Rabbi Meir Bargeron: A SWEET, AND CRIMSON, NEW YEAR

As I write my column this month, we are The Japanese maple, experiencing a glorious late-summer day, following a couple of weeks of oppressive, practically tropical heat. This favorable weather gave the Temple interconnectedness of life's journey. Gardeners an opportunity to complete a special project.

After clearing out some shrubbery near the front entrance of the Temple, the gardeners planted a lovely, and youthful Emperor 1 Japanese Maple. This gorgeous tree, named HaEder ("the Maple" in Hebrew) by the Temple Gardeners, begins its life as a part of our beautiful Rifkin Campus.

Planting trees not only beautifies our campus; it strengthens the lands where we live - Israel and also Fort Wayne. Jewish tradition has guite a bit to say about trees. In Midrash it's written: "It is said, 'Follow the Lord, your God.' This means: follow God's example. When God created the world, God's first action was to plant trees, as it was written, 'And God planted a garden [of trees] in Eden.' So you, too, when you will enter the land of Israel, planting trees should be your first involvement." (Vayikra Rabba 25:3)

We are now preparing for Rosh Hashanah, our New Year, a time of reflection, renewal, and anticipation. It's a period when we gather to celebrate the passing of one year and the beginning of another. In the midst of autumn, as the leaves turn vibrant shades of crimson-red, the Japanese maple tree stands as a poignant metaphor for the essence of Rosh Hashanah.

Just as each branch reaches out in diverse directions, so do our paths in life. Rosh Hashanah calls upon us to examine these paths, to consider the choices we've made, and to contemplate the potential avenues that lie ahead. Like the changing foliage, we experience growth and transformation throughout our journey.

The leaves of the Japanese maple, as they transform into fiery hues, teach us about change and transition. Rosh Hashanah marks a transition from the old year to the new, a time to reflect on the past and embrace the possibilities of the future. We look back with gratitude for the blessings we've received, and forward with hope for the opportunities that await us. The changing leaves remind us that change is not to be feared, but rather embraced as a natural part of life's rhythm.

In essence, the Japanese maple tree serves as a profound metaphor for Rosh Hashanah. Its branches reach out, symbolizing our diverse paths. Its changing leaves reflect our growth and transitions. Its shedding leaves remind us to release the past. Its elegance and beauty evoke awe and wonder. And its resilience embodies the hope that anchors us. As we prepare to celebrate Rosh Hashanah, we are invited to embrace the wisdom of the Japanese maple and carry its lessons forward into the new year.

I wish each of you Shannah Tovah u'Metukah, a sweet and good New Year.

BACK TO SCHOOL IN THE RABBI RICHARD B. SAFRAN LIBRARY

Whether it's public, private, or Hebrew school, it's the time of year when students of all ages are back at it. We have dozens of school-related titles in the <u>Rabbi Richard B. Safran Library</u> written for readers at all grade levels.



For the youngest students, four picture books are on topic. Sammy Spider's First Day of School, by Sylvia Rouss, is a good introduction for the youngest readers. Sammy is always a hit with pre-

schoolers. *No Rules for Michael,* also by Sylvia Rouss, addresses the need for rules in the classroom. Although set in the wintertime, both *The Shabbat Box*, by Lesley Simpson, and *The Only One Club*, by Jane Naliboff, are good stories that take place in a school setting for younger children.

Most of our school-related titles are shelved in the juvenile fiction collection, for lower and middle grade readers. Many deal with bullies and bullying, and two of those are Sydney Taylor Award winners. Turtle Boy, by M. Evan Wokenstein, features a seventh grader named Will and his Bar Mitzvah project. Jane Yolen's B.U.G. (Big Ugly Guy) is a Golem-related novel starring twelve-yearold Sammy Greenburg. Mark Goldblatt's popular Twerp and The Boy Who Failed Show and Tell by Jordan Sonnenblick also focus on bullying. Other recent middle-grade titles include Honey and Me by Meira Drazin, a Sydney Taylor Honor Book, Ellen Outside the Lines by A.J. Sass, and Noa Nimrodi's Not So Shy.

The Assignment, by Liza Wiemer, is one of several school-related titles in our teen collection. Inspired by an actual event, this Sydney Taylor Notable Book follows a class debating the "merits" of Hitler's Final Solution and the anti-Semitism provoked by this. Most other teen titles related to school are not so serious. Lori Goldstein's *Screen Queens* addresses social media. Marisa Kanter's



As If On Cue and Diana Harmon Asher's Upstaged are theater-related. Other Sydney Taylor Notable Books include Why We Fly by Kimberly Jones and Today Tonight Tomorrow by Rachel Lynn Solomon.

As we look forward to another year of Religious School, we hope you and your students will take advantage of the resources in the Temple Library. Meanwhile, you can check out titles whenever you're in the building and access the <u>full catalog online</u>.



TEMPLE BOOK CLUB RESUMES IN OCTOBER WITH *THISTLEFOOT*

From Wendy Smith of *The Washington Post*, "Steeped in the ancient tropes of folk tales and animated by a passionate belief in the vital role of storytelling, GennaRose Nethercott's first novel builds on her work as a folklorist and poet...Gorgeously written ... riveting and moving."

Youth News

A GREAT YEAR OF JEWISH LEARNING COMING SOON!



Registration is underway now for our Youth Education programs for the 2023-2024 school year, which includes a wide range of options aimed at instilling a love of lifelong Jewish learning and creating an environment in which students, teachers, parents, and communities experience Jewish values as a meaningful way to navigate the world.

Registration is required for our school-aged youth (age 6 by September 1 and up) who are eligible to participate in our weekly online Hebrew classes and in-person Sunday values programs from 10 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. at the Temple.

Our elementary-age students participate in interactive, valuesbased curriculum through the Union for Reform Judaism's <u>Shalom Learning program</u>, which focuses on developing a positive Jewish identity.

Lessons incorporate Social and Emotional Learning (SEL) skills in the context of introductory Hebrew study, living 12 Jewish values, celebrating Jewish holidays, and exploring Jewish texts and prayers. Students also participate in weekly online Hebrew instruction, featuring such classes as Hebrew Decoded – a Journey through the Alphabet; Friday Night and Home Prayers; and Morning Prayers.

As a reminder, students ages 9 and above are required to enroll in and complete three full years of Values and Hebrew instruction prior to their B'nai Mitzvah. Participation in Values and Hebrew programming by students ages 6-8 is optional.

Our Middle-School-age students who are preparing for their B'nai Mitzvot study with Rabbi Meir during in-person interactive family education sessions and preteen modules using <u>Moving Traditions</u> curriculum. At the same time, they also study Hebrew individually with their B'nai Mitzvah tutors, and also participating in weekly online Hebrew instruction featuring such classes as Shabbat Morning Torah Service and Concluding Prayers.

Our students who are B'nai Mitzvah participate in monthly in-person collaborative sessions based on The Advot Project's Teen Fellowship program to create deep connections between teens as they grapple with key issues like healthy relationships, communication,

Do you have a pet? A dog? A cat? An iguana? Or maybe you just love animals?



175th SEASON OF EVENTS CELEBRATES MILESTONE YEAR

Our celebration of the Temple's <u>175th Anniversary</u> season continues this fall with a variety of exciting activities that build on the recent music and art programs that brought members of our congregation and larger community together.

In August, Musician-in-Residence <u>Shira Kline</u>, also known as ShirLaLa, shared her talents with congregants of all ages during Shabbat programs and a community concert that included Havdalah. She also worked with our Joy Vey leaders to help them further develop the Temple's popular program for young children and their families. The programs were enhanced by a BBQ hosted by the ROMEOs and a spaghetti dinner coordinated by Stephanie Gottesman.

Additionally in August, the Temple collaborated with the Unitarian Universalist Congregation next door to offer programs featuring local artist <u>Hilarie Couture</u> and her

portraits of "Unity with Diversity" within Fort Wayne. CAV members Fran & Irv Adler and Jon Tam were among the 41 subjects of the paintings. The day included an art show at both



congregations, as well as a panel discussion at the Temple that included portrait sitters.

CANTOR YAEL FISCHMAN WILL LEAD CONSERVATIVE HOLIDAY SERVICES

Cantor Yael Fischman returns for the High Holy Days in 5784 (2023) to lead our Conservative services.

She is one of the first 35 women to have been invested as a Cantor by the Conservative Movement. She earned her Diploma of Hazzan and Bachelors in Music from The Jewish Theological Seminary's H.L. Miller Cantorial School, as it is now known. She has served in both full-time, parttime, and High Holy Day positions.

Additionally, she served her synagogue community for three years as its

Religious Committee Chair. Born and raised in Pittsburgh, PA., Cantor Fischman attended Parkway Jewish Center in Penn Hills almost from birth, delighting in the prayers and "heimish" feeling of the small community, a feeling she brings to each service she leads. It was at Parkway that she received her spiritual calling to become involved in Jewish leadership.

Her undergraduate studies at Indiana University, where she chanted High Holy Day services with Professor Michael Morgan as her Rabbi, confirmed her desire to become a Hazzan, although at the time only the Reform were training women as cantors. Yet, as one of her uncles observed, she possessed a "dogged determination" to follow this path.

Many years, a husband, two daughters, and several cats later, she is still determined to follow where she is called. When not substituting for the Hazzan or teaching at Mishkan Torah Congregation in Greenbelt, MD, Cantor Fischman uses her hands to create beautiful beaded wire kippot, wall hangings and earrings which connect people with their spirituality through natural design, in homage to the Artist of the Creation. President's Corner Ronnie Greenberg

As this new year coincides with our congregation's

175th anniversary, I've been thinking about our history and our past 174 High Holiday observances. <u>The Temple website</u> has a fascinating and comprehensive account of our history.

You can learn that Achduth Vesholom was originally founded as a "Chevra Kadisha," a "Society for Visiting the Sick and Burying the Dead" in 1848 by 23 members. They worshipped in the home of Frederic Nirdlinger, who was also the first president (and the third and the fifth – some things don't change) until 1859, when they acquired their first building. We were also, originally, a German Orthodox congregation, with our transition to Reform Judaism beginning in 1862.

At its founding, Achduth Vesholom provided its members with a place to worship and a place to honor the dead. It must also have provided a community, a place to meet, talk and study with other Jewish people who shared a culture and background. The Jewish community of Fort Wayne has never been very large, so the congregation would have been vital for Jews to meet and interact with other Jews.

Looking back to our beginning, I wonder what our founders envisioned for the congregation they established? Would they be surprised that we're still going strong 175 years later? Putting aside inventions not yet available in 1848 (cars, cell phones, streaming), would they even recognize the congregation? I think they would.

Just as at our beginning, our congregation today provides not only for our spiritual needs, but also for our cultural, educational, and social needs. With the establishment of the Rifkin Campus and integration of members of the former B'nai Jacob Congregation, we have truly become a center of Jewish life in Fort Wayne, just as we must have been in 1848. We are a one-stop shop for all things that liberal and inclusive Judaism embraces, be it worship, study or socializing.

But as with all things, you reap what you sow. I would guess that the 23 members who established Achduth Vesholom were not all the Jews in Fort Wayne. There were probably a few who chose not to join. How unfortunate! They missed an opportunity to be part of the establishment of something that has flourished for 175 years! Similarly, there are some Jews in Fort Wayne now who chose not to join, and some who are members but don't take advantage of all our community offers. Again, how unfortunate! They are missing the opportunity to grow as Jews and human beings while being part of a warm, caring and inclusive community.

How can we change this? In this new year, each of us can make an effort to reach out and invite other Jews, be they members or not, to join us for services and programs. Guests are always welcome at High Holiday services, so consider inviting someone who doesn't usually attend to accompany you. There are so many interesting programs coming up in 5784 in celebration of our 175th, so invite someone to join you. It can make all the difference.

In 1973, when Norm and I were new members of the Temple and knew no one, our rebitzen and dear friend Lois Safran z"I invited me

to a Sisterhood meeting. She met me at the door, sat with me at lunch, and made sure I was introduced to many other women. That was the beginning of our involvement at the Temple. It's 50 years later, and we're still here. One person can make a difference. You can make a difference.
