


Picture Books for Younger Readers

The prophet, Elijah, is closely tied to Passover, and three award-winning picture books make that connection. Susan Kusel's *The Passover Guest* is a re-telling of a traditional Elijah story. Set during the Depression of the 1930s, it beautifully illustrates the plight of a family too poor to have a Seder. Though less about the prophet, *The Elijah Door: A Passover Tale*, by Linda Leopold Strauss, tells the story of a family feud and a rabbi's clever solution. *Welcoming Elijah: A Passover Tale with a Tail*, by Leslea Newman, features a kitten waiting in the cold when the door is opened. In our non-fiction section, *How It's Made: Matzah*, by Allison Ofanansky, is a photo-filled introduction to making matzah and other holiday foods. *The Littlest Frog*, by Sylvia Rouss, is a favorite among younger readers. For a simple but entertaining re-telling of the Passover story, check out Tilda Balsley's *Let My People Go!*







Chapter Books for Older Children

For older children, we have two excellent books to introduce the variety of Passover celebrations around the world: *Passover Around the World*, by Tami Lehman-Wilzig, and Deborah Heiligman's *Holidays Around the World: Celebrate Passover*. Fun fiction titles include Susan Abramson's *Rabbi Rocketpower and the Half-baked Matzah Mystery*, Anna Olswanger's *Shlemiel Crooks*, and *Penina Levine is a Hard-boiled Egg*, by Rebecca O'Connell. We also have two Passover cookbooks in our juvenile collection: *Let My Children Cook!*, by Tamar Ansh, and *Matzah Meals: A Passover Cookbook for Kids*, by Judy Tabs.

For Adults

We have an excellent Passover cookbook in our adult collection as well. *The New Passover Menu*, by Paula Shoyer, offers updated holiday recipes. For those in search of inspiration for the holidays, David Arnow's *Creating Lively Passover Seders*, and *The Women's Seder Sourcebook*, by Sharon Anisfeld, may provide new meaningful readings for your holiday service. Those interested in history may enjoy *The Passover Haggadah: A Biography*, by Vanessa Ochs, and essays for Passover are also included in volume three of Rabbi Paul Steinberg's anthology, *Celebrating the Jewish Year*.





Haggadot

In addition to fiction and non-fiction titles, our collection includes dozens of Passover Haggadot for all ages. Whether you're looking to add new readings, or considering a whole new service, we have a wide variety to choose from. Among our more entertaining family services, The Family (and Frog!) Haggadah, is a great option for those with young children. Sammy Spider's First Haggadah, by Sylvia Rouss, is another title created for young readers. The Energizing Haggadah for Children, by Janet Zwebner, is filled with hidden objects to find. For sports fans looking for a unique service, Sharon Forman's The Baseball Haggadah: A Festival of Freedom and Springtime in 15 innings, may fit the bill. Mishkan HaSeder: A Passover Haggadah, is the latest Seder service from CCAR Press. Designed like our other

contemporary prayer books, it combines a variety of readings with some beautiful artwork. In addition to many of the standard services, we also include in our collection the *New American Haggadah*, by Jonathan Safran Foer, and Elie Wiesel's *A Passover Haggadah*.
