SHARE SHAVUOT & TORƏH STUDY WITH US ON JUNE 6

Please join us when we celebrate Shavuot and the giving of the Torah on Mount Sinai on Monday, June 6 at 7 p.m. at the Temple and via livestream. Rabbi Meir will lead a brief service that will include Yizkor.

Following the service, we will engage in the tradition of Tikkun Leil Shavuot, Torah study on the night of Shavuot, and our topic will be the Ten Commandments. The

study session, which will be in person only, will be fun and lively. Join us afterward for a reception featuring cheesecake, a traditional food for the holiday.

Shavuot comes from the Hebrew word for "weeks," and the holiday occurs seven weeks after Passover. It originated as an agricultural festival that marked the transition from the spring barley harvest to the summer wheat harvest. Today, we mark the holiday as a celebration of Torah, education, and the choice to participate actively in Jewish life.


SPEAKER TO EXAMINE CHALLENGES & OPPORTUNITIES FOR HOLOCAUST EDUCATION IN THE 21ST CENTURY

Drawing on a decade of experience countering hate and a lifetime as the grandson of four Holocaust survivors, David Fox-Estrin will lead a discussion on Wednesday, June 15 at 7 p.m. at Congregation Achduth Vesholom that addresses the rising tide of anti-Semitic hate, dwindling numbers of Holocaust survivors, and what more we can do to turn memory into action to fulfill the promise of "never again" once

Fox-Estrin, the founder and chief executive officer of Together We Remember, will discuss "Choosing the Future of Our Past: Challenges and Opportunities for Holocaust Education in the 21st Century."

The program is sponsored by the Temple's Holocaust Education Committee and Purdue Fort Wayne's Institute for Holocaust and Genocide Studies. It also will be livestreamed. The link

action to end identity-based violence worldwide. He builds global campaigns and projects that unite students, educators, and leaders to counter violent hatred in their schools, communities, and on social media. By combining multimedia storytelling and solidarity activities, he strives to move audiences of all ages from inspiration to action across lines of difference. He has shared the story of his family and work extensively, from Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland, FL to the United Nations.

Summer services on Friday evenings will move a half-hour later to 6:30 p.m., beginning June 3 through September 2 (Labor Day Weekend). In a return to the Temple's customary seasonal timetable, services will move to 7:30 p.m. beginning Friday, September 9, continuing through Memorial Day.

TAKE A BREATH, THEN ACT

As I write these words in late May, life in our nation is feeling especially discomforting to me. The news and public commentary are filled with anger and anxieties about the Supreme Court, and the right of a person to choose when their body reproduces hangs in the balance. The proliferation of gun violence continues to kill innocent people of all ages, most recently 19 fourth-graders in Uvalde, TX, and lawmakers have suggested that teachers should be armed to protect their students,



while nothing is done to control access to guns.

Is it just me, or do any of you have the urge to pull the covers over your head? Or maybe just watch baking shows on TV? As I tried to make sense of my feelings of fatigue, anxiety, and despair, I found these words of wisdom from our Jewish sages:

If a person of learning participates in public affairs and serves as judge or arbiter, that person gives stability to the land... But if a person sits in their home and says to themselves, "What have the affairs of society to do with me?... Why should I trouble myself with the people's voices of protest? Let my soul dwell in peace!"—if one does this, they destroy (overthrow) the world. (Midrash Tanhuma, Mishpatim 2:1).

Yes, I expect that we can all relate to the sentiment "Let my soul dwell in peace." It is truly difficult to know how to make a difference in our world in times like this. Let us each take a breath and prepare for our next action to bring justice to our land. Through speaking up, writing letters, assembling in peaceful protest, and through our vote. Judaism demands this of us.

NEW FROM KAR-BEN PUBLISHERS IN THE TEMPLE LIBRARY

JOSÉ AND THE PIRATE CAPTAIN

The Rabbi Richard B. Safran Library is a member of Kar-Ben Publisher's "ASAP" program, which means we get two shipments per year of all of the publisher's newest titles for young readers. We

received our most recent box of books a few weeks ago, and they are now on the shelves ready for borrowing.

There were two Passover books in the box, which unfortunately didn't get out in time for the holidays. These include a board book by Pamela Mayer, Peek-a-Boo Passover, and Raquela's Seder, by Joel Edward Stein. The latter is a picture book set in Spain during the Inquisition. A girl and her father find a clever way to hold their seder.

Three new titles are available for middle-grade readers. When Lightnin' Struck, by Betsy R.

Rosenthal, is set in Odessa, Texas in 1928, and centers around an eleven-year-old, James, and his friend, Paul, a Russian immigrant. Bridget Hodder's The Button Box features a crystal box full of buttons from Ava's Sephardic ancestors. One is apparently magic, and takes Ava and her Muslim best friend, Nadeem, back in time. José and the Pirate Captain Toledano, by Arnon Z. Shorr, is a graphic


novel pirate adventure set during the Spanish Inquisition.

Two of the new titles are picture book biographies for young readers. Frank, Who Liked to Build: The Architecture of Frank Gehry, by Deborah Blumenthal, tells the story of the architect's childhood and dreams. Rena Glickman: Queen of Judo, by Eve Nadel Catarevas, chronicles a Jewish girl who became known as Rusty Kanokogi, one of the greatest female judo masters of her time.

Rounding out the order were four more picture books. Sylvia Rouss has a new Sammy Spider book out - Sammy Spider's First ABC perfect for "Sammy" fans. Bedtime for Maziks, by Yael Levy, is a Jewish take on the classic, Where the Wild Things Are. Anita Pazner's The Topsy-Turvy Bus us based on a real "Topsy-Turvy Bus"

created by Hazon, the largest Jewish environmental organization in North America. And Mrs. Noah's Doves, by Jane Yolen, tells of the special mission the doves had aboard the Ark.


WELCOME TO OUR NEWEST MEMBERS!

Information was sent to congregants in late May with further details about the meeting and how to vote on candidates for leadership and the budget for the 2022-2023 fiscal year. Absentee ballots also are available for those who cannot attend in person or virtually.

During the meeting, President Ronnie Greenberg, the Board of Directors, and Rabbi Meir Bargeron will update the congregation on the past year's activities.

A proposal will be presented for a major upgrade to the Temple's streaming capabilities that will improve video quality, sound, lighting, and technical aspects. The changes would include updating equipment to enhance streaming of services and programming from both the Sanctuary and Goldstine-B'nai Jacob Chapel. The proposal comes in response to requests for improvements from members as they increasingly embrace the use of technology to engage in Temple activities.

In addition, the annual meeting of our membership will include the presentation of the William Brosler Award to a member whose long-term involvement at the Temple and commitment to the congregation have gone above and beyond. We also will recognize:

NEWS FROM THE BOARD

The Temple Board at its May 12 meeting approved the congregational budget for 2022-2023 to be presented to the membership for consideration at the Annual Meeting on June 8. Finance Vice President John Stein said the budget includes increases for security, a new programming fund, and some changes as part of the Religious School's use of online Hebrew instruction.

President Ronnie Greenberg thanked John, Comptroller Jamie Fritz, Executive Director Samara Sheray, and the Finance Committee for their efforts in developing the budget for the fiscal year beginning July 1.

Air-Conditioning Repair

Facility Committee Chair Jay Zemmol reported that the compressor for the air-conditioner servicing the Social Hall needs to be replaced. The board approved spending up to \$20,000 to make the necessary repairs from special reserve funds.

Security Grant Application

The board authorized Executive Director Samara Sheray to move forward with again applying to the non-profit security grant program from the Department of Homeland Security and FEMA. The Temple previously received a \$100,000 federal grant for security upgrades in 2019. If awarded, the grant will further fortify our facility.

GENEALOGY SOCIETY ANNOUNCES 2022-2023 PROGRAMS

The <u>Northeast Indiana Jewish Genealogy Society</u> recently announced its line-up of programs for 2022-2023. Five free public programs will be offered, both live and virtually. Upcoming events include:

On Sunday, September 11, the NEIJGS will begin with its annual "Meet Your Mishpocha" Open House at Congregation Achduth Vesholom. A variety of resources will be available for Jewish genealogical research and local Jewish history.



The first guest speaker will be Marian Smith, speaking on Sunday, November 13 about "The Increasingly Accessible U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Correspondence Files." Marian served for 30 years as an historian for the Immigration and Naturalization Service, later U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services, and has lots of information to share about late 19th and 20th century immigration records.

In February 2023, Dr. Nicholas J. Evans will present three virtual programs on consecutive Tuesday afternoons. Hosted in conjunction with the <u>ACPL Genealogy Center</u>, the presentations will track the journey of Eastern European emigrants from their homes to the United States and elsewhere. Nick will begin on Tuesday, February 7 at 2:30 p.m. with a program about the journey of Eastern European immigrants from their homes to ports of emigration. The following Tuesday's program on February 14 will focus on the overseas journey and the ports of arrival, mainly, but not exclusively, in the United States. And the third program on February 21 will cover the immigrant's experience in this country. Dr. Evans is a senior lecturer at the University of Hull in England, where he focuses his academic research on the migration of religious and ethnic minorities.





On April 16, 2023, Michael Simonson, from the Leo Baeck Institute, will present a program at the Genealogy Center in conjunction with the institute's exhibition, "1700 Years of Jewish Life in German-Speaking Lands." He is currently the Director of Public Outreach for the Leo Baeck Institute. In addition to speaking on the topic of the exhibition, he will discuss some of the history of German-speaking Jews in Indiana and nearby. The exhibition will be at the ACPL Genealogy Center for a few weeks in the spring of 2023.

Interested in Prohibition and your criminal ancestors? Ron Arons will speak to that subject on May 7, 2023 at the Genealogy Center. He will begin with "Alcohol, Prohibition and Temperance Societies in Ohio and Indiana," and conclude with "Researching Criminal Ancestors." Ron currently serves on the Board of Directors for the International Association of Jewish Genealogical Societies. He has authored three books, two of which are related to criminal records.

In addition to these five public programs, NEIJGS members will enjoy two Lunch and Learn programs with ACPL Genealogy Center staff, covering the use of DNA for research and the Periodical Source Index, a tremendous resource originating at the Genealogy Center. Members will also enjoy a fourth program by Dr. Evans, and dinners with those guest speakers visiting in person. For more information, visit www.NEIndianaJGS.org.

PERSONALIZE YOUR LOVED ONE'S DIGITAL YAHRZEIT PAGE


Have you previously purchased a bronze yahrzeit plaque for a loved one at Achduth Vesholom or B'nai Jacob? Or have you recently purchased a digital plaque on our new display in the foyer?

If so, we invite you to take advantage of special features on our new yahrzeit display by providing biographical information and photos of your family member. Forms are available both online or on paper to fill out with specific information about a loved one to submit to the Temple office to be added to the display.

This is the latest step in our yahrzeit project that grew out of the transition that began in July 2019 when members of the former B'nai Jacob became part of Achduth Vesholom. The long history of both congregations meant we had nearly 1,000 bronze nameplates on 10 larger boards with limited wall space.

The Temple's Board of Directors voted in February 2021 to purchase the interactive digital display, which was installed last September. The existing bronze plaques are being incorporated into a sculpture in the courtyard of the Madge Rothschild Resource Center.

Digital yahrzeit plagues are available for \$500 each, with proceeds going to the Temple's Endowment. While the congregation draws from our entire yahrzeit list when we say Kaddish during services, the digital display includes only names for those whose loved ones have purchased a plaque.

PRESIDENT'S CORNER

RONNIE GREENBERG

It's 8:00 in the morning and I just took two trays of seedlings that I've been nurturing under a grow light for the past two months out to the back patio for a day of natural light. This evening I will have to bring them back in. They require a lot of care – remember to turn the grow light on in the morning and off at night (even seedlings need to rest), water as needed, replant if some seeds don't germinate, thin the seedlings if too many germinate. Take them outside at the right time



to harden off. Finally, plant them in their final location. You're probably thinking, why do all that? You could just buy plants at a nursery. That's true, but...

Some things are worth doing for their own sake as well as for the outcome. The time and energy I invest in growing plants is rewarding to me because I feel that I am contributing to improving the environment. That is important to me. Similarly, the time and energy I invest at the Temple also holds a reward for me because I feel that I am contributing to the well-being and continuation of our Jewish community and our people. That is important to me. I suppose I could just let someone else to do it, but...

So here we are, nearing the end of the Temple's calendar and fiscal year. When you read this, the final meeting of this Board of Directors will be over, and we will be anticipating the Temple's annual congregational meeting – our 174th!

Our congregation is a charter member of the Union for Reform Judaism. For nearly 175 years, we have supported and nurtured Judaism in northeast Indiana, contributing our time and talents to not only our Jewish community but the larger community as well. I am proud to accept my place in this long line of Temple members and to work for its continuation. For me, expecting someone else to do it isn't an option.
