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### AUTHOR TO DISCUSS NEW BOOK ON TREE OF LIFE SHOOTING AND SOUL OF A NEIGHBORHOOD

Please join us on Monday, October 25 at 7:30 p.m. at the Temple or on Zoom to hear author Mark Oppenheimer, whose new book, Squirrel Hill: The Tree of Life Shooting and the Soul of a Neighborhood, will be released in early October.

His appearance comes almost exactly on the third anniversary of the shooting, which occurred October 27, 2018, and was the deadliest attack on the Jewish community in the United States.

Mr. Oppenheimer is a freelance journalist and writes for The New York Times magazine, Mother Jones, Slate, and Tablet. He teaches English at Yale University, where he is the director of the Yale Journalism Initiative. He lives with his family in New Haven, Connecticut.

The evening will include a Q&A, refreshments, and an opportunity to buy the book and have Mr. Oppenheimer sign it. The Zoom link will be sent in the Temple's weekly email. Guests are asked to contact the Temple office by Thursday, October 21 for access information.

# RABBI MEIR BARGERON A SHABBAT FOR THE EARTH

Sometimes we need to take a break. The need for rest may lead a person to take a long vacation, a night out with friends, or even simply to chill out on the sofa while binging on whatever is on TV. The human condition requires that we take about a third of every 24-hour cycle for sleep. In Torah, God commands a period of rest for Creation:



"For six years you are to sow your fields and harvest the crops, but during the

seventh year let the land lie unplowed and unused. Then the poor among your people may get food from it, and the wild animals may eat what is left. Do the same with your vineyard and your olive grove." (Exodus 23:10-11)

This text is the origin of the *Shmita*, the sabbatical year when the earth takes the same rest as God enjoyed after six days of creating. *Shmita* is to the earth as Shabbat is to humanity. Because God granted humankind dominion over Creation, *Shmita* is our responsibility. After all, the land in a society based on agriculture can't rest itself!

In Jewish tradition the *Shmita* occurs every seventh year and <u>during this period</u> "debts are to be forgiven, agricultural lands to lie fallow, private land holdings to become open to the commons, and staples such as food storage and perennial harvests to be freely redistributed and accessible to all." Clearly, it requires the commitment of the entire society in order to meet these responsibilities.

The observance of the *Shmita* year has long been neglected, but has seen a renaissance in Israel, particularly among Orthodox Jews. Shmita has also inspired Jews around the world to take a year of renewed commitment to care for the world, and to ensure justice for those who face food insecurity.

When is the next *Shmita* year? As you may have guessed by this point, it is right now! This new year of 5782 gives each of us an opportunity to experience *Shmita* for ourselves. This year can you imagine:

- Making a commitment to take a break from something that does not serve you well, while also trying something new that is good for your health and wellbeing?
- Contributing your time, talent or resources to an organization that works to feed the hungry?
- Working collectively to take proactive steps to mitigate
  the impact of climate change? <u>Creation Care Partners</u>, which
  I talked about during my Rosh Hashanah morning sermon, is
  a partnership of Indiana Jewish and Christian congregations
  working together to care for the earth. If you would like to learn
  more about this effort and how you can be involved, <u>please be in</u>
  touch with me.

I invite each of you to consider the opportunities this *Shmita* year gives you to change your routine for the benefit of yourself, your neighbors, and the world that we share together.

The 2020 National Jewish Book Award winner in the Book Club category, The Lost Shtetl's premise is that a Polish shtetl somehow remained isolated through the twentieth century and escaped the Holocaust.

From Hadassah Magazine, "Judging by The Lost Shtetl, his brilliant debut novel, author Max Gross is the metaphysical love child of Sholem Aleichem and J.K. Rowling." This book should be the basis of a great discussion and is available in the Rabbi Richard B. Safran Library.

#### CHECK OUT THE GOLEM TALES IN OUR LIBRARY!

The golem is a favorite character from Jewish legend, popular in fiction for all ages, and we have several great titles available in the Rabbi Richard B. Safran Library.

The golem is a little bit scary for the youngest readers, so it doesn't appear in very many picture books. Marc Lumer's American Golem: The New World Adventures of an Old World Mud Monster, is a light-

hearted exception. A young Jewish immigrant boy creates a golem to protect him in his new and scary country. On the non-fiction side, Mark Podwal tells the story of the Old-New

Synagogue in Prague in Built by Angels:

The Story of the Old-New Synagogue. This was the golem's birthplace in legend. The book is beautifully illustrated.

Our juvenile fiction and non-fiction collections are the best source for golemrelated material. Sweep: The Story of a Girl and Her Monster, by Jonathan Auxier, won a National Jewish Book Award in 2018. Set in 19th-century England, this golem is created accidentally by a young girl working as a chimney sweep. Jane Yolen's Sydney Taylor Notable Book, B.U.G. (Big Ugly

Guy), includes a golem as a 12-year-old's bodyguard.

The Trouble with Good Ideas, by Amanda Panitch, is a brand-new addition to our collection. Twelve-year-old Leah creates a golem to look after her grandfather.

There are several non-fiction titles to choose from that tell the story more or less "straight." One of the best is David Wisniewski's Golem, the winner of a Caldecott Medal. It's a picture book with absolutely stunning illustrations, but because of the nature of its content – it's Barbara Rogasky's The Golem: A Version was the winner of a National Jewish Book Award, and Clay Man: The Golem of Prague, by Irene Watts, was a National Jewish Book Award finalist. We also

have similar titles by both Isaac Bashevis Singer and Elie Wiesel.


Three works of fiction are worth mentioning in our adult collection, suitable for teens as well. The Amazing Adventures of Kavalier & Clay, by Michael Chabon, is set in New York City in 1939. Comic books and golems are included in this adventurous, Pulitzer prizewinning novel. Helene Wecker's The Golem and the Jinni, was a

> "One Book, One Congregation" selection for us a few years ago. A National Jewish Book Award finalist, its main characters are a female golem and a male jinni (genie), and is also set in New York City, though around 1900. The Golem's Mighty Swing, by James Sturm, is a graphic novel set in the 1920s. The story centers around a Jewish baseball team and a questionable promoter who adds a golem to the mix.

The story of the golem is included in most of the folktale collections in our library. The anthology by Howard Schwartz, Miriam's Tambourine, presents "The Golem" in the most traditional setting, as protector of the Jewish people. Ellen Frankel's The Jewish Spirit includes Nathan Ausubel's retelling of an alternate version, where the golem must be destroyed by its creator. Beatrice Weinreich's collection, Yiddish Folktales, includes "The Golem of Vilna," yet another

variation on the story of this famous creature.


#### DIP INTO "HUMMUS! THE MOVIE"

The Temple Board met on Thursday, September 9 for its monthly meeting, with some members in person and others on Zoom.

#### Attendance For "Multi-Access" Rosh Hashanah Services

As we continue to navigate the pandemic, Rabbi Meir Bargeron told the board that "multi-access" Rosh Hashanah services provided three options for members to participate. The Temple



offered worship options in person and via livestream on Zoom and YouTube.

On Erev Rosh Hashanah for Reform services, 40 people attended in the Sanctuary, while online attendance included 25 screens on Zoom and 13 screens on YouTube. For Rosh Hashanah morning, 25 people attended in the Sanctuary, while online attendance included 25 on Zoom and 11 on YouTube.

For traditional services, Erev Rosh Hashanah brought 26 people to the Goldstine-B'nai Jacob Chapel, with five screens on Zoom and two screens on YouTube. For the first morning of Rosh Hashanah, 30 people attended in the chapel, with three screens on Zoom and four screens on YouTube. On the second day of Rosh Hashanah, 11 people attended in the chapel.

#### **Funds Earmarked For Traditional Worship Opportunities**

The Temple will receive about \$5,000 annually earmarked for a guest rabbi or cantor to lead traditional High Holy Days worship and/or to use toward programs related to traditional Judaism. This is the latest step toward wrapping up remaining financial matters by the Congregation B'nai Jacob Transitional Board.

The additional funds come from a generous bequest to B'nai Jacob made by Rae Lipp, a long-time member, to its Rabbinic Endowment Fund. Under the terms of the trust, the monies from the bequest will be held by the Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne, with \$5,000 plus some additional earnings, to be provided annually to Achduth Vesholom for programming related to traditional Judaism. If there is no need for traditional holiday services, the money will be used to support the salary of Achduth Vesholom's Rabbi.

# RON SUSKIND TO SPEAK AT PEOPLE OF THE BOOK PROGRAM IN NOVEMBER



Ron Suskind, an American journalist and author, will be the featured speaker at the People of the Book program on Monday, November 15 at 7:30 p.m. at the Rifkin Campus at 5200. He was the senior national affairs writer for the *Wall Street Journal* where he won the 1995 Pulitzer Prize for Feature Writing, for articles that became the starting point for his first book, *A Hope in the Unseen*.

Suskind has written six books and been published in several periodicals. He has written about the George W.

Bush Administration, the Barack Obama Administration, and related issues of the United States' use of power.

Published in 2014, his bestseller *Life, Animated*, chronicles his family's 20-year journey raising and connecting to their autistic son, Owen. The Suskind family is also the subject of an award-winning documentary feature of the same name. Their story has driven activism and research about the compensatory strengths of those with autism and others who are differently-abled.

The People of the Book program is hosted by the <u>Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne</u>, and is free and open to the public. A question-and-answer session will conclude Mr. Suskind's talk followed by a dessert reception and book signing by the author. His books will also be available for purchase.

# TUITION REIMBURSEMENT AVAILABLE FOR JEWISH STUDIES COURSES

The <u>Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne</u> is excited to remind our families about the Jewish Studies tuition reimbursement program for college students.

A student whose family is a member of the Federation will be reimbursed at a rate based on half the tuition cost per Indiana University credit hour for classes taken in Judaic Studies. As many of our youth are attending college all over the country and the tuition varies considerably from college to college, this policy provides equitable treatment to all of our university students.

A transcript showing the course and grade received and a copy of a fee payment receipt must be submitted as proof for reimbursement. The Federation reserves the right to request a syllabus or additional description of the class taken. A C+ grade or its numerical equivalent must be earned in the coursework in order to qualify for reimbursement.

Family membership is defined as a minimum gift of \$104 to the most recent Federation Annual campaign which runs from November to March.

The plant, a *Lonicera sempervirens* or coral honeysuckle, was available at a native plant sale held at the Geist Reservoir Nursery and, while I really did want the plant, it was actually just an excuse to go to Indy for food.

After the plant purchase, the next stop was Bagel Fair in Nora Plaza to stock our freezer with what we think are the best bagels in the world. If you know Indianapolis at all, you know that Geist Reservoir and Nora Plaza are both on the far north

side. Next, we schlepped all the way to south Meridian Street to Shapiro's Delicatessen for, you guessed it, corned beef sandwiches.

What is it about corned beef that compelled us to drive 225 miles to get it? What is it that fills that delicatessen's dining room day after day with people from all over the city, and that results in a line that snakes around the dining room, out the door, and around the building on days the Indianapolis Colts have a home game? I don't know. But I'm glad of it, since our Corned Beef On Rye – Sure to Satisfy fundraiser – now in its 19th year -- has been a major success for the Temple!

I use the word "success" meaning a number of different things. It has certainly been a financial success, bringing in over \$20,000 a year for the last several years – funds greatly needed to help the Temple's bottom line. We're glad to bring the sale back after a one-year hiatus due to the pandemic with COVID safety protocols in place. The enthusiastic response to the sale by the greater Fort Wayne community indicates we have been successful in enhancing good community relations, too. What better way to make friends than through food!

When the corned beef sale began back in 2002, the brainchild of Larry Adelman, one type of success we did not expect or predict was the congregational social aspect of the sale. Since its inception, "Corned Beef" has been one of the Temple's biggest social events of the year. More than 100 volunteers turn out on prep night and day-of-the-sale to package pickles, weigh corned beef, make sandwiches, cut brownies, schmooze, and generally have a great time while wearing hairnets and aprons and, this year, masks.
