
A Fort Wayne native, Lavie is the author of two books: Why Are We Still Afraid?, which follows his five-decade career and provides a real-time picture of Israel growing up, and Broken Spring, which gives insights from his time in Cairo from

2011-2013 covering the Arab Spring. Lavie's blog posts on Israel and the Middle East can be read at Medialine.

Lavie's roots in Fort Wayne include being part of the Temple's Confirmation class of 1961, the first in the building on Old Mill Road. After graduating from Indiana University in Bloomington, he worked in television and radio news in Indianapolis and South Bend before making *aliyah in 1972*.

### Rabbi Meir Bargeron: SEVEN JEWISH PODCASTS WORTH YOUR TIME


For many good reasons related to current events. I heartily recommend that you seriously consider a news diet to assist in managing anxiety and worry. And what better way to fill the time you might otherwise be staring at your favorite cable news outlet, or doom-scrolling through social media, than to do a deep dive into Jewishness and Judaism by listening to podcasts?

To carry you through these first months of winter, here are some Jewish podcasts that are worth your time. Please note that most of these podcasts are available at Apple Podcasts, Spotify, Amazon Music, or as they say, wherever you get your podcasts:

- Being Jewish with Jonah Platt: A weekly podcast that illuminates the full, beautiful, often unexplored spectrum of Jewish identity by exploring the personal journeys of both Jews and non-Jewish allies alike. Actor, artist and Jewish advocate Jonah Platt interviews celebrities from many fields in search of insights and answers to the question, "What does it mean to be Jewish to you?
- For Heaven's Sake: Produced by the Shalom Hartman Institute in Jerusalem, the weekly podcast features conversations between Rabbi Donniel Hartman and Yossi Klein Halevi, an American-born Israeli author and journalist. This pod's title comes from the Hebrew expression *machloket* I'shem shemayim, "disagreeing for the sake of heaven." Hartman and Halevi engage in robust discussion on political and social trends in Israel, Israel-Diaspora relations, and the collective consciousness of being Jewish. Since October 7, 2023, they have focused on Israel at War. This is a very highquality Jewish/Israeli podcast that I highly recommend.
- Identity/Crisis: Also produced by the Shalom Hartman Institute, this podcast features host Yehuda Kurtzer, president of the Shalom Hartman Institute, who talks with leading

thinkers to unpack current events affecting Jewish communities in North America, Israel, and around the world, revealing the core Jewish values underlying the issues that matter most to you.

4. Judaism Unbound Podcast: One of the best Jewish podcasts out there, Dan Liebson and Lex Rofeberg analyze pressing issues for 21st century American Judaism. Mixing their own



- Sermons from Ikar: Rabbi Sharon Brous is one of the leading progressive Jewish voices in America and author of the recently published book *The Amen Effect*. Ikar, the Hebrew word for "essence," is a vibrant synagogue in Los Angeles, where they produce podcasts of sermons from Brous and her associate rabbis.
- Tablet Studios Produces several high-quality podcasts that examine Jewish life, history and current affairs. Their miniseries Re-Form does a deep dive into the central questions of modern Reform Judaism in America and will be the basis of a Temple Lifelong Learning series beginning in February.
- College Commons: Produced by Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion, the podcast features passionate perspectives from Judaism's leading thinker. Hosted by Joshua Holo, professor of Jewish History.




"A Creative Life: The Architecture and Art of Alan Grinsfelder" continues on display at the Temple on Saturday and Sunday, December 7-8 from 1 to 4 p.m.

This inspiring exhibit highlights Alan's designs and

architectural contributions to the Fort Wayne skyline during his long career with Grinsfelder Associates Architecture, along with the creativity displayed in his ongoing fine arts endeavors.

Alan's building projects featured in this exhibition include Headwaters Park, the Foellinger Theatre, the Pyramid Plaza, the Hanna Creighton block (Urban League, Head Start, and Pontiac Public Library) and the downtown Community Center.

His artwork has been on display in local coffeehouses and galleries. Alan, who will turn 89 days before the exhibit's opening, has been touted as Purdue Fort Wayne's oldest student and continues to take art classes.

Alan and his wife, Maureen, are long-time members of the Temple and past presidents.

More than 150 people attended the exhibit opening on November 24. A panel discussion, moderated by Irene Walters, included Alan, Geoff Paddock, Fort Wayne City Councilman and former Executive Director of Headwaters Park, and John O'Connell, Dean of the College of Visual & Performing Arts at Purdue Fort Wayne.

for the holiday! This month, we'll feature our newer picture


books for young readers, all published in 2022 or later.

Weissman's Hanukkah Upside Down is set in New Zealand. Elka Weber's Mrs. Maccabee's Miracle is a new spin on the Hanukkah story. Tizzy the Dizzy Dreidel by Allison Marks literally focuses on the "spin" in the holiday celebration.



Two picture books with a Latin flavor are Linda Elovitz Marshall's The Mexican Dreidel and Hanukkah in Little Havana by Julie Ann Blank. Both include aspects of the holiday that many children may not have considered.

### STREAMLINED PICK UP PROCESS PROVES POPULAR AT 22ND DELI DAY

The Temple's 22<sup>nd</sup> Corned Beef Fundrais-er once again brought enthusiastic com-Thank you to our Corned Beef Commitmunity support, with sales of nearly 1,700 meals and 100+ pounds of bulk corned beef, along with multiple operational improvements that contributed to a smooth and successful Deli Day on November 7.

A new order pick-up plan received rave reviews from customers and volunteers alike. The traffic bottleneck of the past few years along Old Mill Road was avoided by eliminating the drive-thru line. Customers instead parked in our spacious lot and walked up to the front of the building, where multiple volunteers were conveniently stationed outdoors to assist.

The cumbersome process of looking up customer orders on paper in binders was replaced by a computerized system for easy searching. Once the order was confirmed, a copy was printed inside the building, where our customer fulfillment

squad could then gather the sandwich boxes (already prepped in plastic bags with one or two meals) and/or 1-lb. bags of bulk corned beef to bring to the customer. A drink table in front of the building made it easy to pull the correct soda cans or water bottles to complete the orders. The process was quick and efficient.

"Once again, enjoyed our meals immensely," one customer wrote on Facebook. "And the pick-up was SO

much easier - very streamlined. Congratulations to all for a job well done."

We also expanded our regular 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. hours, adding a 10 a.m. opening for those who ordered in advance. Customers began lining up even earlier to pick up and add to their orders. We sold out by 11:15 a.m. for walk-up orders. More customers this year opted for our local delivery service.

The improvements came after careful analysis in the past year by members of our committee, including computer simulations to determine the most efficient procedures to best serve our customers.

Forty-one sponsors generously supported the sale, contributing nearly \$16,000 to help cover our costs. New this year, we added a fourth sponsorship levels. Thank you to our inaugural platinum sponsor, The Krouse Family, who received an autographed copy of The Jewish Deli: An Illustrated Guide to the Chosen Food, by Ben Nadler. We're also grateful to our gold sponsors: Center for Colon & Rectal Care, Cremm Farms, and The Zacher Company.

The final amount raised by the fundraiser

Thank you to our Corned Beef Committee, led by co-chairs by Micah Soltz and Amy Krouse. Their team included Fran Adler, Rabbi Meir Bargeron, Jamie Fritz, Lily Noga, Denny Reynolds, Samara Sheray, Celeste Sexton, Jon Tam, Steve Zacher, Mimi Zelman, Beth Zweig, and Dan Zweig.

"Every year it is amazing to see what a small group of non-professional volunteers can pull off by coming together for the cause of community and what in large part fuels my drive to continue being a part of CAV's annual Corned Beef Fundraiser," Micah said.

About two dozen volunteers came earlier during Corned Beef Week on Monday to prepare 2,000 condiment bags, filling them with sponsor sheets, mustard packets. and other items.



On Wednesday evening, more of the 100 volunteers helped on Prep Night - including friends of congregants and new recruits - to assist with weighing meat portions, scooping coleslaw into cups, bagging pickles, cutting brownies, and more.

On Thursday, some 80+ volunteers began shifts at 7 a.m. to assist on Deli Day! Morning live shots on WANE-TV - aided by an early-bird crew of CAV members arriving before 4:30 a.m. - helped swell our turnout. Thanks to Rabbi Meir Bargeron, Denny Reynolds, Micah Soltz, Jon Tam, and Beth Zweig

We appreciate the Temple staff for pitching in, problem-solving, and persevering! Thanks to Executive Director Samara Sheray, Administrative Assistant Lily Noga, Comptroller Jamie Fritz, Facilities Manager Charlie Smiley, and Custodian Timmy Oberley. All of them went above and beyond.

Many thanks also to our security team led by Joe Lyon for keeping us safe, directing traffic, and pitching in on Prep Night.

Thank you to our kitchen crew: Denny Reynolds, Marcia Reynolds and Jon Tam. We again used the "counting grid"

created in 2022 by Denny to help with accuracy in tracking the number of meat packets for sandwich orders. We appreciate Norm Greenberg for his deli experience and meat slicer skills to help capture every bit of corned beef to enjoy.

Our sponsorship efforts – led by Amy Krouse, Sam Krouse, Samara Sheray, Steve Zacher and Dan Zweig - included reaching out to connections in the community and congregation. Amy Krouse did a great job recruiting volunteers, including our Prep Night station captains: Scott Goldberg (pickles), John Stein (coleslaw), Steve Zacher (brownies), Dan Zweig (weighing station), Denny Reynolds (kitchen). Shai Hadashi (large orders/ deliveries), Jon Tam (bulk corned beef, and health and sanitation), Sam Krouse (refrigerated storage), and Beth Zweig (condiment bags). The delivery management team included Amy Krouse, and

Shai Hadashi. Order fulfilment operations were organized by Samara Sheray, Lily Noga, and Amy Krouse.

Micah Soltz captained the sourcing of supplies and proved a jack-of-all-trades throughout the sale.

We continued a weekly e-blast with corned beef reminders to previous customers and increased our social media presence on Facebook with posts and reels, and help from our congregants in sharing news of the sale with friends. Thanks to

Fran Adler, Celeste Sexton, and Beth Zweig for their work on marketing.

### RIGHTEOUSNESS IN OUR AGE

### Wednesday, January 8 at 7p.m. on Zoom

The pursuit of justice and the care of our communities and our neighbors are the bedrocks of Jewish ethics. Join Rabbi Meir to explore biblical, rabbinic and modern Jewish texts that present different views of righteousness. We will discuss how these texts are relevant to the present moment in America, Israel and the world.

### THE REFORM MOVEMENT IN AMERICA TODAY

### Wednesdays at 7 pm on Zoom, beginning February 12

The Reform Movement, with its origins in Germany, is America's largest Jewish movement. Congregation Achduth Vesholom is one of the nearly 850 congregations in North America affiliated with the Union for Reform Judaism.

According to the Pew Research Center, 2.8 million Jews live in the U.S. and 38% identify as Reform.

In this series led by Rabbi Meir, we will focus discussions based on episodes of Re-Form, a recent podcast series from Tablet Studios, supplemented with Jewish texts presented during the class.

Re-Form focuses on five questions or issues that have defined the movement in the modern era. Participants are highly encouraged to listen to the podcast episode in advance, but this is not required. 






November 13, 2024

### STAY INFORMED ABOUT WORLD ZIONIST CONGRESS ELECTION

Help promote religious pluralism in Israel by voting in the election for the members of the 39th World Zionist Congress

Known as the international "parliament of the Jewish people," the WZC is the global representative body for Jewish communities, with control over a \$1 billion budget pivotal to securing religious pluralism, LGBTQ+ rights, gender equality, democratic values and more in Israel. The WZC elections will take place March 10 - May 4, 2025. The Reform Movement is represented by ARZA (The Association of Reform Zionists in America) and the international Reform Zionist organization ARZENU.

What is at stake? The highly motivated religious fundamentalist opponents' vision for the future of Israel is diametrically opposed to that of the Reform Movement. They are organizing to destroy what we value, including:

- Chipping away at Israel's democracy
- Rolling back gains for gender equity, LGBTQ+ rights, and religious pluralism
- Stripping our Israeli Reform clergy especially our women rabbis and our Reform communities of their rights, funding, and infrastructure
- Making sure that our converts and children are not recognized as Jews in the Jewish State
- Blocking any hope of Palestinian self-determination and safety

Join thousands of Reform Jews in mobilizing. Get involved in the WZC

We will continue to share information with Temple members. Registration will open when voting begins, and it will be done primarily online and via mobile devices. Ballots are cast for slates of candidates submitted by Zionist groups.

The WZC is the successor gathering to the first Zionist Congress convened by Theodor Herzl in Basel in 1897.

In the United States, the American Zionist Movement (AZM) organizes a grassroots election, where the American Jewish community can choose its delegates to the WZC. The WZC, which now meets about every five years, is the overall supreme ideological and policy-making body of the Zionist movement.

### CONFRONTING THE SHOAH CLASS BEGINS IN JANUARY

Mark your calendars for "Confronting the Shoah," a six-week class presented by Holocaust scholar Dr. David Lindquist, begins in January. Sponsored by the Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne, this course provides participants with comprehensive contextual and historical knowledge regarding the Nazi Holocaust.

The group then visited the Fort Wayne Museum of Art, meeting with Colleen Huddleson, Vice President & Chief Program Officer, to explore potential programming opportunities for the conference.





The IAJGS conference next summer features a film festival that includes a screening celebrating the 50th anniversary of Hester Street.



On Wednesday evening, the IAJGS representatives participated in the Temple's Corned Beef Prep Night, which allowed them to meet many congregants who we will be recruiting as volunteers for the conference.

On Thursday, Irv guided Hadassah on a tour that included Sweetwater Sound, Promenade Park, and the newly opened Pearl Street Arts Center. They concluded their tour at the Botanical Conservatory, another potential site for conference programming. Overall, the four days in Fort Wayne were highly productive and beneficial for the upcoming conference.

# NEWS FROM THE BOARD

During the Temple board meeting on November 14, Finance Vice President John Stein reported that the congregation will end the 2023-2024 fiscal year with a surplus of \$59,000 instead of the anticipated deficit of \$30,000. The

large swing is the result of savings on wages and salary for an unfilled position and repairs and maintenance that were budgeted but didn't happen.

Corned Beef Co-Chairs Amy Krouse and Micah Soltz reported to the board that our 22<sup>nd</sup> Deli Day went smoothly, with improved operations and nearly \$16,000 raised from sponsorships. They reported that many customers sent complimentary emails about their food and experience. Fi-

nal numbers are not yet ready. Nearly 1,700 meals were sold, though Micah indicated that we could handle producing several hundred more. A focus next year will be increasing sponsorships.

The Board Development Committee presented several ideas for building interest in congregational leadership, including offering a Leadership CAV 2025 program in January (see page 9). Leise Rosman and Amy Krouse said the program will focus on different leadership roles and the advantages of getting more involved, from professional development to networking to building community to making a meaningful contribution to our Jewish community.

At its next meeting in February, the Board will continue its strategic discussions. Upcoming topics are member engagement and finances.

President Ronnie Greenberg also reported that chair(s) are needed to coordinate the Temple's Second Seder on Sunday, April 13. Please contact Ronnie or the Temple office to volunteer.



# President's Corner Ronnie Greenberg

This openness to our neighbors and others extends through the faith community of Fort Wayne as well. Although we have different theologies, and may have different viewpoints on social issues, we basically recognize that we worship the same God. Therefore, we can, and should, come together to work for the good of our community and to celebrate accomplishments. Our congregation is fortunate that Rabbi Meir fully embraces this concept and has been a leader in planning and executing many interfaith events.

Last month, Norm and I were privileged to attend the consecration of the Rev. Dr. Bill McGill as a Bishop in the Baptist Church. Bishop McGill – Bill - has been a good friend and supporter of the Jewish community. He participated in our October 7 service to remember victims of the brutal Hamas attack on Israel, and, as usual, he spoke with eloquence and fervor. He can always be counted upon to participate in the Interfaith Thanksgiving Service that the Temple has hosted for many years. I was pleased that many of our congregants were present on November 15 to celebrate his consecration with him, and that Rabbi Meir was one of the guest clergy and part of the program.

The Interfaith Thanksgiving Service has been a longstanding tradition in the local faith community. Held on the Tuesday evening before Thanksgiving, the gathering brings together Jewish, Christian, Muslim, Buddhist, Baha'i, Native American, and other religious leaders to celebrate our shared gratitude on this American holiday. If you haven't attended, you should. It's a very unique and beautiful service. Originally, the host for the service rotated among congregations, but for the past 12 years the Temple has been the host – a tribute to our warm, welcoming congregation, and our excellent oneg!

Looking forward to next spring, the Temple will be partnering with the Jewish Federation of Fort Wayne to bring the Violins of Hope instruments and their stories back to Fort Wayne, based on a new book of photographs and history. We will participate in a joint service with Roman Catholic Bishop Kevin Rhoades and the congregants of St. Vincent de Paul parish on Thursday, March 20 at the St. Vincent de Paul church. The following evening, we will hold special Shabbat services to which our Catholic friends will be invited. I hope many of you will attend!

It isn't always easy being Jewish in an overwhelmingly Christian community. Perhaps one could also say that about being Muslim or Buddhist or Unitarian. Creating and taking advantage of opportunities to forge relationships with members of non-Jewish congregations can be a huge step toward understanding others and helping them understand us, as we all work together towards a better Fort Wayne and a better world. And isn't that the goal?
