We're back in the building for more!

Our phased reopening for in-person worship continues in May with fewer limits on crowd size, continued masking and safety protocols, and the possibility of additional programs and meetings in the building. Livestreaming of services and events will continue.

The Temple Board determined at its April meeting that worship services, including life-cycle events, would be able to accommodate up to 100 people. The previous limit was 50 attendees. Maximum attendance numbers will vary based on the room configuration and take into account distancing guidelines.

RABBI MEIR BARGERON

HARVESTING OUR TORAH FOR NEW MEANING

This month we observe the festival of Shavuot. The name comes from the Hebrew word for "weeks," and the holiday occurs seven weeks after Passover. Shavuot originated as an agricultural festival that marked the transition from the spring barley harvest to the summer wheat harvest. On the festival day, the Israelites would bring crop offerings to the Temple. Once the Temple was destroyed, with sacrifice no longer possible, the sages transformed Shavuot into a commemoration of the giving of the Torah at Mount Sinai. Today, it is common to celebrate Shavuot by engaging in all-night Torah study. Torah, the center of Jewish life, thus has become the center of Shavuot.



We understand Torah to be the story of the Jewish people, first in relationship and later in covenant with God. The word "torah" also is translated as "instruction." Beyond being a book of commandments, Torah is the compendium of lessons that God offered to the Jewish people. Torah is the basis of sacred wisdom.

As each of us reads Torah, we do so as utterly unique creations. In the space between our bodies and the words, we read, we interpret, and we encounter God. The words of Torah remain the same for all time, but the wisdom we harvest from them is unique to each of us – and often unique to each stage of our lives.

What is your story and how have you come to understand who you are? Each of us lives a life that is filled with experiences and lessons; with moments of joy and moments of despair. If we are paying attention, we can't help but to learn from the lessons of our lives. This is where our human wisdom comes from. If we pay attention to Torah, we can't help but to be shaped by it. Our lived experience shapes our understanding of Torah. What beautiful symmetry!

Shavuot brings together the first fruits of a hopefully abundant harvest with the abundant instruction of Torah. This Shavuot, and every day, may the Torah spoken by the Eternal One, and written by the hand of Moses structure and enrich our lives; and may our hard-earned human wisdom bring new insights to our reading of Torah.



NEW TITLES IN THE LIBRARY FROM CCAR

To update our collection, we recently added 12 new titles from <u>CCAR Press</u> (Central Conference of American Rabbis) to the Rabbi Richard B. Safran Library. Since we like to keep at least one copy of most prayer books on hand, we stocked up on a range of titles.

For our youngest congregants, we now have copies of *Mishkan T'Filah for Children* and *Mishkan T'Filah for Youth*. The former is geared to children in Kindergarten



In addition to the prayer books, we're excited to add some new commentaries and social justice titles. *The Book of Jonah: A Social Justice Commentary*, by Rabbi Dr. Shmuly Yanklowitz, delivers a message of human responsibility. *Pirkei Avot: A Social Justice Commentary*, by the same author, approaches this classic text from a contemporary social justice perspective. *Recharging Judaism: How Civic Engagement is Good for Synagogues, Jews, and America*, by Rabbis Judith Schindler and Judy Seldin-



Cohen, is a guide for congregations in working for social justice. And the essays in the collection, *Moral Resistance and Spiritual Authority*, edited by Rabbis Seth M. Limmer and Jonah Dov Pesner, explore the Jewish commitment to justice in all areas of contemporary life.

Just in time for Shavuot, we received Inscribed: Encounters with the Ten Commandments, edited by Rabbi Oren

Hayon. This is a collection of essays by a collection of rabbis and scholars addressing the impact of the commandments on contemporary life. The Mussar Torah Commentary, edited by Rabbi Barry H. Block, is an anthology of essays for each of the 54 weekly Torah readings. One of the mussar middot or character traits is included in each essay. Rabbi Marla Joy Subeck Spanjer, a member of our congregation, wrote one of the chapters.

Two classic guides have recently been updated. Navigating the Journey: The Essential Guide to the Jewish Life Cycle, is a revised edition of the older Gates of Mitzvah, edited by Rabbi Peter S. Knobel. Part question-and-answer format and part essays, this guide addresses every life cycle event imaginable. Mishkan Moeid: A Guide to the Jewish Seasons, is a revised edition of Gates of the Seasons, also edited by Knobel. Guidance for observing the holidays along with essays and historical background are included.

In our inaugural "Behind the News" program, Irin Carmon, co-author of Notorious RBG, shared insights about Supreme Court Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg (z"I) on April 12 with more than 100 members of the Temple and community joining virtually.

The Temple's Social Action Committee, chaired by Rena Black, presented what they hope will be a continuing series of journalists speaking directly to our members and community about the issues of the day and the newsmakers who make decisions on those issues.

The Q&A that followed touched on questions concerning what Justice Ginsburg might have thought about enlarging the size of the court and when Justice Stephen Breyer might retire.

Carmon also got acquainted during a pre-event on Zoom with the committee, Temple leaders, and guests. She shared many stories, including her involvement in breaking the story about sexual-harassment allegations against Charlie Rose.

A New York magazine senior correspondent and on-air CNN contributor, Carmon reports and comments on gender, politics, and the law. Carmon and her co-author were featured in the award-winning and Oscar nominated 2018 documentary RBG.

TWO WAYS TO ATTEND ANNUAL MEETING ON JUNE 9



As our congregation continues to carefully navigate during the pandemic and to adopt safety protocols for activities in the building, we will offer two ways for members to attend our 173rd Annual Meeting on Wednesday, June 9 at 7 p.m. – join us in person with a reservation or via Zoom videoconferencing.

While last year's congregational business meeting in the early months of COVID was entirely virtual, this year's gathering reflects a new reality - that

we're gradually reopening for worship and other activities, though some members are not yet comfortable returning in person.

Information will be sent to members in the coming weeks with further details about the meeting and how to vote on candidates for leadership and the budget for the 2021-2022 fiscal year. Due to the hybrid meeting format, voting will be conducted in advance by absentee ballot. Members in good standing are eligible to vote.

During the meeting, President Ellen Tom, the Board of Directors, and Rabbi Meir Bargeron will update the congregation on the past year's activities. We'll hear the latest plans for reopening and the impact of a year being closed during the pandemic. And we'll learn about the continued transition to one congregation with two traditions and details about the Consecration Weekend on June 25-27 when we formally welcome Rabbi Meir as our spiritual leader.

In addition, the annual meeting of our membership will include the presentation of the William Brosler Award to a member whose long-term involvement at the Temple and commitment to the congregation have gone above and beyond. We also will recognize:

- President Ellen Tom for her four years serving as President as she transitions to a year as Immediate Past President.




EXPERT TO SHARE GENEALOGY SEARCH TOOLS

The Northeast Indiana Jewish Genealogy Society is excited to welcome genealogist Stephen P. Morse for two free virtual programs on Sunday, May 2 at 1 p.m. Known perhaps equally for his invention of the 8086 computer chip and his genealogy prowess, Morse has brought these skills together with his One Step Website, a search aid for researchers.

Please join us for:

- 1 p.m. "One-Step Website a Potpourri of Genealogical Search Tools"
- 2:30 p.m. "Searching the 1950 Census with and without a Name Index."
 When the 1950 Census is made public in 2022, it will not automatically have an index. He will discuss the tools he has made available to help researchers dig into the census right away.



Born in Brooklyn, New York, Morse received degrees in electrical engineering from the City College of New York, the Polytechnic institute of Brooklyn, and New York University. In later life, he turned his attention to genealogy, creating his "One Step Website" with dozens of search tools used by genealogists around the world.

In 2006, he received a Lifetime Achievement Award from the International Association of Jewish Genealogical Societies (IAJGS) and his website has been acknowledged for years by leading genealogy magazines.

Registration is required to attend this free virtual program.

A SURGEON'S VIEW OF WORLD WAR II IN PATTON'S THIRD ARMY

Through photos and commentary, Thomas H. Brush will share the fascinating story of his father on Monday, June 14 from 7 to 8:30 p.m. <u>via Zoom</u> in "A Surgeon's View of World War II in Patton's Third Army: The Story of John H. Brush, M.D." The program is sponsored by the Temple's Holocaust Education Committee.

A surgeon in a mobile auxiliary surgical group during World War II, Dr. John Brush experienced the liberation of Paris, the Battle of the Bulge, the attack on the Siegfried Line, the crossing of the Rhine, and the liberation of Ebensee Concentration Camp, a satellite of Mauthausen.

"While for me this is a chance for a personal tribute to my father, in the process we see these events through the eyes of one soldier, and I hope gain a more human perspective on them," said Dr. Thomas Brush.

He is a Professor of Management at the Krannert School of Management at Purdue University. His research focuses on corporate strategy and manufacturing strategy topics such as acquisitions, diversification, manufacturing capability exploitation within companies, and supplier relationships.

A SEDER? ACTUƏLLY, A ZEDER!

While we saw each other in gallery view rather than around a traditional table, more than 50 members of our extended Temple family celebrated the second night of Passover together on March 28 from around the U.S. at a fun and meaningful Zoom Seder (aka Zeder).

Rabbi Meir guided us through the Haggadah with a focus on the ritual aspects of Passover. Ronnie & Norm Greenberg led the singing of "Dayenu" and "Chad Gadya" from their winter headquarters in Tucson. Brad Gordon, son of Geoff & Rachel Gordon, offered the Four Questions on behalf of our younger members.

Congregants volunteered for other readings as we retold the story of the Exodus and learned about the symbolic items on the Seder Plate. Many members – sitting at beautifully appointed Seder tables – had matzah, bitter herbs, and charoses ready at home to partake in a Hillel sandwich with Rabbi Meir. Haggadahs were distributed to local members in Passover bags provided by the Temple and the Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne, with virtual copies also available.

As we concluded the one-hour virtual Seder, we collectively said "Leshana haba'a biYerushalayim! – Next year in Jerusalem! Next year may all people be free!" Rabbi Meir added: "May we be together in the building at the Temple next year together – B'yachad."

NEWS FROM THE BOARD

In-Person Activities in the Building

The Temple Board at its April meeting reviewed protocols for in-person worship and other considerations for programs, meetings, and life-cycle events. COVID Task Force Chair Joe Cohen reviewed recommendations for social distancing and other aspects of reopening.

Rabbi Meir said that we've consistently had members attend in person every Shabbat since we reopened for worship in April. He acknowledged that more congregants have attended via Zoom than in person, perhaps due to comfort levels and convenience, along with those who are snowbirds. Rabbi Meir said attendance has been greater when we have a baby naming or Religious School event.

With vaccinations more prevalent and several life-cycle events on the calendar, the board voted to increase attendance limits from 50 people to 50 percent of the seating capacity allowable under safety guidelines. Staff will determine specific limits based on the event. Masks still are required in the building. Meetings, programs, and Religious School may be held in person. (See page 1)

Congregation B'nai Jacob Transitional Board

The Congregation B'nai Jacob Transitional Board has voted to move forward with dissolving the remaining legal entity and distributing congregational funds.

Mark Schneider, President of the seven-member CBJ Transitional Board, told the Temple leadership at its April meeting that the transitional board hopes to wrap up all business matters pertaining to B'nai Jacob by July and that they have initiated the transfer of some funds from B'nai Jacob to Achduth Vesholom.

The transition to one congregation with two traditions began in July 2019 when members of B'nai Jacob joined Achduth Vesholom.

Livestreaming Services

Executive Director Samara Sheray said the Temple is looking for individuals to run livestreaming for worship services in the summer on Friday evenings and Saturday mornings. She and Ritual Committee Chair Denny Reynolds have been staffing the Zoom room for the past year.

Security Doors Added

Three new sets of security doors have been installed in the Religious School hallway. These doors provide better access control in our building, allowing us to isolate the school wing as needed or while having other events.

Executive Director Samara Sheray said the new doors were funded through a \$100,000 federal grant obtained by the Temple in 2019 for ongoing security improvements. The Nonprofit Security Grant Program is funded by the Department of Homeland Security and FEMA.

Interactive Yahrzeit Plaques

The Temple staff has been compiling information for a database to be utilized in the new interactive yahrzeit plaque display planned for installation in the foyer.

GRADUAL REOPENING FOR IN-PERSON EVENTS (CONTINUED FROM PAGE 1)

After a year of online worship during the pandemic, the congregation began a phased reopening in April by resuming in-person services in the Sanctuary with limitations on crowd size and masking and distancing guidelines in place.

In order to protect the health of attendees and to facilitate contact tracing if needed, reservations are required to attend worship. Please make a reservation to the Temple office at office@templecav.org or (260) 744-4245 by the Wednesday before a given Shabbat service. We will confirm your reservation in advance. Please understand that we are unable to accept walk-ins. Masks are required at all times and must cover your nose and mouth. Please review safety guidelines prior to attending in-person worship.

Ushers also are needed to ensure our safety protocols are followed. Please volunteer to assist with this important duty by contacting the Temple office. If we do not have enough ushers, then the inperson service will be canceled and worship will be offered only via livestream.

Plans to reopen for in-person programs, classes, Religious School, and meetings are still being determined on a case-by-case basis. Religious School may hold an outdoor event for the final session on Sunday, May 16.

The leadership will continue to monitor the situation in the coming weeks, with the possibility of canceling or limiting in-person gatherings if conditions warrant and following recommendations of the congregation's COVID Task Force.

Revised safety protocols will be available soon on the Temple website and communications. These include refraining from singing, sitting only with your family unit, and maintaining distance from the bimah and other attendees. Oneg Shabbats will not be held.



Please understand that priority reservations will be needed for some services, such as simchas or Religious School programming. Please also regularly check your communications from the Temple in case of changes as a service date approaches. Outdoor options will be considered in the coming months as the weather allows.

Thank you for adhering to our safety guidelines.



We gathered for our first Shabbat in the Sanctuary on April 2 after more than a year, with masks and socially distanced for a safe reopening. Rabbi Meir led worship for an in-person group and those attending virtually at home. We also celebrated a baby naming with the Soltz family. Thank you to the staff and ushers for assisting.

Local fabric artist Sara Nordling replaced the existing appliques with new silk fabric in the same design and with colors similar to the original. The beautiful 15-foot-high curtain was commissioned for the Temple when it was built in 1960 and designed by Samuel Weiner Jr., an American Jewish artist.

The restoration was spearheaded by the Arts & Beautification Committee chaired by Carol Adelman. Maintenance Chief Clint Rossiter was able to repair the motor that operates the opening and closing of the Ark. What a lovely look for our Sanctuary for many years to come!
