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SHARE SHAVUOT WITH OUR TEMPLE FAMILY

Please join us for our Shavuot service on Friday, May 26 at 7:30 p.m. when we celebrate the giving of the Torah on Mt. Sinai, led by Rabbi Meir Bargeron. Our Shabbat service on Saturday, May 27 at 9:45 a.m. will include Yizkor. Please join us in person or via livestream on Zoom or YouTube.

In ancient times, Shavuot marked the conclusion of the spring barley harvest and the beginning of the summer wheat harvest. The holiday is celebrated 50 days after Passover.

Traditionally, the Book of Ruth is read on Shavuot because just as that story recounts how a young Moabite woman chose to become an Israelite so did the Israelites choose to accept the commandments when they stood before Mt. Sinai. It is customary to eat dairy foods on the holiday to symbolize the sweetness of Torah and the association of Israel as the land of milk and honey.

Rabbi Meir Bargeron: LIVING, BREATHING TORAH

This month is remarkably full of Torah. We begin May with a visit by Rabbi Moshe Druin, who will be working to maintain and repair our Torah scrolls. Near the end of May, we will celebrate Shavuot, and the Jewish people's reception of Torah. This seems like a good time for me to share an original poem that

describes the moment when one first encounters a physical *sifrei Torah*, the Torah scroll:

Bracha

I have been waiting for you.

In the words that are inscribed upon your skin,

The spaces between the letters that tell the story of stories, The molecules that form the ink that makes timeless

The yearnings of your people,

The sinews that bind the sections of your flesh into one,

As it binds together all of us who study it,

All of creation is found.

I have been waiting for you.

Hineni: I am here. Is it possible that you have been waiting for me too?

May we continue to find sustenance in Torah, the story of God's relationship with the Jewish people.

His visit to Fort Wayne is part of Achduth Vesholom's Torah restoration efforts. In addition to working on some of the Temple's 12 scrolls, Rabbi Druin will repair a Torah that will be donated later this year to Goldman Union Camp Institute in honor of our 175th anniversary.

LEARN ABOUT ISRAEL IN THE TEMPLE LIBRARY

We've just celebrated *Yom Ha'atzmaut*, Israel's 75th birthday. If you're interested in learning about Israel, the <u>Rabbi Richard B. Safran Library</u> has hundreds of titles to choose from in our collection. From picture books to adult non-fiction, we have resources for all ages. <u>Check out our full</u> catalog of Israel-related titles

There are a few picture books specifically written to celebrate Israel's birthday. Ellen Dietrick's It's Israel's Birthday! is written for the youngest of readers, with photographs of pre-school children celebrating the holiday. Engineer Arielle and the Israel Independence Day Surprise, by Deborah Bodin Cohen, is a great introduction to the holiday, especially for train-lovers. Shmulik Paints the Town, by Lisa Rose, and Andria Rosenbaum's Meg Goldberg on Parade, also incorporate the holiday into colorful stories.

When browsing our shelves, other picture books set in Israel can be found by the flag stickers on their spine. A few titles do stand out. *Chicken Man*, by Michelle Edwards, is a National Jewish Book Award winner and now a classic story about kibbutz life. Leslie Kimmelman's *Everybody Says Shalom* is a wonderful picture-book tour of Israel that stands out amidst many of its kind. Rachel Raz has

two beautiful books of photographs of Israel in our non-fiction collection: *The Colors of Israel* and *ABC Israel*.

For the slightly older reader, Fan Manushkin's *Come, Let Us Be Joyfull:* The Story of Hava Nagila, is a wonderful story with a bit of history thrown in.


We have several non-fiction titles in our juvenile collection that are full of information and photographs of Israel. These include *Israel*, by Jill DuBois, Mitchell Bard's *Israel Matters*, and two titles by Debbie Smith: *Israel the Land*, and *Israel the People*. For those more interested in fiction, *Pickled Watermelon*, by Esty Schachter is a good place to start. Those who enjoy Kenneth Roseman's Do-it-Yourself Series may enjoy *Jeremiah's Promise: An Adventure in Modern Israel. The Dog of Knots*, by Kathy Walden Kaplan, is a novel about a girl and a stray dog, set during the Yom Kippur War.

Some of our most interesting non-fiction titles are written for young adults. When I Was a Soldier, by Valerie Zenatti, is an ALA Best Book for Young Adults, and is a memoir about a teenager's compulsory military service. Working Together:

Economy, Technology, and Careers in Israel, by Elisa Silverman, explores an aspect of Israel that is top-of-mind for

many teens. Homeland: The Illustrated History of the State of Israel, by Mary Wolfman, presents the country's history in graphic novel format, and is a National Jewish Book Award winner, Among the award-winners in teen fiction are Beni's War and The Six-Day Hero, two novels by Tammar Stein, about the Yom Kippur War, and Ronit & Jamil, by Pamela Laskin, a novel written in verse.





Whether it's award-winning fiction by Israeli authors, or non-fiction histories and commentaries, we have a more than 200 adult titles in our collection related to Israel. Highlights include *Apeirogon: A Novel,* by Colum McCann, and Ehud Barak's autobiography, *My Country, My Life: Fighting for Israel, Searching for Peace,* and *Israel: A Concise History of a Nation Reborn,* by Daniel Gordis. All three are National Jewish Book Award winners.



CREATING A WORLD OF SHALOM

Our youngest congregants have been studying the Jewish value of *Shalom* this month - helping to create a calmer, more peaceful world. They're also learning how they can create peace anywhere they go, including in their own homes - a concept known as *shalom bayit*, a peaceful home. Rabbi Natan said: "If one brings peace into the home, it is as though peace were brought to all the people of Israel."

- Speak respectfully to your family members (understanding the power of words)

- Be forgiving, don't sweat the small stuff (resolving conflicts)

As we move through this month of study, you might notice opportunities to talk with the young people in your life about how we can create more peace in our lives and homes through respectful speech, cooperation, and forgiveness.

We'll also vote on the budget for the coming year and candidates for leadership.


Members in good standing will be able to vote again this year in real time regardless of how they choose to attend. Information will be sent later this month about how to vote on candidates for leadership and the budget for 2023-2024. Absentee ballots also will be available for those who cannot attend in person or virtually.

During the meeting, President Ronnie Greenberg, the Board of Directors, Rabbi Meir Bargeron, and Executive Director Samara Sheray will review the past year's activities, including the status of the major upgrade to livestreaming operations approved last June by the members.

We'll also learn more about the 175th season of events to

celebrate our milestone anniversary, including a special weekend of events coming on November 10-12.

NEWS FROM THE BOARD

At the April 13 meeting, the Temple Board accepted the slate of candidates for Temple leadership for 2023-2024 as proposed by the Board Development Committee. The board also adopted a new plan for restructuring committees as outlined by President Ronnie Greenberg. (See President's column on page 14.)

John Stein, Vice President for Finance, presented a preliminary look at the budget for the coming fiscal year. A final proposed budget will be presented to the board in May before the congregation approves it at the Annual Meeting in June.

Executive Director Samara Sheray reported that the necessary electrical work has been completed for the audiovideo upgrade project. Installation of the livestreaming equipment in the Sanctuary and Social Hall started the week of April 24 and is expected to take a maximum of two weeks. Friday evening services during that time will be held in the Goldstine-B'nai Jacob Chapel.



Installation of new equipment is underway in the Sanctuary.

Progress continues in the Goldman Memorial Museum in the Madge Rothschild Resource Center. A new display about Jewish holidays and updates to the history wall will be installed soon. Additional displays are planned prior to the 175th Anniversary weekend in November.

Rabbi Meir told the Board that Rabbi Moshe Druin, a sofer, will be at the Temple on April 30 to May 4 to work on Temple's Torahs. Rabbi Druin also will offer a program on Tuesday, May 2 at 7 p.m. to teach about the creation and maintenance of scrolls.

NEIJGS: PROHIBITION AND CRIMINAL ANCESTORS ON MAY 7

The <u>Northeast Indiana Jewish Genealogy Society</u> is excited to welcome Ron Arons, a veteran genealogist, speaker, and author, for a program on Sunday, May 7, beginning at 2 p.m..This is a hybrid program, taking place both at the <u>Allen County Public Library</u> and on Zoom.



During his talk on "Alcohol, Prohibition and Temperance Societies in Ohio and Indiana," he'll discuss Indiana and Ohio's role and participation in Prohibition and the temperance movement. The session will cover alcohol production and distribution, the push for temperance, key figures, groups, legislation, enforcement, and the demise of Prohibition.

At 3:30 p.m., Arons will discuss "Researching Criminal Ancestors." He'll demonstrate how to research black sheep ancestors, those relatives who might be difficult to research for any one of a number of different reasons. He'll talk about using 'standard' genealogical records (census, vital records, city directories, etc.), but also about other specific records available only for those who broke the law or came close to doing so.

Arons has been researching his family for more than 20 years and became particularly interested in researching criminals when he discovered a very deeply buried secret about an ancestor who got into trouble and served time at one of the most famous American prisons.

Ron has authored three books: *The Jews of Sing Sing, WANTED! U.S. Criminal Records*, and *Mind Maps for Genealogy.* Ron earned degrees in engineering and business from Princeton and University of Chicago. He currently serves as Secretary for the IAJGS Board of Directors.

Now more than ever, this education needs to take place in Indiana classrooms.



Fort Wayne's annual Yom Hashoah commemoration was presented on April 17 by the Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne and Congregation Achduth Vesholom. Memorial candles in memory of the six million murdered during the Shoah were lit by students from the Temple and local high schools. Speakers included Andrew Lapin, a journalist and creator of the Radioactive podcast, and Carol Black, a survivor of the Tree of Life synagogue shooting in Pittsburgh.

Rabbi Meir also led a Yom HaShoah service at Manchester University, as part of the university's Peace Week. Joining him at the service were several members of the Temple family, including Professor Kate Crell, who organized the event, as well as John Planer and Janina Traxler, who lit the Shoah memorial candles.





TORAH SCRIBE VISIT MEMORABLE A QUARTER-CENTURY LATER

"Oh, my, has it been 25 years already since we had the Holocaust Torah repaired and a sofer came?"

That comment on the <u>Temple's Facebook page</u> was part of a recent exchange among past members reminiscing about an extraordinary time in Achduth Vesholom history, the celebration of our 150th year.

The discussion was sparked by an announcement that we're welcoming a Torah scribe this month to launch our 175th Anniversary season. Rabbi Moshe Druin will teach us about writing holy texts and the intricacies of caring for a sacred scroll. He'll repair one of our Torahs that will be donated later this year to Goldman Union Camp Institute in honor of our milestone and our long association with GUCI. (Learn more on page 3)

Our <u>Holocaust Torah</u> came in 1997 with the last half of Numbers and first half of Deuteronomy intact. It was saved from Nazi destruction in Czechoslovakia and is on permanent loan from the <u>Memorial Scrolls Trust</u>. Master Sofer Dr. Eric Ray,(z"l) to Fort

Wayne and began writing the opening sections of Genesis and explained the process of Torah writing. He continued to work on the sections in New York and Israel for nearly a year to incorporate new sections with the old ones in time for our 150th celebration in October 1998.

The Holocaust Torah has a special cover with the Hebrew word "Zachor," which means "Remember." The Torah is used regularly, with many of our b'nei mitzvah reading from it during their simcha.

A remnant of the damaged Torah has been on display at the Temple ever since it was restored. The section of Torah will have a new display case and new home near the entrance of the Madge Rothschild Resource Center in time for our 175th Anniversary celebration weekend in November.

This update to an important piece of our congregational history comes along with other changes coming to the Goldman Memorial Museum in the resource center. This includes updates to the wall highlighting the Jewish history of Northeast Indiana.

President's Corner Ronnie Greenberg

In February's Bulletin, I talked about the Board's adoption of a partnership model of governance at the Temple. This is a collective leadership model that elevates the professional staff of the Temple – the Rabbi and the Executive Director (ED) – into more strategic and autonomous roles. This model



recognizes the key roles they play and gives them the authority to direct activities within their area.

For the Rabbi, this includes all religious, ritual, educational and social action activities, and for the Executive Director, this includes all operational issues. This leaves the Board more time to consider strategic issues.

Governance aside, two people cannot run a complicated organization like the Temple all by themselves. That's where our committees come in. Like most organizations, the Temple relies on committees to generate and implement ideas and provide support for staff. Some committees meet regularly; some as needed. Some have been around forever; some are relatively new. But each one has a discrete task to perform. The occasional challenge has been coordinating the work of several committees to ensure we're all going in the same direction and that that direction is compatible with the direction set by the Board.

So, the next step in our process of streamlining and increasing the efficiency of our governance is implementation of a new way of organizing our committees. The goal is to ensure that each committee has someone providing oversight and coordination.

Therefore, each committee will be aligned with either the Board, the Rabbi or the ED. And the Board, the Rabbi and the ED will each have a committee portfolio that will include those committees for which they have functional accountability - that is, committees consistent with their areas of responsibility.

Explaining this makes it sound much more complicated than it is.

While some committees might be chaired by a board member, the Rabbi, or ED, many committees will continue to be chaired by congregants, as they are now. They will continue to meet on an appropriate schedule, from as needed to every month.

Alignment in portfolios will ensure that the committees accomplish what needs to be done and can easily bring to the Board anything that requires Board input or approval. This provides a direct line from each committee to the Board, and back again.

So, what will this look like on a practical, day-to-day basis? Probably not too different. We will still rely on committed congregants to make our community the best it can be. Placing committees under the portfolio of the Board, Rabbi or ED will improve coordination among committees, and consistency within that area of authority, resulting in a more unified direction for the congregation. These are all positive outcomes and will be worth the effort required to implement change.

I look forward to hearing your thoughts and discussion more at the Annual Meeting in June.
