worship

Rabbi Meir said he appreciates the support of the staff and leadership team in developing safety protocols for the return to in-person worship in April with limitations on crowd size and strict mask and distancing guidelines in place. Executive Director Samara Sheray said areas of focus include streaming options, security, signage, and seating. See page 1 for more information.

Temple Food Policy Updated

As part of an ongoing review of Temple policies being coordinated by VP Programs Kathy Sider, the board approved an updated food policy for items prepared in the Temple kitchen or brought into the building.

Though similar to previous rules, the new guidelines have been expanded to address food in the building during Passover, kosher areas of the Goldstine-B'nai Jacob Chapel, and food allergies. The policy includes:

- No pork or shellfish may be served on Temple property.
- At Temple-sponsored events, potlucks, and private events, meat and dairy products may not be served on the same tray or mixed in the same dish (i.e. no meat lasagna or cheeseburgers).
- At Temple events when meat or poultry are served, a vegetarian option must be provided.
- If applicable, food should be labeled "with nuts," "gluten free," "vegetarian," "vegan," "meat," or "dairy."
- Brightpoint follows the no pork or shellfish rule when in the building.
- Personal meals may include both meat and dairy.
- Kosher wine will be provided for Temple-sponsored events if Kiddush is recited. Grape juice also will be provided.

GENEALOGY SOCIETY PRESENTS PROGRAM ON HISTORIC INDIANA SYNAGOGUES

The Northeast Indiana Jewish Genealogy Society is thrilled to welcome Wendy Soltz on Sunday, April 18 at 2 p.m. for a program on "Northeast Indiana Historic Synagogues and Influential Families."



Wendy will speak on three historic synagogues: 1889 Ahavath Sholom in Ligonier, 1914 B'nai Jacob in Fort Wayne, and 1936-1937 Sinai Temple in Marion, and highlight some of the families who helped to build them and create sacred spaces for their communities.

She also will discuss the larger Indiana

Synagogue Mapping Project which she started in 2018 with the Indiana Jewish Historical Society. This project uses ArcGIS mapping technology to pinpoint and describe over 90 Indiana synagogues.

Wendy is currently an Assistant Professor of History and the Director of the Public History Program at Ball State University. Previously, she was Assistant Professor of Religious Studies and History at Defiance College in Defiance, Ohio, and Executive Director of the IJHS.

Soltz received her PhD in Modern Jewish, 19th- and 20th-century U.S., and public history in 2016 from The Ohio State University. We're excited to add some local history and genealogy to our calendar!





GUEST COLUMNIST SCOTT SALON

Temple member Scott Salon served on the Rabbinic Search Committee and currently is on the Rabbinic Consecration Committee. A long-time board member of the Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne, Scott recently reflected on the past year in a D'var Torah to the Federation board. We're sharing his thoughts here.



troubling, the most untimely deaths, this has been a year, I believe, of challenge for all of us. We have all needed to make significant modifications in our routines to both maintain our safety and the safety of those around us.

The last time I met in-person for a meeting at the Temple was February 2020, 13 months ago. And while we have continued our efforts with the benefit of Zoom, for me, at least, not being able to interact in person before and after our meeting has been an unwanted adjustment.

Sometimes the prudent adjustments to what had been my "normal" was experienced as a burden. However, on further reflection, they were, in many respects, merely inconveniences, not sacrifices. I have become more acutely aware that I am, and most of my social circle have been, so much more fortunate than the vast majority of the inhabitants of this planet.

With the internet for e-mail and Zoom, and others on a daily basis willing to risk exposure to a potentially deadly virus, I could maintain a pretty comfortable life. I could have all of my primary needs met and, really, many of my pleasures and enjoyments as well. This recognition has yielded a much deeper appreciation for real sacrifice and a reflection on that concept.

The English word sacrifice is derived from a Latin root with the primary definition being to make something holy: the act of offering something precious, for doing homage.

For Maimonides, subsequent to the destruction of the Temple in Jerusalem, biblical sacrifices were no longer possible. Moreover, he reasoned, G-d had no need for burnt offerings or worship sites. Rather he describes the point of all Jewish practice is to assist human beings in their strivings to raise themselves in the direction of G-d.

Furthering this reasoning, others have suggested we can be closer to G-d if we conduct ourselves in constructive humanistic ways. Practicing benevolence through compassion, generosity, and goodwill for the earth and all of its inhabitants.

I'll finish with a thought from Winston Churchill: "We make a living by what we get, we make a life by what we give."
